1 AN ACT concerning parking and supplementing Title 39 of the Revised Statutes.

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BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

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1. a. As used in this act:

"Health or personal care services" means nursing and other home health care services rendered at a patient's place of residence.

b. The Chief Administrator of the New Jersey Motor Vehicle Commission shall issue upon application parking placards to home care service agencies indicating that a motor vehicle is being operated by a home care service employee. The placards shall be distributed by the home care service agencies to their home care service employees who render health or personal care services. A home care service agency applying for the placards shall submit to the commission a copy of the agency's license or ³[other credentials] issued by the Department of Health or ³registered with the ³ Division of Consumer Affairs in the Department of Law and Public Safety. The commission shall take action within 30 days of

- The In order to receive the benefits set forth in this subsection, as applicable, the³ placard shall be displayed on a motor vehicle operated by a home care service employee when 3the vehicle is parked while the employee is a rendering health or personal care services ³[and] or ³ while ³the employee is ³ traveling to render health or personal care services. ³ [The] When displayed as authorized pursuant to this subsection, the³ placard shall entitle the ¹home care service ¹ employee:
 - (1) to park the motor vehicle in on-street areas that are generally reserved for municipal residents, municipal parking lots, and college and university parking lots;

- (2) to park overnight in on-street areas that are generally reserved for municipal residents, municipal parking lots, and college and university parking lots when overnight parking is prohibited;

BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

1. a. As used in this act:

"Health or personal care services" means nursing and other home health care services rendered at a patient's place of residence.

"Home care service agency" means a home health care agency licensed pursuant to P.L.1971, c.136 (C.26:2H-1 et seq.), a health care service firm registered pursuant to N.J.A.C.13:45B-14.1 et seq., or a Medicare-certified hospice program.

"Home care service employee" means a nurse, nurse aide, homemaker-home health aide, or personal care assistant licensed or certified pursuant to Title 45 of the Revised Statutes or a hospice care worker licensed pursuant to section 2 of P.L.1997, c.78 (C.26:2H-80) who provides at home health or personal care services.

- b. The Chief Administrator of the New Jersey Motor Vehicle Commission shall issue upon application parking placards to home care service agencies indicating that a motor vehicle is being operated by a home care service employee. The placards shall be distributed by the home care service agencies to their home care service employees who render health or personal care services. A home care service agency applying for the placards shall submit to the commission a copy of the agency's license or other credentials issued by the Department of Health or Division of Consumer Affairs in the Department of Law and Public Safety. The commission shall take action within 30 days of receiving the application.
- c. The placard shall be displayed on a motor vehicle operated by a home care service employee when rendering health or personal care services and while traveling to render health or personal care services. The placard shall entitle the employee:

The placards would entitle the home care service employees to park their motor vehicles in on-street areas that are generally reserved for municipal

residents and in municipal parking lots and college and university parking lots. The home care service employees also would be entitled to park in these areas overnight. In addition, the permit would entitle the home care service employees to travel on roads which are designated by a municipality as being reserved for municipal residents during certain times when traffic volume is high and to park overtime at metered parking when rendering health or personal care services. The bill specifically applies to the following employees licensed or certified under Title 45 of the Revised Statutes: nurses, nurse aides, homemaker-home health aides, or personal care assistants, and hospice care workers licensed under Title 26 of the Revised Statutes.

In addition, the permit entitles the home care service employees to travel on roads which are designated by a municipality as being reserved for municipal residents during certain times when traffic volume is high and to park overtime at metered parking when rendering health or personal care services.

The bill establishes an additional penalty for a home care service employee who improperly uses the placard of \$250 for the first offense and \$250 and up to 90 days community for each subsequent offense.

The committee amended the bill to increase the penalty for the misuse of the parking placards from a fine of \$100 to a fine of \$250 for the first offense and a fine of \$250 and up to 90 days of community service for each subsequent offense. The amendments also provide that the bill is to take effect on the first day of the 19th month following enactment instead of the first day of the eighth month following enactment. Lastly, the amendments provide corrections to statutory and regulatory references in the bill.

As amended and reported by the committee, Assembly Bill No. 3683 (1R) is identical to Senate Bill No. 2416 which was also amended and reported by the committee on this date.

The placards would entitle the home care service employees to park their motor vehicles in on-street areas that are generally reserved for municipal

residents and in municipal parking lots and college and university parking lots. The home care service employees also would be entitled to park in these areas overnight. In addition, the permit would entitle the home care service employees to travel on roads which are designated by a municipality as being reserved for municipal residents during certain times when traffic volume is high and to park overtime at metered parking when rendering health or personal care services. The bill specifically applies to the following employees licensed or certified under Title 45 of the Revised Statutes: nurses, nurse aides, homemaker-home health aides, or personal care assistants, and hospice care workers licensed under Title 26 of the Revised Statutes.

Under the bill, the MVC would issue the placards to home care service agencies which would then distribute the placards to their employees who qualify as home care service employees. A home care service agency applying for the placards would be required to submit a copy of agency's license or other credentials issued by the Department of Health or Division of Consumer Affairs in the Department of Law and Public Safety. The bill requires the MVC to take action within 30 days of receiving a home care service agency's application.

The placard would be valid for one year, but would be renewable for as long as the home care service agency continues to render health or personal care services to patients in their private residences. The bill allows the MVC to establish a one-time registration fee of \$50 or less for each parking placard issued. A home care service agency would not be required to pay a fee when renewing the placards.

The bill requires the placards to display a unique identifying number which would be recorded by MVC and maintained in a central registry. A home care service employee who receives a placard would be required to submit to the home care service agency a copy of the employee's driver's license. The home care service agency would be required to use the identifying numbers on the placards and employee driver's license numbers to maintain a record of placards assigned to the agency's employees.

The bill also requires home care service employees to return the placard to the home care service agency upon termination of employment. A home care service employee who fails to return the placard within 30 days of termination of employment would be fined \$100 by the MVC. The bill establishes an additional \$100 fine to be imposed on a home care service employee who improperly uses the placard.

The Senate Transportation Committee reports favorably and with committee amendments Senate Bill No. 2416.

As amended and reported, this bill requires the New Jersey Motor Vehicle Commission (MVC) to issue a placard to authorize parking privileges for home care service employees who render care at a patient's home. The bill specifically applies to the following employees licensed or certified under Title 26 or Title 45 of the Revised Statutes: nurses, nurse aides, homemaker-home health aides, personal care assistants, physical therapists, occupational therapists, speech-language pathologists, social workers, and hospice care workers.

Under the bill, the placards entitle the home care service employees to park their motor vehicles in on-street areas that are generally reserved for municipal residents, in municipal parking lots, and in college and university parking lots. The home care service employees are also entitled to park in these areas overnight when overnight parking is prohibited. In addition, the permit entitles the home care service employees to travel on roads which are designated by a municipality as being reserved for municipal residents during certain times when traffic volume is high and to park overtime at metered parking when rendering health or personal care services.

Under the bill, the MVC is to issue the placards to home care service agencies which are to then distribute the placards to their employees who qualify as home care service employees. A home care service agency applying for the placards is to submit a copy of the agency's license or other credentials issued by the Department of Health or Division of Consumer Affairs in the Department of Law and Public Safety. The bill requires the MVC to take action within 30 days of receiving a home care service agency's application.

The placard is to be valid for one year, but may be renewed for as long as the home care service agency continues to render health or personal care services to patients in their private residences. The bill allows the MVC to establish a one-time registration fee of not more than \$50 for each parking placard issued. A home care service agency is not required to pay a fee when renewing the placards.

The bill requires the placards to display a unique identifying number which is to be recorded by the MVC and maintained in a central registry. A home care service employee who receives a placard is required to submit to the home care service agency a copy of the employee's driver's license. The home care service agency is required to use the identifying numbers on the placards and employee driver's license numbers to maintain a record of placards assigned to the agency's employees.

The bill requires home care service employees to return the placard to the home care service agency upon termination of employment. A home care service employee who fails to return the placard within 30 days of termination of employment is to be fined \$100 by the MVC. The bill establishes an additional penalty for a home care service employee who improperly uses the placard of \$250 for the first offense and \$250 and up to 90 days community for each subsequent offense.

The committee amended the bill to include physical therapists, occupational therapists, speech-language pathologists, and social workers as home care service employees covered under the bill. The amendments increase the penalty for the misuse of the parking placards from a fine of \$100 to a fine of \$250 for the first offense and a fine of \$250 and up to 90 days of community service for each subsequent offense. The amendments also provide that the bill is to take effect on the first day of the 19th month following enactment instead of the first day of the eighth month following enactment. Lastly, the amendments also provide corrections to statutory and regulatory references in the bill.

As amended and reported by the committee, Senate Bill No. 2416 is identical to Assembly Bill No. 3683 (1R) which was also amended and reported by the committee on this date.

ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 3683 (Second Reprint)

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the New Jersey Constitution, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 3683 (Second Reprint) with my recommendations for reconsideration.

We are fortunate to have dedicated health and personal care professionals, who travel to patients' homes to perform support services that are often critical to the health, well-being and quality of life of some of our State's most vulnerable citizens, often under difficult conditions and in physically and emotionally demanding circumstances. These services are especially valuable to our aging population, who may be subject to limitations on their mobility such that they are unable to easily commute to and from a hospital or doctor's office, or require medical and personal assistance simply to get through a day at home. To provide treatment and care, home care service agencies deploy hard-working, trained professionals who do not utilize emergency service vehicles. Rather, these home care service employees drive unmarked, non-emergency vehicles that are subject to normal parking restrictions, even in areas where parking is very limited.

In densely populated areas of the State, patients in need often suffer from delayed service and limited treatment because health care service employees are unable to park their vehicles anywhere near the patient's home, or must truncate the provision of services to feed the meter or move their vehicles. This bill seeks to alleviate some of these concerns and I commend the sponsors for creatively addressing the issue.

While it is important to ensure that home care service employees are able to more readily provide services to those in need by removing practical obstacles such as travel and parking restrictions that would otherwise interfere with or unduly burden the delivery of these muchneeded services, we can accomplish that result without creating undue

administrative burdens and while limiting opportunities for abuse of this salutary program. Accordingly, I am recommending sensible changes to the bill that will address some of the concerns articulated by the State's Motor Vehicle Commission ("MVC"). The bill tasks the MVC with the responsibility for creating and administering the new placard program, but does not provide sufficient resources for that purpose. As such, I am recommending that a renewal fee be implemented to offset the costs associated with launching a new program within the MVC. Additionally, the bill should include safeguards to minimize misuse of the placards and prevent fraud that would compromise the entire program and its successful implementation. To enable more effective enforcement and reduce the potential for abuse, I am suggesting certain changes that will require better information-sharing and reporting by home care service agencies, tighten up the procedural protections, and strengthen compliance.

Accordingly, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 3683 (Second Reprint) and recommend that it be amended as follows:
