- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State

- 1 1. It shall be an unlawful practice for a person to advertise
- 2 merchandise for sale accompanied by a picture or illustration of

- 1 2. This act shall take effect 60 days after enactment.

# STATE OF NEW JERSEY

This bill supplements the consumer fraud law (P. L. 1960, c. 39, C. 56:8–1 et seq.) to make it an unlawful practice under such law to advertise merchandise for sale with a picture or illustration of the merchandise in an assembled condition if it is intended to be sold unassembled, unless the advertisement indicates the merchandise is to be sold unassembled.

Acting Governor Alfred N. Beadleston today signed into law a consumer protection bill which will guard purchasers against being misled on the item they are buying.

The Acting Governor signed A-1239, sponsored by Assemblyman John Dennis, (R., Essex), which makes it a fraudulent consumer practice to advertise merchandise with an illustration showing it in an assembled condition when the item is intended to be sold unassembled.

Acting Governor Beadleston said that, "Reliable retail stores already indicate whether merchandise is unassembled. This bill would mandate such conduct by all retailers.

"Under this new law, consumers will now know whether they will have to assemble a product when they buy it for later delivery rather than being surprised when they receive the merchandise unassembled at their homes.

"It is stipulated in the bill that there is no violation of the law if the merchandise is intended to be sold unassembled and the advertising contains an indication that the article is purchased in that condition."

The Acting Governor also signed the following bills:

S-868, sponsored by State Senator Richard R. Stout, (R., Monmouth), which validates the creation of certain municipal utility authorities and sewerage authorities.

A-2088, sponsored by Assemblyman John J. Fay, Jr., (D., Middlesex), which authorizes Middlesex County to make permanent the appointment of D. DeMarco as county park policeman.
