- An Act authorizing municipalities to expend certain Federal funds for historic places or sites owned by certain nonprofit corporations or associations under certain circumstances.
- 1 BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State
- 2 of New Jersey:1 1. Any municipality

1. Any municipality may expend public funds received by the municipality under the Housing and Community Development Act 2 of 1974, 42 U. S. C. 5303-5317 (1974), as amended, for, or in aid 3 of, the preservation, restoration, improvement, or rehabilitation 4 5of a historic place or site owned by a nonprofit corporation or association organized pursuant to Title 15 or 16 of the Revised 6 Statutes, if the historic place or site has been approved for in-7 clusion in the New Jersey Register of Historic Places in the 8 Division of Parks, Forestry and Recreation of the Department of 9 Environmental Protection under P. L. 1970, c. 268 (C. 13:1B-15.128 10 11 et seq.).

1 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

STATEMENT

This bill will allow a limited amount of U.S. Housing and Community Development Act funds to be spent by New Jersey municipalities to rehabilitate historic buildings owned by nonprofit corporations. Currently, there is no statutory authorization within New Jersey for such expenditure. HCDA funds have already been allocated for this purpose after an extensive Federal review process and public hearings, and are now in danger of lapsing unless specifically authorized by New Jersey statute. The expenditure of these funds will go toward rehabilitating designated historic structures, particularly in urban areas, which currently house social service programs and other nonprofit activities.

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Governor Brendan Byrne has signed the following bills:

<u>S-3369</u>, sponsored by Senator Alexander Meuza (U-Union), which appropriates \$10,000 to cover the expenses of the "No-Fault Automobile Insurance Study Commission."

The Commission, created by SCR-68 in May, 1977, studied New Jersey's No-Fault Automobile Insurance Act.

<u>A-3620</u>, sponsored by Assemblyman Joseph Papasidero (D-Essex), which will allow a limited amount of U. S. Housing and Community Development funds to be spent by New Jersey municipalities, particularly urban municipalities, to rehabilitate historic buildings owned by non-profit corporations.

The bill provides the statutory authorization within New Jersey for such expenditures.

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
