A SUPPLEMENT to the "Local Public Contracts Law," approved June 9, 1971 (P. L. 1971, c. 198).

1 BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State 2 of New Jersey:

1. Notwithstanding any provisions of the act to which this act is 1 2 a supplement to the contrary, the governing body may by resolution 3 authorize the purchasing agent of the contracting unit to purchase specific materials at auction for a price not to exceed 85% of the 4 5 * [fair market]* price of equivalent materials * [when new. A copy 6 of such * *as determined pursuant to this section. Such* resolu-7 tion *shall be adopted at least 10 days prior to the auction and* shall be filed with the Director of the Division of Local Government 8 Services within * 10]* *3* days of its adoption. Any such auction 9 10 shall be open to any person to attend and bid on such materials, 10A shall be conducted pursuant to N. J. S. 12A:2-328 or N. J. S. 10B 12A :6-108, and shall be conducted by a licensed auctioneer. Prior 11 to "[participating in such auction]" * adoption of the resolution*, 11A the purchasing agent shall solicit at least three * [price quotations 11B in order to determine the fair market price of new materials equiv-12 alent to those to be purchased at auction, which shall be the median 12A price of the three so quoted]* *written quotations of prices for 12B which new materials equivalent to those to be purchased at auction 13 were actually sold within the previous year. The lowest of the three 13A prices so quoted shall be the determining price quotation for the 13B authorization to purchase at auction for a price not to exceed 85% 14 thereof. The authorizing resolution adopted by the governing body 14A shall set forth the three price quotations so quoted and the sources 14B thereof, and shall state that the expenditure of money for the pur-14c chase is not made in violation of N. J. S. 40A:4-57, and has been 14D properly certified by the chief finance officer of the local unit.*

EXPLANATION-Matter enclosed in **bold-faced** brackets [thus] in the above bill is not enacted and is intended to be omitted in the law. Any purchasing agent who shall purchase materials at auction pursuant to this section shall, within 14 days of the occurrence of such auction, file a report with the clerk of the governing body and the director, setting forth: the nature, quantity and price of the materials so purchased; the three price quotations solicited prior to such auction, and the sources thereof; and, the name and license number of the auctioneer who conducted such auction.

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1 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

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1 BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State 2 of New Jersey:

1 1. Notwithstanding any provisions of the act to which this act is 2 a supplement to the contrary, the governing body may by resolution authorize the purchasing agent of the contracting unit to purchase 3 4 specific materials at auction for a price not to exceed 85% of the fair market price of equivalent materials when new. A copy of 5 6 such resolution shall be filed with the Director of the Division of Local Government Services within 10 days of its adoption. Any 7 such auction shall be open to any person to attend and bid on such 8 materials, shall be conducted pursuant to N. J. S. 12A:2-328 or 9 N. J. STATEMENT

This bill would permit local government units to purchase new or used materials at public auction for a price not to exceed 85% of the fair market price of equivalent materials when new. The effect of the legislation would be to allow local governments to save money by purchasing satisfactory used goods and equipment at auction, instead of buying new goods and equipment. Office equipment and furnishings are particularly amenable to this method of cost savings. The bill provides for several safeguards against abuse, including the requirement that the local purchasing agent, prior to participating in such action, solicit at least three price quotations in order to determine the fair market price of equivalent materials when new.

As amended by the Senate committee, Assembly Bill No. 1782 would permit local government units to purchase new or used materials at public auction for a price not to exceed 85% of the price of equivalent materials when new. The effect of the legislation, according to the sponsor, would be to allow local governments to save money by purchasing satisfactory used goods and equipment at auction, instead of buying new goods and equipment. Office equipment and furnishings are particularly amendable to this method of cost savings. The bill provides for several safeguards against abuse, including the requirement that the local purchasing agent, prior to participating in such action, solicit at least three price quotations in order to determine the fair market price of equivalent materials when new.

In addition to the three price quotation requirement noted by the sponsor, the bill would require:

1. That the auction be open to the public, be conducted pursuant to statutory restrictions, and be conducted by a licensed auctioneer; and,

2. That the purchasing agent, within 14 days after the auction, file a report with the director detailing certain information concerning the purchases made at such auction, and the conduct thereof.

The Senate committee amendments, offered by the sponsor and endorsed by the Director of Local Government Services, would additionally tighten the procedural safeguards in the bill by:

a. Requiring the local unit to utilize the lowest, rather than the median, of the 3 price quotations solicited for the purposes of authorizing the purchasing agent to purchase at auction equivalent materials at a price not to exceed 85% thereof;

b. Requiring that the factual basis of the authorization—the 3 price quotations and the sources thereof—be set forth in the authorizing resolution;

c. Requiring that the resolution be adopted at least 10 days prior to the auction, and be transmitted to the Director of Local Government Services within 3, rather than 10 days, of adoption; d. Requiring that the 3 price quotations solicited be in written form and be prices at which new materials equivalent to those to be purchased at auction were actually sold within the previous year; and,

e. Requiring that the resolution state that the expenditure will not produce an overexpenditure of funds in violation of N. J. S. 40A:4-57, and the expenditure has been properly certified by the chief finance officer of the local unit (N. J. A. C. 5:30-14.5).

Amend page 1, section 1, line 5, omit "fair market".

Amend page 1, section 1, lines 5-6, omit "when new. A copy of such", insert "as determined pursuant to this section. Such".

Amend page 1, section 1, line 6, after "resolution", insert "shall be adopted at least 10 days prior to the auction and".

Amend page 1, section 1, line 7, omit "10", insert "3".

Amend page 1, section 1, line 11, omit "participating in such auction", insert "adoption of the resolution".

Amend page 1, section 1, lines 12-14, after "three", omit remainder of line 12 and all of lines 13 and 14; insert: "written quotations of prices for which new materials equivalent to those to be purchased at auction were actually sold within the previous year. The lowest of the three prices so quoted shall be the determining price quotation for the authorization to purchase at auction for a price not to exceed 85%thereof. The authorizing resolution adopted by the governing body shall set forth the three price quotations so quoted and the sources thereof, and shall state that the expenditure of money for the purchase is not made in violation of N. J. S. 40A:4-57, and has been properly certified by the chief finance officer of the local unit.".

OCTOBER 15, 1979

-- revise the tagging requirements for these birds.

-- revise the semi-wild preserve hunting season to clear up confusion in the isting language and make it consistent with other changes.

<u>A-1782</u>, sponsored by Assemblyman W. Cary Edwards (R-Bergen), which permits local overnments to buy new or used materials at public auctions for a price not to exceed or percent of the equivalent materials when new.

The purpose of the bill is to allow local governments to save money by purchasing med materials. The bill sets down several safeguards against abuse of the law.

<u>A-3120</u>, sponsored by Assemblyman Robert E. Littell (R-Sussex), which eliminates represent 30 year ceiling for water district bond maturity, substituting instead the novision that bonds shall mature within the period or average period of usefullness of redevelopment to be financed as determined in the bond ordinance.

<u>S-181</u>, sponsored by Senator Wayne Dumont, Jr. (R-Warren), which authorizes the laware River Joint Toll Bridge Authority to construct and operate the proposed I-78 Illipsburg-Easton Bridge as a toll bridge.

S-1125, sponsored by former Senator Martin L. Greenberg (D-Essex), which amends clarifies the Municipal Land Use Law and further simplifies and makes more predictable development application and review process.

The changes the bill makes are primarily technical in nature.
