The Assembly Agriculture and Natural Resources Committee reports favorably, and with committee amendments, Assembly Bill No. 1295.

The bill, as amended, prohibits any municipality from regulating the breeding or keeping of honey bees and any related activities, including the use of honey bees for pollination, the reproduction and sale of honey bees, or the production of honey or other apiary products from honey bees.

The bill directs the Department of Agriculture to regulate apiary activities in the State and adopt any rules and regulations necessary to do so, including adoption of apiary standards and standards of administrative procedure for municipal monitoring and enforcement. The bill requires these standards be reflective of:

- 1) the population densities in rural, suburban, and urban areas of the State;
- 2) the densities and intensities of development and differing land uses in communities throughout the State; and
- 3) any other characteristics of various regions of the State that the department determines to be significant to the regulation of apiary activities.

The bill further directs the department to consult with the New Jersey League of Municipalities, the New Jersey Beekeepers Association, and the Mid-Atlantic Apiculture Research and Extension Consortium, or successor organizations, when developing those standards.

The bill also authorizes a municipality to assume responsibility for monitoring and enforcing the apiary standards within its borders upon adoption of an ordinance incorporating the department standards by reference. The municipality may also at any time repeal the ordinance, whereupon the department would reassume responsibility for monitoring and enforcing the standards. If a municipality that has assumed this responsibility finds that there is a condition or circumstance in the municipality that is not resolved by the

department's apiary standards, the municipality is directed to request guidance about it from the department. The department has 90 days after the request is received to offer guidance, after which if the condition or circumstance is not sufficiently addressed, the municipality is authorized to adopt an ordinance to address the condition or circumstance, provided that the standard reflects consideration of population density, the density and intensity of development, type of land use, and honey bee biology and behavior. Before adopting the ordinance, the municipality is required to consult with the department, the New Jersey League of Municipalities, the New Jersey Beekeepers Association, and the Mid-Atlantic Apiculture Research and Extension Consortium, or successor organizations with similar purposes.

This bill was pre-filed for introduction in the 2014-2015 session pending technical review. As reported, the bill includes the changes required by technical review, which has been performed.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS

The committee amendments:

- 1) clarify that a municipality may repeal its monitoring and enforcement ordinance at any time;
- 2) immediately upon such a repeal, direct the Department of Agriculture to reassume the monitoring and enforcement authority previously assumed by the municipality;
- 3) provide for a municipality to establish its own standard for a condition or circumstance not covered by the department standards;
- 4) provide 90 days for the department to provide guidance on such a proposed municipal standard;
- 5) require a municipality establishing such a standard to consult with the department and the New Jersey League of Municipalities, the New Jersey Beekeepers Association, and the Mid-Atlantic Apiculture Research and Extension Consortium, or successor organizations;
- 6) require the department to consult with the same organizations when establishing its standards;
- 7) require any standard established by the department to reflect consideration of population densities and density and intensity of development and differing land uses in communities throughout the State, and regional characteristics that may be significant;
- 8) require any standard established by a municipality to reflect consideration of population density, the density and intensity of development, type of land use, and honey bee biology and behavior; and
 - 9) make technical corrections.

(2) standards of administrative procedure for a municipality to monitor and enforce the rules and regulations adopted pursuant to this subsection. The standards shall include provisions for the preparation and submittal to the department by the municipality of periodic reports on the results of monitoring and enforcement activities undertaken by the municipality.

3. This act shall take effect immediately.

STATEMENT

This bill prohibits any municipality from regulating the breeding or keeping of honey bees and any related activities, including the use of honey bees for pollination, reproduction and sale of honey bees, or the production of honey and other apiary products from honey bees. The bill directs the Department of Agriculture (department) to regulate apiary activities in the State and adopt any rules and regulations necessary to do so, including adoption of apiary standards and municipal monitoring and enforcement standards (standards) that include provisions for the preparation and submittal to the department by the municipality of periodic reports on the results of monitoring and enforcement activities undertaken by the municipality. Finally, the bill authorizes the department to delegate to a municipality the responsibility for monitoring and enforcing the standards within the municipality's borders upon adoption of an ordinance incorporating the standards by reference.

The Senate Economic Growth Committee reports favorably and with committee amendments Senate Bill No. 1975.

As amended and reported, this bill prohibits a municipality from regulating the breeding or keeping of honey bees and any related activities, including the use of honey bees for pollination, the reproduction and sale of honey bees, or the production of honey or other apiary products from honey bees.

The bill directs the Department of Agriculture (department) to regulate apiary activities in the State and adopt any rules and regulations necessary to do so, including adoption of apiary standards and standards of administrative procedure for municipal monitoring and enforcement. The bill requires these standards be reflective of: 1) the population densities in rural, suburban, and urban areas of the State; 2) the densities and intensities of development and differing land uses in communities throughout the State; and 3) any other characteristics of various regions of the State that the department determines to be significant to the regulation of apiary activities. The bill directs the department to consult with the New Jersey State League of Municipalities, the New Jersey Beekeepers Association, and the Mid-Atlantic Apiculture Research and Extension Consortium, or successor organizations, when developing these standards.

The bill authorizes a municipality to assume responsibility for monitoring and enforcing the apiary standards within its borders upon adoption of an ordinance incorporating the department standards by reference. The municipality may, at any time, repeal the ordinance, whereupon the department would reassume responsibility for monitoring and enforcing the standards. If a municipality that has assumed this responsibility finds that there is a condition or circumstance in the municipality that is not resolved by the department's apiary standards, the municipality is directed to request guidance about the standards from the department. The department has 90 days after the request is received to offer guidance, after which if the condition or circumstance is not sufficiently addressed, the municipality is authorized to adopt an ordinance to address the condition or circumstance, provided that the standard reflects

consideration of population density, the density and intensity of development, type of land use, and honey bee biology and behavior. Before adopting the ordinance, the municipality is required to consult with the department, the New Jersey State League of Municipalities, the New Jersey Beekeepers Association, and the Mid-Atlantic Apiculture Research and Extension Consortium, or successor organizations with similar purposes.

The committee amended the bill to:

- 1) clarify that a municipality may repeal its monitoring and enforcement ordinance at any time;
- 2) immediately upon a repeal, direct the Department of Agriculture to reassume the monitoring and enforcement authority previously assumed by the municipality;
- 3) provide for a municipality to establish its own standard for a condition or circumstance not covered by the department standards;
- 4) provide 90 days for the department to provide guidance on a proposed municipal standard;
- 5) require a municipality establishing its own standard to consult with the department and the New Jersey State League of Municipalities, the New Jersey Beekeepers Association, and the Mid-Atlantic Apiculture Research and Extension Consortium, or successor organizations;
- 6) require the department to consult with the same organizations when establishing its standards;
- 7) require any standard established by the department to reflect consideration of population densities and density and intensity of development and differing land uses in communities throughout the State, and regional characteristics that may be significant; and
- 8) require any standard established by a municipality to reflect consideration of population density, the density and intensity of development, type of land use, and honey bee biology and behavior.

As amended and reported by the committee, Senate Bill No. 1975 is identical to Assembly Bill No. 1295 (1R) which was also reported by the committee on this date.

"Bees are central to New Jersey's rich agricultural history, and, more important, to New Jersey's agricultural future," said Acting Governor Guadagno "These bills collectively provide appropriate protection to New Jersey's growing beekeeping industry, support the Garden State's commercial and recreational bee industry, and heighten public awareness of the importance of bees to our food chain"

As New Jersey's official insect, honey bees are among the most well-known, popular, and economically beneficial insects. In addition to honey bees, New Jersey's more than 3,000 registered beekeepers also tend other bee species that are critical to crop pollination, like mason and bumble bees.

"These bills are important to the health and vitality of the beekeeping industry in New Jersey," said Secretary Fisher "Bees are some of the most interesting creatures in nature and are essential to the pollination of our crops "

Honey bees are social insects that live in large colonies of up to 80,000 bees. According to the Department of Agriculture, more than 80 percent of U S food crops are pollinated by honey bees. In New Jersey, pollination is crucial for the state's blueberry, cranberry, pumpkin, squash, strawberry, peach, and apple crops as well as a wide variety of annual and perennial flowers and tree species.

"These bills will aid commercial beekeepers in continuing to provide vital pollination services and give clear, enforceable guidance to municipalities," said Janet A. Katz, NJBA President. "We are confident that these bills will free our organization and the Department of Agriculture to focus on educating the public on the vital role our state insect plays in New Jersey agriculture and in providing our membership and all New Jersey beekeepers with the tools and guidance to be good beekeepers and neighbors."

The Acting Governor signed the following bills today

A-1294 (Dancer, Space, Andrezejczak, Caride/Van Drew, Oroho) - Extends Right to Farm Act protections to commercial beekeepers, with some restrictions



A-1295 (Dancer, Space, Andrezejczak, Caride/Van Drew, Oroho) - Establishes exclusive State regulatory authority over apiary activities and allows for delegation of monitoring and enforcement authority to municipalities

A-1296 (Dancer, Space, Caride/Van Drew, Cruz-Perez) - Establishes penalty for destruction of man-made native bee hive
