An Act concerning legal holidays and amending R. S. 36:1-1.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State
- 2 of New Jersey:
- 1 1. R. S. 36:1-1 is amended to read as follows:
- 2 36:1-1. The following days in each year shall, for all purposes
- 3 whatsoever as regards the presenting for payment or acceptance,
- 4 and of the protesting and giving notice of dishonor, of bills of ex-
- 5 change, bank checks and promissory notes be treated and considered
- 6 as the first day of the week, commonly called Sunday, and as public
- 7 holidays: January 1, known as New Year's Day; February 12,
- 8 known as Lincoln's Birthday; the third Monday in February, known
- 9 as Washington's Birthday; the day designated and known as Good
- 10 Friday; the last Monday in May, known as Memorial Day; July 4,
- 11 known as Independence Day; the first Monday in September, known
- 12 as Labor Day; the second Monday in October, known as Columbus
- 13 Day; Tthe fourth Monday in October, known as Veteran's Day;
- 14 November 11, known as Armistice Day or Veteran's Day; the
- 15 fourth Thursday in November, known as Thanksgiving Day;
- 16 December 25, known as Christmas Day; any general election day in
- 17 this State; every Saturday; and any day heretofore or hereafter
- 18 appointed, ordered or recommended by the Governor of this State,

STATEMENT

Veteran's Day which was previously known as Armistice Day has been traditionally celebrated on November 11 which marked the date on which the armistice was declared. Recently the observation of Veteran's Day was changed to the fourth Monday in October. It is felt that November 11 should be continued to be celebrated as Armistice Day—a legal holiday since the particular date has a special significance in American history. More than 40 states have already enacted laws making November 11 Armistice Day a legal holiday.
