1 AN ACT concerning county corrections officers and supplementing 2 Title 52 of the Revised Statutes.

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BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

The program shall provide the additional training necessary to allow an eligible county corrections officer to be certified as a county sheriff's officer. The Police Training Commission shall develop the program within 180 days of the effective date of this act.
 - b. A county corrections officer is eligible for the modified basic training program if the officer has:

This bill establishes a modified law enforcement basic training program to allow county corrections officers to transition into the position of county sheriff's officer.

These Assembly amendments provide that an officer's eligibility for transfer is to be based on the officer's law enforcement examination score, rather than a test developed by the Civil Service Commission. In addition, the amendments require a county corrections officer to submit a criminal history record background check to be performed by the appointing authority to determine that the officer is not disqualified based on a conviction disclosed by the background check.

The amendments also clarify that a county corrections officer who successfully completes the training program is eligible for a lateral transfer to a sheriff's officer position and cannot be denied the transfer other than for cause. Other clarifying and technical amendments also were made.

These amendments make this bill identical to Assembly Bill No. 3848, also amended on this same date.

Curriculum Development: The OLS expects the development and periodic updating of a course curriculum and examination for the new accelerated basic training program for certain county corrections officers seeking a county sheriff's officer certification to increase the workload of the PTC and the Civil Service Commission. The OLS anticipates the additional workload to be marginal, given that the accelerated curriculum will likely be composed of elements of the curriculum for the existing basic training course for county sheriff's officers. The written examination, in turn, may also not differ significantly from the existing county sheriff's officers examination. It is unclear, however, whether the additional workload will increase administrative expenses or whether the PTC and the Civil Service Commission will absorb the additional workload within their existing resources.

Curriculum Implementation: Police academies, of which most are operated by county entities, provide PTC-approved basic law enforcement training for a fee. Counties pay the fee for county corrections officers' enrollment in county sheriff's officer training programs. Therefore, any change in police academy expenditures attributable to the bill will accrue to the counties.

It is unclear whether the introduction of the new accelerated basic training course for certain county corrections officers will decrease, increase or not affect the operating cost of police academies. As enrollees must take fewer classes in the new accelerated program than in the standard program, the police academies may offer fewer class sessions in total, potentially resulting in cost savings. But it is also conceivable that the new accelerated curriculum may cause police academies to schedule additional classes especially for accelerated program enrollees without a corresponding reduction in the number of classes taught for the standard training program, potentially resulting in higher police academy expenses.

Background on PTC: The PTC supervises the administration of basic police training programs. As part of that task, the commission is responsible for the development, periodic review and revision, and certification of basic training courses for county and local police, sheriff's officers, state and county investigators, state and county corrections officers, juvenile detention officers, and a number of other law enforcement positions, as well as several instructor development courses. According to evaluation data in the FY 2018 Governor's Budget Recommendation, in FY 2016, the PTC supervised 150 training programs and certified 3,600 trainees. The length of basic training varies. Currently, a county corrections officer training course takes about 18 weeks of basic training and a county sheriff's officer course takes about 26 weeks of basic training.

The direction and magnitude of any county impact will depend on the extent to which the bill will alter the operating expenses of county-run police academies that will offer the accelerated basic training program.

Curriculum Development: The OLS expects the development and periodic updating of a course curriculum and examination for the new accelerated basic training program for certain county corrections officers seeking a county sheriff's officer certification to increase the workload of the PTC and the Civil Service Commission. The OLS anticipates the additional workload to be marginal, given that the accelerated curriculum will likely be composed of elements of the curriculum for the existing basic training course for county sheriff's officers. The written examination, in turn, may also not differ significantly from the existing county sheriff's officers examination. It is unclear, however, whether the additional workload will increase administrative expenses or whether the PTC and the Civil Service Commission will absorb the additional workload within their existing resources.

Curriculum Implementation: Police academies, of which most are operated by county entities, provide PTC-approved basic law enforcement training for a fee. Counties pay the fee for county corrections officers' enrollment in county sheriff's officer training programs. Therefore, any change in police academy expenditures attributable to the bill will accrue to the counties.

It is unclear whether the introduction of the new accelerated basic training course for certain county corrections officers will decrease, increase, or not affect the operating cost of police

academies. As enrollees must take fewer classes in the new accelerated program than in the standard program, the police academies may offer fewer class sessions in total, potentially resulting in cost savings. However, it is also conceivable that the new accelerated curriculum may cause police academies to schedule additional classes, especially for accelerated program enrollees, without a corresponding reduction in the number of classes taught for the standard training program, potentially resulting in higher police academy expenses.

Background on PTC: The PTC supervises the administration of basic police training programs. As part of that task, the commission is responsible for the development, periodic review and revision, and certification of basic training courses for county and local police, sheriff's officers, state and county investigators, state and county corrections officers, juvenile detention officers, and a number of other law enforcement positions, as well as several instructor development courses. According to evaluation data in the FY 2020 Governor's Budget Recommendation, in FY 2018, the PTC supervised 160 training programs and certified 4,691 trainees. The length of basic training varies. Currently, a county corrections officer training course takes about 18 weeks of basic training and a county sheriff's officer course takes about 26 weeks of basic training.
