BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

The Commissioner of Human Services shall establish four regional diagnostic and treatment centers for child abuse and neglect affiliated with medical teaching institutions in the State that meet the standards adopted by the commissioner, in consultation with the New Jersey Task Force on Child Abuse and Neglect. The regional centers shall be located in the northern, north central, south central and southern regions of the State. Each center shall have experience in addressing the medical and mental health diagnostic and treatment needs of abused and neglected children in the region in which it is located.

2. Each center shall demonstrate a multidisciplinary approach to identifying and responding to child abuse and neglect. The center staff shall include, at a minimum, a pediatrician, a consulting psychiatrist, a psychologist and a social worker who are trained to evaluate and treat children who have been abused or neglected and their families. Each center shall establish a liaison with the district office of the Division of Youth and Family Services in the Department of Human Services and the prosecutor's office from the county in which the child who is undergoing evaluation and treatment resides. At least one member of the staff shall also have an appropriate professional credential or significant training and experience in the identification and treatment of substance abuse.

Each center shall develop an intake, referral and case tracking process which assists the division and prosecutor's office in assuring that child victims receive appropriate and timely diagnostic and treatment services.

3. The regional centers shall: evaluate and treat child abuse and neglect; be resources for the region and develop additional resources within the region; provide training and consultative services; and be available for emergency phone consultation 24 hours a day. The centers shall also be a source for research and training for additional medical and mental health personnel dedicated to the identification and treatment of child abuse and neglect.

Office of Legislative Services Comments:

To implement the legislation, DHS would issue a Request for Proposal to solicit bids from qualified providers that wish to establish a regional diagnostic and treatment center in each of the four regions of the State. Once proposals are received and reviewed, the adequacy of the \$1.5 million General Fund appropriation can be better determined.

The following additional information is noted:

• Several medical centers (Hackensack, UMDNJ-Stratford, Newark Beth Israel and St. Peters/Robert Wood Johnson) already operate programs, primarily using federal grants, that offer many of the services identified in the legislation. The federal grants, according

- to the Office on Child Abuse Prevention, will end in the near future.
- The FY 1998 appropriations act appropriated \$412,000 for "Regional Child Abuse Treatment Centers." These monies have been allocated to existing programs at Hackensack and St. Peters/Robert Wood Johnson.
- The FY 1998 appropriations act appropriated \$10.2 million for "Child Abuse Prevention" activities, \$1.8 million for "Morris/Sussex/Sexual Abuse Victims' Program," and \$1.0 million for "School Based Mental Health/Child Abuse Outreach." A portion of these appropriations is awarded to medical centers and hospitals for various child abuse and neglect services including diagnostic and treatment services to children and their families.

1 AN ACT establishing regional diagnostic and treatment centers for 2 child abuse and neglect and making an appropriation.

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4 **BE IT ENACTED** by the Senate and General Assembly of the State 5 of New Jersey:

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1. The Commissioner of Human Services shall establish four regional diagnostic and treatment centers for child abuse and neglect affiliated with medical teaching institutions in the State that meet the standards adopted by the commissioner, in consultation with the New Jersey Task Force on Child Abuse and Neglect. The regional centers shall be located in the northern, north central, south central and southern regions of the State. Each center shall have experience in addressing the medical and mental health diagnostic and treatment needs of abused and neglected children in the region in which it is located.

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2. Each center shall demonstrate a multidisciplinary approach to identifying and responding to child abuse and neglect. The center staff shall include, at a minimum, a pediatrician, a consulting psychiatrist, a psychologist and a social worker who are trained to evaluate and treat children who have been abused or neglected and their families. Each center shall establish a liaison with the district office of the Division of Youth and Family Services in the Department of Human Services and the prosecutor's office from the county in which the child who is undergoing evaluation and treatment resides. At least one member of the staff shall also have an appropriate professional credential or significant training and experience in the identification and treatment of substance abuse.

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Each center shall develop an intake, referral and case tracking process which assists the division and prosecutor's office in assuring that child victims receive appropriate and timely diagnostic and treatment services.

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3. The regional centers shall: evaluate and treat child abuse and neglect; be resources for the region and develop additional resources within the region; provide training and consultative services; and be available for emergency phone consultation 24 hours a day. The centers shall also be a source for research and training for additional medical and mental health personnel dedicated to the identification and treatment of child abuse and neglect.

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The regional center may charge a sliding scale fee for services provided under this act.

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45 4. Services provided by the center's staff shall include, but not be 46 limited to:

- a. Providing psychological and medical evaluation and treatment of the child, counseling for family members and substance abuse assessment and mental health and substance abuse counseling for the parents or guardians of the child;
- b. Providing referral for appropriate social services and medicalcare;
 - c. Providing testimony regarding alleged child abuse or neglect at judicial proceedings;
 - d. Providing treatment recommendations for the child and mental health and substance abuse treatment recommendations for his family, and providing mental health and substance abuse treatment recommendations for persons convicted of child abuse or neglect;
 - e. Receiving referrals from the Division of Youth and Family Services and the county prosecutor's office and assisting them in any investigation of child abuse or neglect;
 - f. Providing educational material and seminars on child abuse and neglect and the services the center provides to children, parents, teachers, law enforcement officials, the judiciary, attorneys and other citizens.

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5. The regional center shall ensure the safety of a child undergoing treatment while the child is at the regional center to the extent permitted by law. The appropriate law enforcement officials and protective services providers shall continue to ensure the safety of the child to the extent permitted by law.

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6. Regional centers shall act as a resource in the establishment and maintenance of county-based multidisciplinary teams which work in conjunction with the county prosecutor and the Division of Youth and Family Services in the investigation of child abuse and neglect in the county in which the child who is undergoing evaluation and treatment resides. The Commissioner of Human Services, in consultation with the New Jersey Task Force on Child Abuse and Neglect, shall establish standards for a county team. The county team shall consist of representatives of the following disciplines: law enforcement; child protective services; mental health; substance abuse identification and treatment; and medicine, all of whom have been trained to recognize child abuse and neglect. The county team shall provide: facilitation of the investigation, management and disposition of cases of criminal child abuse and neglect; referral services to the regional diagnostic center; appropriate referrals to medical and social service agencies; information regarding the identification and treatment of child abuse and neglect; and appropriate follow-up care for abused children and their families.

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7. There is established a 15 member Diagnostic and Treatment

1 Advisory Council to oversee the programs of the regional centers, help 2 facilitate communications among the centers, county teams, law enforcement officials and the Division of Youth and Family Services, 4 develop standards of care for the treatment of child abuse, and help coordinate any research it deems appropriate. The council shall 5 consist of: the Commissioners of the Departments of Human Services, 6 Health and Senior Services and Education, and the Attorney General, 7 8 or their designees; the Director of the Division of Youth and Family Services; the directors of the four regional centers; a physician; a 9 10 social worker; a psychologist; a certified alcohol and drug abuse counselor or other professional appropriately credentialed to identify 11 and treat substance abuse; an advocate for abused and neglected 12 children; and a person who has utilized the services of a center. The 13 14 Governor shall appoint the six public members of the council, who 15 shall serve as members for three years. 16 The advisory council shall report annually to the Governor and the 17

Legislature regarding the effectiveness of the regional centers and shall make recommendations for improvements or changes.

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8. The Commissioner of Human Services shall adopt rules and regulations pursuant to the "Administrative Procedure Act" P.L.1968, c.410 (C.52:14B-1 et seq.) necessary to effectuate the provisions of this act.

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9. There is appropriated \$1.5 million from the General Fund to the Department of Human Services to carry out the purposes of this act.

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10. This act shall take effect immediately.

The Senate Senior Citizens, Veterans' Affairs and Human Services Committee reports favorably and with committee amendments Senate Bill No. 857.

This bill establishes four regional diagnostic and treatment centers for child abuse and neglect affiliated with medical centers in the State that meet standards adopted by the Commissioner of Human Services, in consultation with the New Jersey Task Force on Child Abuse and Neglect. Each center's staff shall include, at a minimum, a pediatrician, a consulting psychiatrist, a psychologist and a social worker who are trained to evaluate and treat children who have been abused and neglected and their families. The regional centers would:

- Evaluate and treat child abuse and neglect,
- Be a resource for the region and develop additional resources within a region,
- Provide training and consultative services,
- Provide 24-hour daily emergency phone consultation,
- Be a source for research and training for additional medical and mental health personnel dedicated to the identification and treatment of child abuse and neglect, and
- Provide liaison with the appropriate Division of Youth and Family Services (DYFS) district office and county prosecutor's office.

The bill establishes a 19-member Diagnostic and Treatment Advisory Council to oversee the programs of the regional centers.

Also, the bill appropriates \$1.5 million from the General Fund to the Department of Human Services to implement the program.

The committee adopted an amendment to add two members of the Assembly and two members of the Senate to the Diagnostic and Treatment Advisory Council.

This bill is identical to A-1301 Sca (Heck/Stuhltrager) which the committee also reported favorably on this date.

The Senate Budget and Appropriations Committee reports favorably and with committee amendments Senate Bill No. 857 (1R).

Senate Bill No. 857 (1R), as amended, establishes four regional diagnostic and treatment centers for child abuse and neglect affiliated with medical centers in the State that meet standards adopted by the Commissioner of Human Services, in consultation with the New Jersey Task Force on Child Abuse and Neglect. Each center's staff shall include, at a minimum, a pediatrician, a consulting psychiatrist, a psychologist and a social worker who are trained to evaluate and treat children who have been abused and neglected and their families. The regional centers would:

- Evaluate and treat child abuse and neglect,
- Be a resource for the region and develop additional resources within a region,
- Provide training and consultative services,
- Provide 24-hour daily emergency phone consultation,
- Be a source for research and training for additional medical and mental health personnel dedicated to the identification and treatment of child abuse and neglect, and
- Provide liaison with the appropriate Division of Youth and Family Services (DYFS) district office and county prosecutor's office.

The bill establishes a Diagnostic and Treatment Advisory Council to oversee the programs of the regional center.

The bill appropriates \$1.5 million from the General Fund to the Department of Human Services to implement the program.

As amended by the committee, the form of the bill is identical to the form in which it was passed by the General Assembly.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS:

The adopted amendments to the bill to remove a provision for the inclusion of four legislative members on the Diagnostic and Treatment Advisory Council.

FISCAL IMPACT:

This bill makes a General Fund appropriation of \$1.5 million to the Department of Human Services (DHS). To implement the legislation, DHS would issue a Request for Proposal to solicit bids from qualified providers that wish to establish a regional diagnostic and treatment center in four regions of the State. Once proposals are received and reviewed, the adequacy of the \$1.5 million General Fund appropriation can be better determined.

Bill Summary:

Senate Bill No. 857 of 1998 establishes four regional diagnostic and treatment centers for child abuse and neglect affiliated with medical centers in the State that meet standards adopted by the Commissioner of Human Services in consultation with the Governor's Task Force on Child Abuse and Neglect. Each center's staff shall include, at a minimum, a pediatrician, a consulting psychiatrist, a psychologist and a social worker who are trained to evaluate and treat children who have been abused and neglected and their families. The regional centers would:

- Evaluate and treat child abuse and neglect,
- Be a resource for the region and develop additional resources within a region,
- Provide training and consultative services,
- Provide 24-hour daily emergency phone consultation,
- Be a source for research and training for additional medical and mental health personnel dedicated to the identification and treatment of child abuse and neglect, and
- Provide liaison with the appropriate Division of Youth and Family Services (DYFS) district office and county prosecutor's office.

The bill appropriates \$1.5 million from the General Fund to implement the program.

Agency Comments:

DHS and the Office of Management and Budget have not provided any fiscal information on the legislation.

Office of Legislative Services Comments:

To implement the legislation, DHS would issue a Request for Proposal to solicit bids from qualified providers that wish to establish a regional diagnostic and treatment center in each of the four regions of the State. Once proposals are received and reviewed, the adequacy of the \$1.5 million General Fund appropriation can be better determined.

The following additional information is noted:

- Several medical centers (Hackensack, UMDNJ-Stratford, Newark Beth Israel and St. Peters/Robert Wood Johnson) already operate programs, primarily using federal grants, that offer many of the services identified in the legislation. The federal grants, according to the Office on Child Abuse Prevention, will end in the near future.
- The FY 1998 appropriations act appropriated \$412,000 for "Regional Child Abuse Treatment Centers." These monies have been allocated to existing programs at Hackensack and St. Peters/Robert Wood Johnson.
- The FY 1998 appropriations act appropriated \$10.2 million for "Child Abuse Prevention" activities, \$1.8 million for "Morris/Sussex/Sexual Abuse Victims' Program," and \$1.0 million for "School Based Mental Health/Child Abuse Outreach." A portion of these appropriations is awarded to medical centers and hospitals for various child abuse and neglect services including diagnostic and treatment services to children and their families.

In addition to these programs, she has also helped parents to raise children who will be safe by passing Megan's law and prepared for the future by establishing new core curriculum standards.

A wise person once described motherhood this way. "A mother," she said, "is a person who, seeing there are only four pieces of pie for five people, promptly announces she never did care for pie."

My mother, Eleanor Schley Todd, was a lot like that. She passed away several years ago, but I will always remember and appreciate her influence and inspiration in my life. She convinced me that I was capable of anything I put my will and talent toward achieving.

As Governor, I want to make my mother proud. With the help of citizens and the Legislature, I want to make New Jersey the best place to live in America - and that includes making it the best place to be a mother.

Here are a few ways we're doing that.

To protect the health of expectant mothers and their children, we passed a law that requires doctors to tell them about the benefits of being tested for HIV infection.

To protect the health of brand-new mothers and their infants, we made sure that insurance companies in our state cover at least a 48-hour maternity stay - and twice as long if it's a c-section.

To make sure that all parents can give their children the health care they need, we started a program called KidCare, which will help provide health insurance to more than 100,000 New Jersey kids.

To help moms and dads rear children who learn what they'll need for the future, we established rigorous new core academic standards for every public school in New Jersey.

To give parents a little more help in protecting their children, we passed Megan's Law to inform communities when convicted sex offenders move in.

To improve the health of mothers and, indeed, all women in our state, we established a Breast Cancer Research Fund and added a check-off box on the income tax form for that fund.

Sadly, we recognize that some mothers don't get the respect and treatment they deserve. Too many of us know someone who is the victim of domestic violence.

We've passed a number of laws to help and protect domestic violence victims. Just as important, we fund a statewide domestic violence hotline, 1-800-572-SAFE.

I'll repeat that number in a moment. I ask you to write the number down, and make sure your friends have it too. The best gift on this Mother's Day just might be to help save a woman who has been the victim of domestic violence. Once again, the domestic violence hotline number is: 1-800-572-SAFE.

Fortunately, most of us who are mothers enjoy healthy, happy lives. For most mothers, life is filled with the chores and challenges and miracles of motherhood.

In that spirit, I want to leave you with a quote from a woman named Maureen Hawkins, who described a mother's special relationship with her child this way. She wrote: "Before you were conceived, I wanted you. Before you were born I loved you. Before you were here an hour I would die for you. That is the miracle of life."
