The purpose of this bill is to improve this situation:

- —By allowing jury commissioners to use lists provided by the Division of Motor Vehicles of motor vehicle owners and holders of motor vehicle licenses and any pertinent data compiled by the United States Bureau of the Census, in addition to the assessment rolls and voter registry lists presently used, in making up jury lists;
- —By increasing the daily allowance for jurors from \$5.00 to \$25.00;
- —By removing the ability of the county governing bodies to reduce the amount of the daily allowance for jurors;
- —By increasing the mileage rate for jurors from \$0.02 to \$0.10 per mile; and
- —By requiring that the Administrative Office of the Courts report to the Legislature annually on the operation of the jury system in New Jersey.

Juries chosen from a representative community sample are a fundamental component in our system of justice. However, the limitations on sources which jury commissioners may use in compiling prospective jury lists and the reluctance of citizens to serve on juries because of the financial sacrifice involved have greatly hampered the justice system's ability to get juries which truly reflect community standards. The purpose of this bill is to improve this situation by requiring the jury commissioners to select jurors from a single list composed of all registered voters and all holders of motor vehicle drivers' licenses in the county.

The committee deleted the section authorizing raises in jurors' fees and mileage because the raise was addressed in Assembly Bill No. 232, which has been released by the committee.

The bill also requires the Administrative Office of the Courts to monitor compliance with these provisions of the act, and to annually prepare and furnish to the Legislature, a report on the operation of the jury system in New Jersey.

Governor Brendan Byrne today signed the following bills in a public ceremony in his office:

A-159, sponsored by Assemblyman Alan Karcher (D-Middlesex) which gives county jury commissioners access to lists of registered drivers in their counties, in addition to voter registration lists, for use in jury selection.

The bill requires the Division of Motor Vehicles to compile lists of registered drivers by county of residence and make the lists available to county jury commissions.

Under prior law, jury commissions had access to assessment rolls and voter registration lists. Proponents of A-159 felt that these two lists did not provide as representative a community sample for jury duty as the justice system required. In addition, it was believed that the use of voter registration lists for jury selection worked against efforts to increase voter participation, since some people did not register to vote in order to avoid jury duty.

A-263, sponsored by Assemblyman Harold Martin (D-Bergen) which establishes a "Physician-Dentist Loan Redemption Program" to forgive up to 85% of the federal and state guaranteed loans of eligible graduates of the College of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey and Fairleigh Dickinson Dental School in exchange for medical services in areas designated as "medically underserved" by the State Commissioner of Health.

The purpose of the bill is to provide an incentive to young doctors and dentists to work in underserved areas and to encourage students who receive their medical training in New Jersey to remain in the state.

The state program will supplement a similar federal program, the National Health Services Program.
