2. (New section) As used in P.L.2002, c.75 (C.52:16A-86 et seq.) and P.L., c. (C.) (pending before the Legislature as this bill), "African American" means all people of African descent in the United States.

- 3. (New section) The Legislature finds and declares that:
- a. Since the days of slavery, public school curricula have consistently omitted or misrepresented the history of African Americans.
- b. To correct these omissions, all public schools in the State of New Jersey should include instruction that infuses into all courses on the United States, the centuries of contributions and accomplishments by African Americans in the building and development of America.

As amended and reported by the committee, this bill is identical to Senate Bill No. 1028 (1R), which was also reported by the committee on this same date.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS:

The committee amended the bill to:

- provide that the executive director of the commission will submit requests for the commission's budget directly to the Governor who will review the requests and forward them to the Division of Budget and Accounting in the Department of the Treasury;
- delete a provision in the bill that requires the Department of Education to provide any additional staff that the commission deems necessary; and
- delete a section of the bill making a \$400,000 appropriation from the General Fund to the Department of Education for the Amistad Commission.

The commission shall consist of [23] 22 members, including [the Secretary of State or a designee,] the Commissioner of Education or a designee, who shall serve as a voting member, and the chair of the executive board of the Presidents' Council or a designee, serving ex officio, two members of the Senate or their designees, no more than one of whom shall be of the same political party, appointed by the President of the Senate to serve as [non-voting] voting members for the two-year legislative term during which they are appointed, two members of the General Assembly or their designees, no more than one of whom shall be of the same political party, appointed by the Speaker of the General Assembly to serve as [non-voting] voting members for the two-year legislative term during which they are appointed, and 16 public members.
