The Senate Law and Public Safety Committee reports favorably a Senate Committee Substitute for Senate Bill No. 949.

This bill would expand the law enforcement agencies eligible to receive grants from the Body Armor Replacement fund to include the Division of Criminal Justice in the Department of Law and Public Safety and the Administrative Office of the Courts.

Currently, the fund provides grants to purchase replacement vests for local law enforcement officers, State Police officers and troopers and State corrections officers. Under the bill, investigators in the Division of Criminal Justice and probation officers in the Administrative Office of the Courts also would be eligible to receive these vests.

The Senate Budget and Appropriations Committee reports favorably and with committee amendments Senate Bill No. 949 SCS.

This bill would expand the list of State law enforcement agencies eligible to receive grants from the Body Armor Replacement fund.

The Body Armor Replacement fund was established as a nonlapsing, revolving fund by legislation enacted in 1997. This legislation provides that a special fee of \$1 is to be added to all vehicle fines, penalties and forfeitures of bail relating to violations of the State's motor vehicle laws. These special fees are to be deposited into the fund and used to finance replacement of the body vests worn by local law enforcement officers and certain State law enforcement officers. (The legislation defines "body vest" as "bullet resistant body armor which is intended to provide ballistic and trauma protection.") Under the program, the Director of the Division of Criminal Justice (as the Attorney General's designee) makes cash grants to eligible law enforcement agencies to cover a portion of the cost of replacing body vests previously issued to any of their officers whose duties necessitate the use of such a vest. The legislation provides that the distribution schedule for the grant program is to effectuate a five-year replacement cycle.

Currently, the only State agencies eligible to receive grants to purchase replacement vests are the Division of State Police (for State Police officers and troopers) and the Department of Corrections (for State corrections officers). Under the bill, eligibility for such grants would be extended to the Division of Criminal Justice (for investigators in the division) and the Administrative Office of the Courts (for up to 200 probation officers).

In addition, the bill incorporates into the law a definition of "local law enforcement officer" substantially identical to that already provided by regulation (N.J.A.C.13:80-1.4).

COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS

Committee amendments to this bill incorporate the ceiling of 200 on the number of probation officer vest replacements that could be funded from grants under the program.

FISCAL IMPACT

According to available data, there are 330 investigators in the Division of Criminal Justice and 200 probation officers in the Administrative Office of the Courts whose duties make them eligible for the use of body vests.

The Department of Law and Public Safety has indicated that the average current cost of a protective vest is approximately \$500. After a base grant of \$500, eligible agencies receive grants from the Body Armor Replacement fund based on the proportion of the number of their officers eligible for vest replacements to the total number of eligible officers statewide. This formula funding provided about \$90 for each of approximately 36,600 eligible officers statewide in FY1999, according to the department.

The addition of 530 eligible investigators and probation officers under the terms of this bill would result in slightly lower body armor replacement grants per eligible law enforcement agency in FY2000 and beyond, provided fund revenues and the number of eligible officers remain at FY1999 levels. Although changes in the number of police officers cannot be projected, preliminary collections indicate that fund revenues may increase in FY2000.

Senate Committee Substitute for Senate Bill No. 949 of 1999 makes funding available to purchase protective vests for investigators of the Division of Criminal Justice and probation officers of the Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC). Currently, such grants are available from the Body Armor Replacement Fund to purchase vests on a five-year replacement cycle for State troopers, local law enforcement officers and State and local corrections officers. This fund's revenues are derived from a \$1 surcharge imposed on fines for motor vehicle violations.

The bill also adds a definition of "local law enforcement officer" to the existing law. This definition should have no fiscal impact on the replacement program because all officers enumerated in the definition are presently considered eligible for funding, according to the Department of Law and Public Safety.

Existing law allocates \$75,000 a year to the Division of Criminal Justice to administer the body armor replacement grant program. The Department of Law and Public Safety indicates that additional administrative funding will not be necessary to distribute the additional grants this bill provides. Another \$400,000 from the fund is allocated by law to the Department of Personnel to administer the Law Enforcement Officer Crisis Intervention Hotline.

All monies received by the Body Armor Replacement Fund are allocated as grants to eligible law enforcement agencies, after the deduction of the administrative costs noted above, according to the department. Fund revenues totaled \$2,125,000 in FY 1998 (10 months) and \$3,771,000 in FY 1999.

According to information provided informally by the department, approximately 330 investigators in the Division of Criminal Justice will be eligible to receive protective vests under the replacement program. The AOC estimates that approximately 200 probation officers, whose duties expose them to high risk, will be eligible to receive protective vests.

The department states that the average current cost of a protective

vest is approximately \$500. After a base grant of \$500, eligible agencies receive grants from the Body Armor Replacement Fund based on the proportion of their officers to the total number of eligible officers statewide. This formula funding provided about \$90 for each of approximately 36,600 eligible officers statewide in FY 1999, according to the department.

The addition of 530 eligible investigators and probation officers under the terms of this bill would result in slightly lower body armor replacement grants per eligible law enforcement agency in FY 2000 and beyond, provided fund revenues and the number of eligible officers remain at FY 1999 levels. Although changes in the number of police officers cannot be projected, preliminary collections indicate that fund revenues may increase in FY 2000.

This bill will have no impact on General Fund revenues and expenditures.

This legislative fiscal estimate has been produced by the Office of Legislative Services due to the failure of the Executive Branch to respond to our request for a fiscal note.

A-3568 (Felice/Doria) (Bassano/Codey) - Continues health service corporation member on Individual Health Coverage and Small Employer Health Benefits Program boards.

A-3622 (Kramer) (Inverso) - Excludes certain hedge fund activity income of corporations of foreign nations from taxation under the corporation business tax.

A-3636 (DeCroce/Ciesla) - Exempts motor carrier employees from the State's statutory overtime wage rate requirements.
