An amendment was adopted to provide that the two legislative members would not be of the same political party.

As reported by committee, this bill is identical to Senate Bill No. 1403.

STATE OF NEW JERSEY 208th LEGISLATURE

DATED: DECEMBER 2, 1998

Assembly Bill No. 53 of 1998 establishes the 27-member State Council for Adult Literacy Education Services within the State Employment and Training Commission (SETC), which is located in the Department of Labor. The purpose of the council will be to facilitate State and local policy development, planning and oversight with stakeholders in the area of adult literacy education. Included in its duties will be the development of a broad-based master plan to integrate and coordinate all adult literacy programs. The council also has a number of other charges, such as development of performance standards, review of State and federal legislation, and work with the public and private sector to publicize the problem of low-literate populations.

While members of the council will serve without compensation, this bill requires that the council appoint an executive director. The Department of Labor estimates that the SETC will incur salary and fringe costs for this position of \$71,211 in the first year of operation, increasing to \$75,548 by the third year. Based on salaries of executive directors of commissions and councils with similar duties in other areas of State government, the OLS concurs with the department's assessment of salary and fringe costs.

The department also estimates that it will incur \$8,500 in materials and supplies costs, \$2,000 in "other services" costs and \$8,500 in data processing costs in the first year of the council's operations, with significant reductions of "other services" and data processing costs in following years. The SETC informally indicates that data processing costs would include purchase of two computers (one PC and one laptop) for the new position, "other services" costs would include purchase of statistical analysis software, and materials and supplies would include phone, postage, books, subscriptions, brochures and the like. The OLS notes that the costs of software and computers reported by the SETC appear reasonable based on current market prices of relevant software and computers.

Thus, the OLS concurs with the department's estimate that the SETC will incur total costs of \$90,211 in the first year, dropping to \$82,798 by the third year, in order to implement the provisions of this legislation.

GOVERNOR SIGNS LEGISLATION FOR BUSINESS CHILD CARE INCENTIVE DEMONSTRATION PROGRAM

Gov. Christie Whitman has signed **A-1323**, sponsored by Assembly Members Rose Marie Heck (R-Bergen) and Neil M. Cohen (D-Union), and Senators Diane B. Allen (R-Burlington/Camden) and Louis F. Kosco (R-Bergen), which establishes a three-year Small-Medium Business Child Care Consortium Incentive Demonstration Program in conjunction with the Division of Family Development (DFD) in the Department of Human Services.

The bill is designed to benefit children and families in obtaining quality child care services, and to assist small and medium businesses in providing such services to the children of their employees.

"This legislation addresses a major need cited by many workers and their families - the need for adequate child care facilities," the Governor said. "Through this legislation, we will be able to develop, implement and monitor demonstration programs to help those workers in need of quality care for their children and for the many small-to-mid-size companies that need, or desire, to start child care programs for their employees."

The program will involve businesses interested in establishing cooperative partnerships to develop child care centers, and require the director of the DFD, in consultation with the New Jersey Economic Development Authority (EDA), to designate three consortia for a three-year demonstration program. To implement the demonstration program, the EDA may make available up to \$300,000 in assistance to gualified consortia participating the program, which shall be funded by monies from any sources of funds or programs administered by the EDA that the EDA determines is necessary to effectively implement the program. No later than six months before the program's expiration, the director of the DFD, in consultation with the EDA, shall report to the Legislature and the Governor on the effectiveness of the program and present recommendations regarding the advisability and feasibility of expanding the program. The bill is part of a package of legislative initiatives resulting from a series of public hearings on child care issues which were held by the General Assembly Advisory Council on Women in 1996 and 1997. On May 6, 1999, the Governor signed a related bill, A-1669, which established the Neighborhood and Business Child Care Tax Incentive Program.

A-53, sponsored by Assembly Members Jack Collins

(R-Salem/Cumberland/Gloucester) and Joseph V. Doria, Jr. (D-Hudson), and Senators Diane B. Allen (R-Burlington/Camden) and Senator Joseph F. Vitale (D-Middlesex), creates a State Council for Adult Literacy Education within the State Employment and Training Commission (SETC) in the Department of Labor. The purpose of the council will be to facilitate statewide and local policy development, planning and oversight in consultation with appropriate stake holders in the area of adult literacy education. The 27-member council will consist of the following ex-officio members: the commissioners of Labor, Human Services, Education, Community Affairs and Corrections, the secretary of the Commerce and Economic Growth Commission and the executive director of the SETC. Additionally, the council will include one member of the Senate appointed by the Senate President and one member of the Assembly appointed by the Speaker. The council also will include 17 public members as follows: five public members appointed by the Governor, including a member of a Workforce Investment Board literacy committee, a state or national adult education expert and three representatives of the business community; six members appointed by the President of the Senate, including a student or former student who received adult literacy services and a representative from each of the following: a county college, a four-year institution of higher education, the State Library or a local library, an adult education provider of basic adult education programs, general educational development programs or English as a second language program funded by the Department of Education, and a community-based organization which is an adult education provider. ACS for A-1607, sponsored by Assembly Member Steve

Corodemus(R-Monmouth), and Senator Peter A. Inverso (R-Mercer/Middlesex), establishes an 11 member Liquefied Petroleum Gas Education and Safety board within the Department of Community Affairs (DCA) to give advice to the commissioner of the DCA concerning rules and regulations affecting the storage, handling and distribution of liquefied petroleum gas.
