The Assembly Education Committee favorably reports Assembly Bill No. 3290.

This bill establishes a State aid incentive program for certain school districts. Under the program, any K-12 school district with an October 1998 resident enrollment greater than 10,000 pupils and in which the 1998-99 net budget per pupil is less than \$9500, will be eligible to receive the following additional aid: beginning in the 1999-2000 school year, \$550 multiplied by the district's projected resident enrollment for the budget year with the per pupil aid amount adjusted annually for inflation by the CPI; and beginning in the 2000-2001 school year, the T&E amount as established under CEIFA multiplied by the increase in pupils between the prebudget and budget years. The bill further provides that if the sum of the district's core curriculum standards aid and regionalization incentive aid for the budget year is less than the district's prebudget year total adjusted by the CPI.

The bill addresses the fact that large districts which are currently experiencing significant enrollment growth are not being adequately supported by the State in terms of addressing the burdens which such rapid growth places upon those districts.

STATE OF NEW JERSEY

DATED: DECEMBER 13, 1999

The Assembly Appropriations Committee reports favorably an Assembly Committee Substitute for Assembly Bill No. 3290.

This Assembly Committee Substitute for Assembly Bill No. 3290 establishes a State aid incentive program for certain school districts. Under the program, any K-12 school district with an October 1998 resident enrollment greater than 10,000 pupils and in which the 1998-1999 net budget per pupil is less than \$9500 will be eligible to receive additional aid under the provisions of a two-part formula.

For most of the eligible districts the amount of regional incentive aid for the 2000-2001 school year will equal the total of stabilization aids received in the prior year plus one-tenth of the sum of core curriculum standards aid and stabilization aids for the prior year. For the remaining eligible districts the amount of regionalization incentive aid will equal the sum of: (1) the stabilization aids plus the core curriculum standards aid received in the prior year times the consumer price index increase and (2) the amount of stabilization aids received in the prior year.

For the 2001-2002 school year and thereafter regionalization incentive aid shall be adjusted to reflect increases in enrollment and consumer price index. Any districts receiving regionalization incentive aid will have their stabilization aids reduced by the amount of regionalization aid received by the district in 1999-2000 school year.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Under the bill's provisions, seven school districts will qualify for regional incentive aid: Cherry Hill Township, Hamilton Township, Edison Township, Woodbridge Township, Middletown Township, Brick Township, and Toms River Regional. For the 2000-2001 school year, the provisions of this substitute will generate a net increase of \$6,937,976 in State aid. This amount would be expected to increase annually as the CPI increases and as the districts experience enrollment growth (if any).

ASSEMBLY, No. 3290 STATE OF NEW JERSEY 208th LEGISLATURE

DATED: JANUARY 10, 2000

Assembly Bill No. 3290 of 1999 establishes a State aid incentive program for certain school districts. Under the program, any K-12 school district with an October 1998 resident enrollment greater than 10,000 pupils and in which the 1998-99 net budget per pupil is less than \$9500, will be eligible to receive the following additional aid: beginning in the 1999-2000 school year, \$550 multiplied by the district's projected resident enrollment for the budget year with the per pupil aid amount adjusted annually for inflation by the CPI; and beginning in the 2000-2001 school year, the T&E amount as established under the "Comprehensive Educational Improvement and Financing Act of 1996," (CEIFA) P.L.1996, c.138, multiplied by the increase in pupils between the prebudget and budget years. The bill further provides that if the sum of the district's core curriculum standards aid and regionalization incentive aid for the budget year is less than the district's prebudget year total for those aid categories, then the district shall receive the prebudget year total adjusted by the CPI.

Under the bill's provisions, seven school districts will qualify for the new aid program - Cherry Hill Township, Hamilton Township, Edison Township, Woodbridge Township, Middletown Township, Brick Township, and Toms River Regional. For the 1999-2000 school year, the aid program would generate an additional \$48,864,200 in State aid. However, three of the eligible school districts, Cherry Hill, Middletown, and Toms River Regional, received hold harmless State aid through the FY 2000 budget (stabilization aids II and III) and the Department of Education will reduce any additional State aid received by a school district by the amount of hold harmless aid which the district may have received through the budget. As a result, after the deduction of the above hold harmless aids, the bill would generate an additional \$38,020,627 in State aid for the seven school districts in the 1999-2000 school year. Also, a representative of the Department of Education indicates that it would be the department's intention to reduce the additional aid received under the bill by any stabilization aid I received by a school district under subsection b. of section 10 of CEIFA (N.J.S.A.18A:7F-10b.). While the Office of Legislative

Services (OLS) disputes the statutory authority for such a reduction given that the language in subsection b. of section 10 of CEIFA provides stabilization aid I to compensate for reductions in the specific aid categories listed in that subsection, in light of the stated intention of the department to reduce the additional aid available under A-3290 by the amount of any stabilization aid I received by those seven districts, OLS notes that the \$38,020,627 additional aid cited above would be further reduced to \$35,020,295 for the 1999-2000 school year, as the Middletown Township and Cherry Hill Township School Districts both received stabilization aid I.

OLS projects that the additional aid generated under the bill for the above seven school districts in the 2000-2001 school year will equal \$61,884,758. It is not possible to reduce this amount by any stabilization aid I that the districts might receive under CEIFA in the 2000-2001 school year as it cannot be calculated at this point; also any hold harmless aid that might be provided to school districts in the FY2001 budget to cover aid losses over the prior year would not appear to be an issue for these districts given that the increased aid they would receive under the provisions of this bill would appear to make hold harmless aid unnecessary.

This legislative fiscal estimate has been produced by the Office of Legislative Services due to the failure of the Executive Branch to respond to our request for a fiscal note.

The Senate Education Committee reports favorably a committee substitute for Senate Bill Nos. 2101 and 2200.

This committee substitute establishes a State aid incentive program for certain school districts. Under the program, any K-12 school district with an October 1998 resident enrollment greater than 10,000 pupils and in which the 1998-99 net budget per pupil is less than \$9500, will be eligible to receive the following additional aid: beginning in the 2000-2001 school year, \$550 multiplied by the district's projected resident enrollment for the budget year with the per pupil aid amount adjusted annually for inflation by the CPI; and beginning in the 2001-2002 school year, the T&E amount as established under CEIFA multiplied by the increase in pupils between the prebudget and budget years.

The substitute further provides that if the sum of the district's core curriculum standards aid and regionalization incentive aid for the budget year is less than the district's prebudget total for those aid categories, then the district shall receive the prebudget year total adjusted by the CPI.

Finally, the substitute stipulates that the additional State aid received by a school district pursuant to the bill's provisions in the 2000-2001 school year and in each subsequent school year shall not be reduced by the amount of any stabilization aid which the district is entitled to receive under subsection b. of section 10 of CEIFA.

The Senate Budget and Appropriations Committee reports favorably a Senate Committee Substitute for Senate Bill Nos. 2101 and 2200 (SCS).

This substitute establishes a regionalization incentive aid program for certain school districts. Under the program, any K-12 school district with an October 1998 resident enrollment greater than 10,000 pupils and in which the 1998-1999 net budget per pupil is less than \$9500 will be eligible to receive additional State aid under the provisions of a two-part formula.

For most of the eligible districts, the amount of regionalization incentive aid for the 2000-2001 school year will equal the total of stabilization aids received in the prior year plus one-tenth of the sum of core curriculum standards aid and stabilization aids for the prior year. For the remaining eligible districts the amount of regionalization incentive aid will equal the sum of (1) the stabilization aids plus the core curriculum standards aid received in the prior year times the consumer price index increase, and (2) the amount of stabilization aids received in the prior year.

For the 2001-2002 school year and thereafter, regionalization incentive aid shall be adjusted to reflect increases in enrollment and the consumer price index. Districts receiving regionalization incentive aid will have their stabilization aids reduced by the amount of stabilization aids that they received in the 1999-2000 school year.

FISCAL IMPACT

Under the bill's provisions, seven school districts will qualify for regionalization incentive aid: Cherry Hill Township, Hamilton Township, Edison Township, Woodbridge Township, Middletown Township, Brick Township, and Toms River Regional. For the 2000-2001 school year, the provisions of this substitute will generate a net increase of \$6,937,976 in State aid. This amount would be expected to increase annually as the CPI increases and as the districts experience enrollment growth (if any).
