An Act concerning the boundaries of the Passaic Valley Sewerage District, and amending R. S. 58:14-1.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State

- 1. R. S. 58:14-1 is amended to read as follows:
- 2 58:14-1. All that portion of Essex, Passaic, Bergen and Hudson
- 3 counties, beginning in the center of Newark bay where the boundary
- 4 line between the cities of Newark and Elizabeth meets the boundary
- 5 line between the counties of Essex and Hudson; thence running
- 6 westerly along the boundary line between the city of Newark and
- 7 the city of Elizabeth, running up Bound creek to the boundary line
- 8 between the township of Clinton and the city of Newark; thence
- 9 running westerly between the boundary line of the city of Newark
- 10 and the township of Clinton to the intersection of Clinton place
- 11 and Hawthorne avenue; thence running southerly still along said
- 12 boundary line to the center of Nye avenue; thence running westerly
- 13 along said center of Nye avenue to a point one hundred feet easterly
- 14 from Hobson street; thence running southerly parallel to Hobson
- 15 street and one hundred feet easterly therefrom to a point two
- 16 hundred feet northerly of Bragaw avenue; thence running west-
- 17 erly parallel with Bragaw avenue, and two hundred feet northerly
- 18 therefrom, to a point half way between Hobson street and Leslie
- 19 street; thence running southerly half way between said streets 20 to the center of Bragaw avenue; thence running westerly along the
- 21 center of Bragaw avenue to a point half way between Wainwright
- 22 street and Schley street; thence running northerly half way be-
- 23 tween said streets to a point three hundred feet northerly from
- 24 Bragaw avenue; thence running westerly parallel to Bragaw ave-

155 therefrom, to a point measuring southeasterly along said line five 156 thousand feet southeasterly from its intersection with the center line 157 of the New York and Greenwood Lake railroad: [thence running 158 southerly to a point in the Newark plank road, which point is one 159 thousand eigth hundred and fifty feet measuring easterly along said 160 plank road, from the center of the draw on said road over the Pas-161 saic river; thence running southerly to a point on the Newark and 162 New York railroad, which point is one thousand eight hundred and 163 fifty feet, measuring easterly along said railroad, from the center of 164 the draw over the Passaic river on said railroad; thence running 165 southerly in a prolongation of said last described course to its 166 intersection with the easterly boundary of the city of Newark in 167 Newark bay; thence running southerly along said boundary of the 168 city of Newark to the point of beginning thence running north-169 erly along the centerline of the New York and Greenwood Lake 170 railroad to its interesection with the northerly boundary line of 171 the town of Kearny, Hudson county; easterly along said boundary 172 line of the town of Secaucus, Hudson county, said point being the 173 center of the Hackensack river; thence southerly along the center-174 line of the Hackensack river and its extension until same intersects 175 the easterly boundary line of the city of Newark, Essex county, 176 said point being in the center of Newark bay; southerly along the 177 boundary line of the city of Newark to the point or place of begin-178 ning, constituted a sewerage district under the name and title of 179 Passaic Valley Sewerage District by the act entitled "An act to 180 create a sewerage district to be called Passaic Valley Sewerage 181 District," approved March 27, 1902 (L. 1902, c. 48, p. 190), as sup-182 plemented by the act approved April 14, 1914 (L. 1914, c. 160, p. 183 294), and by the act approved March 8, 1924 (L. 1924, c. 94, p. 184), 184 hereinafter in this chapter designated as the "district" and the 185 commission appointed thereunder, are continued, and it shall be 186 entitled to all the authority and be subject to all the laws of this 187 State concerning sewerage districts so created.

2. This act shall take effect immediately.

Governor Brendan Byrne today signed the following bills into law:

S-3016, sponsored by Senator Frank E. Rodgers (D-Hudson), which includes the entire town of Kearny within the Passaic Valley sewerage District.

Formerly, only portions of the town located along the Passaic River were included in the district, and the area of Kearny not within the district was served by an antiquated sewerage plant.

The bill is consistent with the recommendations of the Department of Environmental Protection's Northeast New Jersey Water Quality Management Plan.

S-3026, sponsored by Senator Joseph P. Merlino (D-Mercer), which directs school districts to test the hearing of each pupil under guidelines to be developed by the Department of Education in consultation with the Department of Health.

The bill also permits the hearing examination and general medical examination of pupils to be conducted by licensed medical and other health care personnel other than the medical examiner or the school nurse.

The measure is aimed at protecting pupils in school districts not currently conducting hearing tests, although the majority of districts are already testing pupils.

S-3071, sponsored by Senator Charles B. Yates (D-Burlington), which permits a child to be excused from portions of school classes with no penalties in terms of credits or graduation if the child's parent or guardian has signed a statement to the effect that that part of the instructions in health, family life education or sex education is in conflict with the parent's moral or religious beliefs.

The bill is entitled the "Parents Right to Conscience Act."

Under the measure, children whose parents or guardians objected would also be exempt from medical or physical examinations except as may be necessary to determine the existence of a physical handicap, the existence of a communicable disease or the hether the child was under the influence of a narcotic drug.
