An Act to amend "An act providing for the regulation of the transportation of bulk commodities in intrastate commerce, designating the Division of Motor Vehicles in the Department of Law and Public Safety to be responsible therefor, providing penalties for the violation thereof, and making an appropriation therefor," approved October 12, 1977 (P. L. 1977, c. 259).

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State
- 2 of New Jersey:
- 1 1. Section 3 of P. L. 1977, c. 259 (C. 39:5E-3) is amended to
- 2 read as follows:
- 3. The words and phrases used herein shall have the following
- 4 meaning:
- 5 a. "Person" means any individual, copartnership, association,
- 6 company, or corporation, and includes any trustee, receiver,
- 7 assignee, leasee, or personal representative of any person herein
- 8 defined.
- 9 b. "Director" means the Director of the Division of Motor
- 10 Vehicles in the Department of Law and Public Safety.
- c. "Hauler of bulk commodities" or "bulk commodity hauler"
- 12 means any common carrier or contract carrier as defined herein.
- d. "Motor vehicle" means any vehicle, machine, tractor, truck
- 14 trailer, or semi-trailer, or any combination thereof, propelled,
- 15 driven or drawn by mechanical power, and used upon the public
- 16 highways in the transportation of bulk commodities in intrastate
- 17 commerce defined herein.
- 18 e. "Intrastate commerce" means the shipment of property
- 19 wholly between points in this State, or at a single location, in
- 20 which the highways within or without this State are used by the
- 21 transporting motor vehicle.

EXPLANATION—Matter enclosed in bold-faced brackets [thus] in the above bill is not enacted and is intended to be omitted in the law.

- 22 f. "Public highway" or "highway" means any public street,

- 26 g. "Bulk commodities" means liquids or gases, not in containers,

P. L. 1977, c. 259, cited as the "Bulk Commodities Transportation Act" provides for regulation by the Director of the Division of Motor Vehicles of the transportation of bulk commodities in intrastate commerce. The purpose of this bill is to exempt from such regulation solid waste haulers who are already regulated by the Board of Public Utilities and the Department of Environmental Protection.

The Division of Motor Vehicles supports this bill.

### STATE OF NEW JERSEY

DATED: JUNE 14, 1979

As amended by the committee, this legislation exempts from the definition of "bulk commodities" waste liquids and dry bulk waste not in containers. Such wastes include garbage, refuse and other discarded materials.

The "Bulk Commodities Transportation Act" provides for the regulation by the Director of the Division of Motor Vehicles of the transportation of bulk commodities in intrastate commerce. This bill would exempt such waste haulers from such regulation.

This bill takes effect 60 days after enactment.

A-887, sponsored by former Assemblyman Peter Shapiro (D-Essex), which removes the current \$7,500 salary ceiling on the position of councilman's aide and allows the salary to be determined by municipal ordinance in certain municipalities.

A-1115, sponsored by Assemblyman Donald H. Stewart (D-Gloucester), which amends the law concerning the liquidation and rehabilitation of insolvent insurers. This bill establishes the priorities to be followed in a liquidation proceeding.

This bill establishes priorities as follows:

- (1) expenses of administration
- (2) employee claims authorized by current law;
- (3) governmental claims secured by perfected liens;
- (4) claims by insureds and by the New Jersey Property-Liability Insurance

  Guaranty Association and similar organizations in other states; and
- (5) all other claims.

S-3162, sponsored by Senator Eugene J. Bedell (D-Monmouth) which amends the "Bulk Commodities Transportation Act of 1977" to exempt solid waste haulers from its regulation.

The 1977 act empowered the Division of Motor Vehicles to regulate the transportation of bulk commodities in intrastate commerce. The collection, transportation and disposal of solid waste is thoroughly regulated by both the Board of Public Utilities and the Department of Environmental Protection.

<u>S-3250</u>, also sponsored by Senator Bedell, which amends the "Local Public Contracts Law".

Under the law, a contractor may elect to deposit negotiable bearer bonds on projects for municipalities which exceed a price of \$100,000 or he can elect to permit the withholding of case payments by the municipality.
