Senate Bill No. 381 concerns wages paid to policemen and firemen for emergency duty. Section 1 of this bill amends N. J. S. 40A:14-50 so as to provide a municipality the additional option of paying firemen of a paid or part-paid fire department for emergency duty at the rate of $1\frac{1}{2}$ times his prevailing hourly wage.

Section 2 amends N. J. S. 40:14-134 so as to apply these same provisions to policemen who are called upon for emergency duty. The amendments to these two sections would allow a municipality to adopt a third schedule of compensation for emergency duty. Presently, the available forms are: payment at the prevailing wage or compensatory time off.

AN ACT concerning emergency service by municipal firemen and policemen, and amending sections 40A:14-50 and 40A:14-134 of the New Jersey Statutes.

1 BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State 2 of New Jersey:

1 1. N. J. S. 40A:14-50 is amended to read as follows:

40A:14-50. "Emergency" as used herein shall include any un- $\mathbf{2}$ usual conditions caused by any circumstances or situation including $\mathbf{3}$ shortages in the personnel of the paid or part-paid fire department 4 and force caused by vacancies, sickness or injury, or by the taking of 5--6 accrued vacation or sick leave or both, whereby the safety of the 7 public is endangered or imperiled, as shall be determined within the 8 sole discretion of the officer, board or official having charge of the 9 paid or part-paid fire department and force in any municipality. 10

In any municipality in which the officer, board or official having 11 charge or control of the paid or part-paid fire department and 12 force has authority, in times of any such emergency to summon 13and keep on duty any paid members of the paid or part-paid fire 14 department and force for a period or periods of time[or times] in 15 excess of the hours of ordinary duty, the governing body may pro-16vide compensation for some or all of such emergency duty by any 17 $\mathbf{18}$ such fireman at his prevailing wage, or at a rate not in excess of 11/2 times his prevailing hourly wage rate, which compensation 1920shall be in lieu of any compensatory time off otherwise due for the emergency duty so compensated. 21

The governing body of the municipality, if necessary, may make emergency appropriations to provide funds for the payment of such compensation as provided by law.

Senate Bill No. 381 permits a municipality to pay any member of the police and fire department, time and a half pay for overtime.

Governor William T. Cahill signed into law today two bills concerning benefits for members of the Newark Retirement System and overtime pay for police and firemen.

Sponsored by Senator Michael A. Giuliano of Essex County, Senate 824 extends pension payments to members of the Newark Retirement System who have completed between 15 and 24 years of service.

This bill also increases from \$50 to \$80 per month the amount of benefits paid to surviving children and continues benefits beyond the age of 18 when the child is disabled. It removes time limitations on the purchase of credit for time served while not a member of the system and makes time spent as an employe of the Newark Housing Authority eligible for purchase of prior service credit.

In signing the legislation, Governor Cahill stated: "We cannot turn our backs on retired persons who must live on a fixed income, especially in this period of inflationary trends." The Governor noted that the recent tax reform proposal would have provided additional benefits to persons on a fixed income in the form of reduced property taxes, senior citizens tax credits and credits for tenants.

Governor Cahill also signed <u>Senate 381</u>, sponsored by Senator Matthew J. Rinaldo of Union County, which permits municipalities to pay police and firemen time-and-ahalf wages for emergency overtime duty. Prior to the enactment of this legislation, overtime was payed at the prevailing wage or with compensatory time off.

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
