This Assembly Committee Substitute for Assembly Bill No. 2651 permits individuals who are seeking employment as law enforcement officers to take the statutorily required Police Training Commission course before they are hired. Currently, section 4 of P.L.1961, c.56 (C.52:17B-69) permits only individuals who have already been hired by local governmental units to be admitted to police training courses offered by schools approved and authorized by the commission.

Under the provisions of the bill, an individual who is interested in becoming a police officer would be permitted to take police training courses if that person (1) meets the statutory qualifications for police officer and (2) applies to and is accepted by the Police Training Commission for admission to a training course.
