The bill provides that the Commissioner of Health designate, in consultation with the Commissioner of Human Services, on the basis of health status and economic indicators, geographic areas of the State which have a shortage of physicians in the specialty of psychiatry, and that the Commissioner of Human Services indicate the State psychiatric hospitals that have a shortage of psychiatrists. The program will provide reimbursement of a portion of medical school tuition expenses to psychiatrists who agree to provide mental health care services in one of these State underserved areas or State psychiatric hospitals for a period of one to four years. Program participants must: (1) be State residents; (2) be State-licensed physicians who have completed all educational and residency training requirements for the practice of psychiatry; and (3) apply for the program within one year of completing an accredited residency program in psychiatry or an accredited fellowship in child and adolescent psychiatry.

The bill provides that program participants enter into a contract with the Higher Education Student Assistance Authority (HESAA) for a specified number of one-year periods of service, up to four years, in which the participant agrees to engage in the full-time practice of psychiatry in a State underserved area or a State psychiatric hospital. In return for this commitment, a portion of the participant's tuition expenses in attending medical school will be reimbursed. Tuition reimbursement will equal 25 percent of the participant's eligible tuition expenses for the one academic year of medical school attendance in which tuition was the lowest, in return for each full year of service under the program. The maximum total tuition reimbursement for a participant's eligible tuition expenses for the one academic years of service will be 100 percent of the participant's eligible tuition expenses for the one academic year of medical school attendance in which tuition was the lowest.

The bill requires that a participant in the program serving in a State designated underserved area adhere to certain terms and standards, including charging for professional services at the usual and customary rates, allowing patients who are unable to pay that charge to pay a reduced rate or receive care at no charge, and not discriminating against any patient on the basis of ability to pay. All program participants will be required to maintain their State residency and medical license, remain current with payments on any student loans, maintain satisfactory performance of services, and report to HESAA on the performance of services rendered prior to receiving tuition reimbursement.

As amended and reported, this bill is identical to Assembly Bill No. 3962, as also amended and reported by the committee.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The Office of Legislative services is not able to provide an estimate of the costs of tuition reimbursement payments under the program. Program costs will be dependent upon the number of physicians with a specialty in psychiatry who apply to participate in the program, the amount of tuition for the one academic year of medical school attendance in which tuition was the lowest for each program participant, and the number of years in which a physician participates in the program.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS:

The amendments 1) allow a psychiatrist who is working in a State psychiatric hospital to participate in the tuition reimbursement program; 2) provide that the Commissioner of Health will consult with the Commissioner of Human Services in the designation of State underserved areas; 3) direct the Commissioner of Human Services to transmit a list to the authority of the State psychiatric hospitals and the projected number of psychiatrists needed in each hospital; and 4) provide that a psychiatrist may also apply for the tuition reimbursement program within one year of completing an accredited fellowship in child and adolescent psychiatry. The bill in its original form required a psychiatrist to apply within one year of completing an accredited residency training program in psychiatry.

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Governor Christie Takes Action on Pending Legislation

Trenton, NJ – Governor Chris Christie today took action on dozens of bills, including S-359/A-2320 (Codey, Vitale/Vainieri Huttle, Conaway, Jimenez, Lampitt, Jasey, Sumter), which raises the minimum age from 19 to 21 of a person to whom a vendor may sell, offer for sale, distribute, give or furnish tobacco products in New Jersey. This new law also amends various related statues concerning penalties, fines, signage requirements, non-face-to-face transactions, and enforcement provisions to reflect the increased minimum age.

"By raising the minimum age to purchase tobacco products to 21, we are giving young people more time to develop a maturity and better understanding of how dangerous smoking can be and that it is better to not start smoking in the first place," Governor Christie said. "My mother died from the effects of smoking, and no one should lose their life due to any addictive substance. Additionally, the less people who develop costly tobacco habits that can cause health problems, such as lung cancer, heart disease and developmental issues, the less strain there will be on our healthcare system."

Further Addressing the Opioid Epidemic

Governor Christie signed four bills that continue New Jersey's leadership role in fighting the national opioid epidemic. The legislation that requires the Department of Human Services develop, maintain, and post on their website daily information about the number of open beds available in facilities in the state for people in need of mental health or substance use disorder treatment; help inform parents of student athletes and cheerleaders about the use and misuse of prescription opioids; allows hospice programs to accept the unused prescription medicines of their hospice patients for safe disposal and implements the use of current-day, sensitive terminology when referring to persons with substance use disorders or certain disabilities.
