1 **AN ACT** concerning the transportation of certain house type semitrailers or trailers and amending R.S.39:3-8 and P.L.1973, c.319.

BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

1. R.S.39:3-8 is amended to read as follows:

9 39:3-8. The applicant for registration for any passenger automobile 10 manufactured in any model year prior to the 1971 model year shall pay 11 to the director for each registration a fee of \$14.00 for each such 12 vehicle having a manufacturer's shipping weight of less than 2,700 13 pounds, a fee of \$23.00 for each such vehicle having a manufacturer's 14 shipping weight of 2,700 pounds or more, but not greater than 3,800 15 pounds, and a fee of \$44.00 for each vehicle having a manufacturer's 16 shipping weight in excess of 3,800 pounds. The applicant for 17 registration for any passenger automobile manufactured in model year 18 1971 and thereafter, except as determined hereinafter, shall pay to the 19 director for each registration a fee of \$17.00 for each such vehicle 20 having a manufacturer's shipping weight of less than 2,700 pounds, a fee of \$28.00 for each such vehicle having a manufacturer's shipping 21 22 weight of 2,700 pounds or more, but not greater than 3,800 pounds, 23 and a fee of \$51.00 for each such vehicle having a manufacturer's 24 shipping weight in excess of 3,800 pounds. The applicant for 25 registration for any 1980 or thereafter model year passenger 26 automobile registered on or after March 1, 1979 shall pay to the 27 director for each registration a fee of \$25.00 for each such vehicle 28 having a manufacturer's shipping weight not greater than 3,500 pounds 29 and a fee of \$50.00 for each vehicle having a manufacturer's shipping 30 weight in excess of 3,500 pounds. The director shall determine 31 manufacturer's shipping weight and model year for each passenger 32 automobile on the basis of the information contained in the certificate 33 of origin, the application for registration or for renewal of registration, 34 or the records of the division, or any or all of these; and any case in 35 which the manufacturer's shipping weight of any particular passenger 36 automobile is unavailable, or in doubt or dispute, the director may 37 require that such automobile be weighed on a scale designated by him, and such actual weight shall be considered the manufacturer's shipping 38 39 weight for the purposes of this section; but in all cases the director's 40 determination of the manufacturer's shipping weight of any such 41 automobile shall be final. The applicant for registration for passenger 42 automobile shall also pay to the director the inspection fee fixed in 43 R.S.39:8-2 in addition to the fees described hereinabove.

EXPLANATION - Matter enclosed in bold-faced brackets [thus] in the above bill is not enacted and intended to be omitted in the law.

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1 The director may also license private utility and house type 2 semitrailers and trailers with a gross load not in excess of 2,000 3 pounds at a fee of \$4.00 per annum and all other such utility and 4 house-type semitrailers and trailers at \$9.00 per annum. Application for such registration shall be made on a blank to be furnished by the 5 6 division and the application shall contain a statement to the effect that the vehicle so registered will not be used for the commercial 7 8 transportation of goods, wares and merchandise, or for hire.

9 Except as provided in R.S.39:3-84 for recreation vehicles, no 10 private utility or house type semitrailer or trailer with an outside width of more than 96 inches, a maximum height of 13 feet 6 inches, a 11 12 maximum length for a single vehicle of more than 35 feet, a maximum 13 length for a semitrailer and its towing vehicle of more than 45 feet, and 14 a maximum length for a trailer and its towing vehicle of more than 50 15 feet, shall be operated on any highway in this State, except that a vehicle exceeding the above limitations may be operated when a 16 special permit so to operate is secured in advance from the director. 17 A house type semitrailer or trailer with an outside width of no more 18 19 than 16 feet shall be entitled to operate with such a special permit if 20 the vehicle is a manufactured home on a transportation system that is 21 designed in accordance with the "Manufactured Home Construction 22 and Safety Standards," 24 CFR part 3280.901 et seq., promulgated by 23 the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development, as 24 amended and supplemented, provided that the operator complies with 25 the provisions of this Title and the rules and regulations issued 26 thereunder. If such a vehicle has an outside width of more than 16 27 feet, it shall be entitled to operate with such a special permit if it is 28 transported on a commercial type low-bed trailer, semitrailer or 29 properly registered dolly wheels pursuant to rules and regulations 30 established by the director. The application for such permit shall be accompanied by a fee fixed by the director. A special permit issued by 31 32 the director shall be in the possession of the operator of the vehicle for which such permit was issued. In computing any dimensions of a 33 34 vehicle, for the purposes of this section, there shall not be included in 35 the dimensional limitations safety equipment such as mirrors or lights, provided such appliances do not exceed the overall limitations 36 37 established by the director by rule or regulation.

- 2. Section 1 of P.L.1973, c.319 (C.39:3-20.1) is amended to read as follows:
- 1. In addition to the motor vehicle registration provisions authorized pursuant to this chapter, the director may issue, upon application on a form prescribed by him, a registration certificate and registration plates for trucks, tractors, trailers and semitrailers that are empty and being transported from one terminal to another, or from

the place of sale to the registrant's terminal or place of business, or
are empty and being transported for the purpose of having additional
equipment added or lettering affixed.

The director may issue, upon application on the form prescribed by the director, a registration certificate and registration plates for mobile and manufactured homes being transported from the place of manufacture to the registrant's terminal or place of business, or being transported for the purpose of delivering the mobile or manufactured home to a final point of delivery.

The annual fee for the issuance of each set of such plates shall be \$25.00. Such plates are to be in the form prescribed by the director and shall be marked in a manner to indicate the vehicle is "in-transit empty."

The Assembly Transportation Committee reports favorably Assembly Bill No. 1115.

This bill was pre-filed for introduction in the 1998 session pending technical review. As reported, the bill includes the changes required by technical review which has been performed.

Gov. Christie Whitman today signed the following pieces of legislation;

S-75, the High Technology Crimes and Interactive Computer Services Protection Act, establishes a procedure to disseminate information regarding computer safety when using the Internet. The bill requires the Department of Law and Public Safety (L&PS) to establish and maintain information to be made available thorough the Internet that will include, among other things, guidelines and recommendations on computer ethics and safe computing practices.

The bill requires L&PS to design and make available through the Internet a continuing educational program on emerging issues in high technology crimes. The bill also requires district and regional school boards of education that provide computer education to notify students about potential risks and dangers associated with computers, and directs the Department of Education to recommend guidelines and curriculum on the ethical use of computers and potential risks posed to juveniles.

The bill, which is a response to the increased use of computers to commit crime, appropriates \$150,000 to L&PS to carry out the purposes of the act.

Sponsors of the bill were Senators Andrew R. Ciesla (R- Monmouth/Ocean) and William L. Gormley (R-Atlantic) and Assembly Members James W. Holzapfel (R-Monmouth/Ocean) and David W. Wolfe (R-Monmouth/Ocean).

A-1115, sponsored by Assembly Members Joseph Azzolina (R- Middlesex/Monmouth) and John V. Kelly (R-Bergen/Essex/Passaic), revises the requirements for transporting manufactured homes on certain house type semitrailers and trailers.

The bill allows house type semitrailers or trailers carrying manufactured houses with a width not exceeding 16 feet to be transported on a transportation trailer system that conforms to the federal Manufactured Home Construction and Safety Standards.

Current regulations of the Division of Motor Vehicles provide that semitrailers or trailers carrying a load whose width is greater than 14 feet must transport such loads on a commercial low-bed trailer, semitrailer or properly registered dolly wheels. Under the bill, only those semitrailers or trailers carrying a load whose width is greater than 16 feet would be required to transport such loads on a commercial low-bed trailer, semitrailer or properly registered dolly wheels. The DMV will implement regulations to address safety issues.
