Expenditures to establish the Office of Ombudsman for Individuals with Intellectual or Developmental Disabilities and their Families will vary depending upon the design, operation, and implementation of the office. Experience of similar offices indicate that the cost may range between \$150,000 and \$1.9 million annually.

The bill directs the Governor to appoint an Ombudsman for Individuals with Intellectual or Developmental Disabilities and their Families, who is to be qualified by training and experience to perform the duties of the office, and be a person of recognized judgment, integrity, and objectivity who is skilled in communication, conflict resolution, and professionalism. The bill calls for the ombudsman to organize and direct the work of the office, including the work of such professional and clerical staff as may be necessary to carry out the ombudsman's duties.

The bill provides that the duties of the ombudsman include, but are not limited to, the following:

- (1) to serve as a source of information for individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities and their families and interested members of the public, to help them better understand State and federal laws and regulations governing individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities;
- (2) to provide, in coordination with the State Council on Developmental Disabilities: (a) information and support to individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities and their families in navigating and understanding the process for obtaining services and supports from the Division of Developmental Disabilities (DDD) in the Department of Human Services (DHS) and the Division of Children's System of Care (CSOC) in the Department of Children and Families (DCF); and (b) assistance in obtaining from CSOC or DDD, as appropriate, services, supports, and opportunities that focus on personal goals and help those goals become a reality;
- (3) to provide information and communication strategies with regard to resolution of a disagreement with CSOC, DDD, DCF, or DHS regarding the evaluation, placement, or provision of services and supports to an individual with an intellectual or developmental disability; and to educate individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities and their families on the available options for resolving these disputes;

- (4) to work neutrally and objectively to help ensure that a fair process is followed in the resolution of disputes concerning the provision of supports and services to individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities receiving services from CSOC or DDD;
- (5) to identify patterns of complaints regarding rights and services of individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities, and to recommend strategies for improvements; and
- (6) to assist CSOC and DDD in creating public information programs designed to acquaint and educate individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities, their families, and the public about the duties of the ombudsman.

The bill requires communications received in the course of the ombudsman's duties to be kept confidential, except when disclosure is necessary to enable the ombudsman to perform the duties of the office and consent for disclosure is obtained.

The bill requires the ombudsman to issue a written report annually to the Commissioner of Human Services and the Commissioner of Children and Families. The bill specifies that the report is to include a summary of the services the ombudsman provided during the year, and any specific recommendations the ombudsman deems appropriate and necessary concerning the implementation of procedures with respect to providing individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities with services and supports. The bill also requires the report to be issued to the Governor and the Legislature.

As reported, this bill is identical to Senate Bill No. 2392/2472 (SCS), as also reported by the committee.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The Office of Legislative Services (OLS) estimates the bill will result in an indeterminate increase in annual State expenditures to establish and operate the Office of the Ombudsman for Individuals with Intellectual or Developmental Disabilities and their Families.

The position count and expenditures of the office will largely depend on the office's organizational structure, caseload, and the nature of any collaboration with any existing programs and organizations tasked with protecting and advocating the rights of individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities. The OLS, however, has no information that allows for a forecast of the office's likely caseload, organizational structure, operations, and staffing level.

FISCAL ANALYSIS

EXECUTIVE BRANCH

OFFICE OF LEGISLATIVE SERVICES

The OLS is not able to quantify the cost of this bill with any certainty, but the experience of similar offices operating in the State indicate that this bill may result in expenditures of between \$150,000 and \$1.9 million annually.

The bill requires the Governor to appoint an ombudsman for the office and delineates the duties of the ombudsman, but the actual cost to implement this bill will largely depend on the design, operation, and implementation of the office. The OLS is not able to predict the level of activity of the office, but can provide a range of costs to establish the office by analyzing similar offices and their costs.

The OLS estimates that the cost to employ an ombudsman and run a more limited program which will act as an advocate for, and provide information to, families and individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities will be approximately \$150,000. This estimate includes salary and benefits for the ombudsman and part time support staff. Additionally, the OLS assumes that the costs to rent office space, purchase materials and supplies, conduct basic activities, and compile and issue an annual report will equal approximately \$30,000 annually.

However, the OLS notes that in subsections (4) and (5) of the bill, the ombudsman is directed to work with all parties to help ensure that a fair process is followed in the resolution of disputes concerning the provision of services and supports to individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities receiving services from the CSOC or DDD; and to identify any patterns of complaints which emerge regarding rights and services of individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities and to recommend strategies for improvement.

These two activities could result in increased costs similar to the expenditures currently provided for the Office of the Ombudsman for the Institutionalized Elderly (OOIE), which conducts similar activities. In the FY 2017 Budget Recommendation, the OOIE is authorized \$3.068 million, \$1.141 million of which is federal funds (pages D-411 to D-413). The OLS estimates that if the office is implemented to be an active part of dispute resolutions and complaint collection the costs to operate the office could be approximately \$1.9 million, but this cost cannot be determined with any certainty due to a lack of data on the planned implementation of the office.

However, the OLS further notes that there are currently programs in existence in the State which are already tasked with protecting and advocating with, and on behalf of, individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities. These programs are: Disability Rights New Jersey; the New Jersey Boggs Center on Developmental Disabilities at Rutgers University; and the State Council on Developmental Disabilities. The bill specifically requires the office to work in coordination with the State Council on Developmental Disabilities to provide services and thus the office may receive part of the council's current \$1.183 million appropriation (page D-202 of the FY 2017 Budget Recommendation). The activities of these programs could supplant the activities of the office and result in reduced costs for the office. However, the amount to which the council's budget and the activities of the other programs will support the office's required duties cannot be determined with any certainty without further details on the planned implementation of the office.

This bill establishes the Office of the Ombudsman for Individuals with Intellectual or Developmental Disabilities and their Families in but not of the Department of the Treasury.

The bill directs the Governor to appoint an Ombudsman for Individuals with Intellectual or Developmental Disabilities and their Families, who is to be qualified by training and experience to perform the duties of the office, and be a person of recognized judgment, integrity, and objectivity who is skilled in communication, conflict resolution, and professionalism. The bill calls for the ombudsman to organize and direct the work of the office, including the work of such professional and clerical staff as may be necessary to carry out the ombudsman's duties.

The bill provides that the duties of the ombudsman include, but are not limited to, the following:

- (1) to serve as a source of information for individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities and their families and interested members of the public, to help them better understand State and federal laws and regulations governing individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities;
- (2) to provide, in coordination with the State Council on Developmental Disabilities: (a) information and support to individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities and their families in navigating and understanding the process for obtaining services and supports from the Division of Developmental Disabilities (DDD) in the Department of Human Services (DHS) and the Division of Children's System of Care (CSOC) in the Department of Children and Families (DCF); and (b) assistance in obtaining from CSOC or DDD, as appropriate, services, supports, and opportunities that focus on personal goals and help those goals become a reality;
- (3) to provide information and communication strategies with regard to resolution of a disagreement with CSOC, DDD, DCF, or DHS regarding the evaluation, placement, or provision of services and supports to an individual with an intellectual or developmental disability; and to educate individuals with intellectual or

developmental disabilities and their families on the available options for resolving these disputes;

- (4) to work neutrally and objectively to help ensure that a fair process is followed in the resolution of disputes concerning the provision of supports and services to individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities receiving services from CSOC or DDD;
- (5) to identify patterns of complaints regarding rights and services of individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities, and to recommend strategies for improvements; and
- (6) to assist CSOC and DDD in creating public information programs designed to acquaint and educate individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities, their families, and the public about the duties of the ombudsman.

The bill requires communications received in the course of the ombudsman's duties to be kept confidential, except when disclosure is necessary to enable the ombudsman to perform the duties of the office and consent for disclosure is obtained.

The bill requires the ombudsman to issue a written report annually to the Commissioner of Human Services and the Commissioner of Children and Families. The bill specifies that the report is to include a summary of the services the ombudsman provided during the year, and any specific recommendations the ombudsman deems appropriate and necessary concerning the implementation of procedures with respect to providing individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities with services and supports. The bill also requires the report to be issued to the Governor and the Legislature.

As reported, this bill is identical to Assembly Bill No. 3824, as also reported by the committee.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The Office of Legislative Services (OLS) estimates the bill will result in an indeterminate increase in annual State expenditures to establish and operate the Office of the Ombudsman for Individuals with Intellectual or Developmental Disabilities and their Families.

The Governor would appoint an ombudsman to organize and direct the work of the office, including the work of any professional or clerical staff. The ombudsman's duties would include:

1) to serve as a source of information for individuals with intellectual or developmental



disabilities and their families and interested members of the public, to help them better understand State and federal laws and regulations governing individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities; 2) to provide, in coordination with the State Council on Developmental Disabilities: information and support to individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities and their families in navigating and understanding the process for obtaining services and supports from the Division of Developmental Disabilities (DDD) in the Department of Human Services (DHS) and the Division of Children's System of Care (CSOC) in the Department of Children and Families (DCF); and assistance in obtaining from CSOC or DDD services, supports, and opportunities that focus on realizing personal goals; 3) to provide information and communication strategies with regard to resolution of a disagreement with CSOC, DDD, DCF, or DHS regarding the evaluation, placement, or provision of services and supports to an individual with an intellectual or developmental disability; and to educate individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities and their families on the available options for resolving these disputes; 4) to help ensure that a fair process is followed in the resolution of disputes concerning the provision of supports and services to individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities receiving services from CSOC or DDD; 5) to identify patterns of complaints regarding rights and services of individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities, and to recommend strategies for improvements; and 6) to assist CSOC and DDD in creating public information programs designed to educate individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities, their families, and the public about the duties of the ombudsman.

The bill requires the ombudsman to issue a written report annually to the DHS, DCF, Governor, and Legislature. The report would include a summary of the services the ombudsman provided during the year and any recommendations the ombudsman deems appropriate and necessary concerning the implementation of procedures with respect to providing individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities with services and supports.

AN ACT establishing the Office of the Ombudsman for Navigating
Services and Supports for Individuals with Intellectual or
Developmental Disabilities and supplementing Title 30 of the
Revised Statutes.

BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

- There is established in but not of the Department of the Treasury the Office of the Ombudsman for Navigating Services and Supports for Individuals with Intellectual or Developmental Disabilities. For the purpose of complying with the provisions of Article V, Section IV, paragraph 1 of the New Jersey Constitution, the Office of the Ombudsman for Navigating Services and Supports for Individuals with Intellectual or Developmental Disabilities is hereby allocated within the Department of the Treasury, but notwithstanding this allocation, the office shall be independent of any supervision or control by the department or any board or officer thereof, or any other cabinet-level department, board, or officer thereof. The purpose of the ombudsman is to assist individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities and their families or guardians, as appropriate, to navigate the various systems for services and supports available to these individuals, including, but not limited to, those for health care, transportation, housing and employment, and any financial assistance available to secure these services and supports.
 - b. The Governor shall appoint an Ombudsman for Navigating Services and Supports for Individuals with Intellectual or Developmental Disabilities who shall be qualified by training and experience to perform the duties of the office. The ombudsman shall be a person of recognized judgment, integrity and objectivity, and shall be skilled in communication and professionalism.
 - c. The ombudsman shall organize and direct the work of the office, including the work of professional and clerical staff as may be necessary to carry out the ombudsman's duties.

- 2. a. The duties of the Office of the Ombudsman for Navigating Services and Supports for Individuals with Intellectual or Developmental Disabilities shall include, but not be limited to, the following:
- (1) to serve as a source of information for individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities and their families or guardians and help them better understand available services and supports for health care, transportation, housing and employment, and any financial assistance available to secure these services and supports;
- (2) to provide information and support to individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities and their families or guardians in understanding and navigating the process for obtaining these services and supports; and

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- (3) to assist the Division of Developmental Disabilities in the Department of Human Services in providing informational programs designed to acquaint and educate individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities and their families or guardians, as appropriate, and the public about the duties of the ombudsman.
- b. The ombudsman shall coordinate its duties with other federal or State entities authorized to provide services or supports to individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities, as necessary to help these individuals navigate the systems for obtaining services, supports, and financial assistance.
- c. The ombudsman shall treat communications received in the course of the ombudsman's duties, including personally identifiable information regarding individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities and their families or guardians, and others from whom information is acquired, as confidential, except when disclosure is necessary to enable the ombudsman to perform the duties of the office and consent for disclosure is obtained. Upon receipt of information that by law is confidential or privileged, the ombudsman shall maintain the confidentiality of the information and shall not disclose or disseminate the information except as provided by applicable State or federal law.

3. a. The Office of the Ombudsman for Navigating Services and Supports for Individuals with Intellectual or Developmental Disabilities shall issue a written annual report to the Commissioners of Human Services, Children and Families, Labor and Workforce Development, and Community Affairs, and to the Executive Director of New Jersey Transit, which includes a summary of the services the ombudsman provided during the year, and any recommendations the ombudsman deems appropriate and necessary concerning the navigation of systems that provide services or supports to individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities in the State.

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b. The ombudsman also shall issue the report prepared pursuant to subsection a. of this section to the Governor, and pursuant to section 2 of P.L.1991, c.164 (C.52:14-19.1), to the Legislature.

4. This act shall take effect immediately.

STATEMENT

This bill establishes the Office of the Ombudsman for Navigating Services and Supports for Individuals with Intellectual or Developmental Disabilities. The ombudsman is to assist individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities and their families or guardians, as appropriate, to navigate the various systems for services and supports available for these individuals, including, but not limited to, those for health care, transportation, housing and employment, and any financial assistance available to secure these

services and supports. The Governor would appoint the ombudsman, who is to be qualified by training and experience to perform the duties of the office, and be a person of recognized judgment, integrity, and objectivity.

The duties of the ombudsman are to: serve as a source of information for individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities and their families or guardians and help them better understand available services and supports for health care, transportation, housing and employment, and any financial assistance available to secure these services and supports; provide information and support in understanding and navigating the process for obtaining these services and supports; and assist the Division of Developmental Disabilities in the Department of Human Services in providing informational programs to acquaint and educate individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities, their families or guardians, and the public about the duties of the ombudsman.

The office also is required to coordinate its duties with other federal or State entities authorized to provide services or supports to individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities, as necessary to help these individuals navigate the systems for obtaining services and supports.

The bill further requires that communications be kept confidential, except when disclosure is necessary to perform the duties of the office and consent is obtained for disclosure. The ombudsman is to issue an annual report to the Commissioners of Human Services, Children and Families, Labor and Workforce Development, and Community Affairs, and to the Executive Director of New Jersey Transit on the services provided by the office, and include recommendations the ombudsman deems appropriate and necessary concerning the navigation of systems that provide services and supports to individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities.
