This bill concerns approximately fourteen towns out of 567 municipalities within the State. It is permissive legislation and provides an alternate method for increasing compensation in those towns affected.

AN ACT concerning the compensation paid to the mayor and members of the governing body in certain towns, and supplementing Title 40 of the Revised Statutes.

1 BE IT ENACTED *by the Senate and General Assembly of the State*
2 *of New Jersey:*

1 1. In any town **in any county of the first class** with a popula-
1A tion in excess of 11,500 ***[residents]*** **but less than 40,000**
2 according to the 1970 Federal Census, the governing body may by
3 ordinance fix the compensation of the mayor at a sum not to
4 exceed \$2,500.00 per annum, and fix the compensation of each
5 member of the governing body at a sum not to exceed \$1,500.00 per
6 annum. This act shall not be construed so as to reduce the compen-
7 sation of the mayor or members of the governing body of any town
8 nor shall it prevent the governing body of any town from proceed-
9 ing to fix compensation pursuant to any other applicable law.

1 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

EXPLANATION—Matter enclosed in bold-faced brackets [thus] in the above bill is not enacted and is intended to be omitted in the law.

Assembly Bill No. 2105 would provide that the governing body of any town with a population in excess of 11,500 may fix the compensation of the mayor at up to \$2,500.00, and the compensation of the members of the governing body at up to \$1,500.00. The bill provides that the bill shall not be construed so as to reduce the compensation paid to any mayor or governing body member, or to preclude governing bodies from fixing compensation pursuant to any other applicable law.

Since this is permissive legislation, the committee decided to release this bill. However, the committee decided to amend the bill in such manner as to reduce the number of municipalities the bill would conceivably affect from 14 municipalities, to five municipalities. The bill, as amended, would apply to Kearny, Secaucus, and Harrison in Hudson county and Belleville and Nutley in Essex county.
