AN ACT concerning the implementation of school breakfast programs 2 and supplementing Title 18A of the New Jersey Statutes.

BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

- 1. The Legislature finds and declares that:
- a. The School Breakfast Program is a federally assisted meal program operating in public and nonprofit private schools and residential child care institutions nationwide, and supplying to each participating child at least one-fourth of the nutrients needed daily;
- b. The School Breakfast Program was established by the federal government in 1966 with the purpose of providing a nutritious, well-balanced breakfast to promote sound eating habits, and fostering good health and academic achievement for school-age children;
- c. New Jersey ranks fiftieth in the nation for participation in the School Breakfast Program by schools offering school lunch, and has seen only modest increases in participation in recent years;
- d. Research shows that school breakfast increases attendance and decreases tardiness, improves academic performance both in class and on standardized tests, improves attentiveness, and reduces emotional and behavioral problems among students from all backgrounds; and
- e. Therefore, it is clearly in the public interest for the State to require that school districts with large populations of students eligible for federally subsidized meals offer the School Breakfast Program and publicize the program in their communities.

Beginning with the 2002-2003 school year, any publicly-funded school located in a local or regional school district of the State in which forty percent (40%) or more of the students enrolled in the school on October 1 of the preceding school year were eligible for free or reduced price meals under the federal School Lunch Program or the federal School Breakfast Program, shall establish a school breakfast program in compliance with and pursuant to the School Breakfast Program administered by the New Jersey Department of Agriculture.
- b. Beginning with the 2003-2004 school year, any publicly-funded school located in a local or regional school district of the State in

which thirty-five percent (35%) or more of the students enrolled in the school on October 1 of the preceding school year were eligible for free or reduced price meals under the federal School Lunch Program or the federal School Breakfast Program shall establish a school breakfast program in compliance with and pursuant to the School Breakfast Program administered by the New Jersey Department of Agriculture.

c. Beginning with the 2004-2005 school year, any publicly-funded school located in a local or regional school district of the State in which twenty percent (20%) or more of the students enrolled in the school on October 1 of the preceding school year were eligible for free or reduced price meals under the federal School Lunch Program or the federal School Breakfast Program shall establish a school breakfast program in compliance with and pursuant to the School Breakfast Program administered by the New Jersey Department of Agriculture.]¹

¹ 2. a. A public school operated by a local or regional school district of the State in which 20% or more of the students enrolled in the school on October 1 of the preceding school year were eligible for free or reduced price meals under the federal School Lunch Program or the federal School Breakfast Program, shall establish a School Breakfast Program in the school.

The school district shall submit a plan for the establishment of school breakfast programs for each school in the district subject to the requirements of this section that is in compliance with and pursuant to the School Breakfast Program administered by the State Department of Agriculture. The plan ²for each school² shall be submitted to the Department of Agriculture by ²[September 1, 2003] the date required by subsection b. of this section² in a form and manner prescribed by the Secretary of Agriculture.

AN ACT concerning the implementation of school breakfast programs 2 and supplementing Title 18A of the New Jersey Statutes.

BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

- 1. a. Beginning with the 2002-2003 school year, any publicly-funded school located in a local or regional school district of the State in which forty percent (40%) or more of the students enrolled in the school on October 1 of the preceding school year were eligible for free or reduced price meals under the federal School Lunch Program or the federal School Breakfast Program, shall establish a school breakfast program in compliance with and pursuant to the School Breakfast Program administered by the New Jersey Department of Agriculture.
- b. Beginning with the 2003-2004 school year, any publicly-funded school located in a local or regional school district of the State in which thirty-five percent (35%) or more of the students enrolled in the school on October 1 of the preceding school year were eligible for free or reduced price meals under the federal School Lunch Program or the federal School Breakfast Program, shall establish a school breakfast program in compliance with and pursuant to the School Breakfast Program administered by the New Jersey Department of Agriculture.
- c. Beginning with the 2004-2005 school year, any publicly-funded school located in a local or regional school district of the State in which twenty percent (20%) or more of the students enrolled in the school on October 1 of the preceding school year were eligible for free or reduced price meals under the federal School Lunch Program or the federal School Breakfast Program, shall establish a school breakfast program in compliance with and pursuant to the School Breakfast Program administered by the New Jersey Department of Agriculture.

- 2. a. The New Jersey Department of Agriculture may grant a oneyear, unrenewable waiver of the requirements of this act to a school district subject to this act which lacks the staff, facilities or equipment to offer a school breakfast program, or the means to finance the hiring or acquisition of such staff, facilities or equipment.
- b. In any high school under the requirements of this act, if fifty percent (50%) or more of the eligible students refuse to participate in the school breakfast program during any year of the program, as demonstrated by sufficient proof to the New Jersey Department of Agriculture, the affected high school may be granted a waiver from the requirements of this act.

3. Nothing in this act shall be deemed to prevent a school district not subject to this act from implementing a school breakfast program

or to prevent a school district from implementing a school breakfast program during an earlier year than required under this act.

4. The New Jersey Department of Agriculture shall adopt, pursuant to the "Administrative Procedure Act," P.L.1968, c.410 (C.52:14B-1 et seq.) such rules and regulations as may be necessary to implement this act.

5. This act shall take effect immediately.

STATEMENT

This bill establishes a three-year implementation program that requires all schools with 20 percent to 40 percent or more students who are eligible for federally subsidized meals under the national School Lunch or School Breakfast Programs to implement a school breakfast program. Currently, school district participation in the federal School Breakfast Program, which is administered by the State Department of Agriculture, is voluntary.

The mandatory participation provision of this bill is needed because New Jersey now ranks last in the nation for school breakfast participation. Only 16 percent of the State's school districts serve school breakfasts, as compared to a 40 percent rate for school districts participating in the federal School Lunch Program.

While the FY 2002 State Budget provided \$2,488,000 to increase the subsidized portion of this program, the number of new school districts participating in the program has not risen significantly. In other states where mandatory participation has been legislatively required, the participation rates are dramatically higher. Since this program is primarily supported by federal reimbursement funds, which are allocated according to the number of breakfasts actually served, more federal dollars would be forthcoming as more school districts participate in this program.

STATE OF NEW JERSEY

DATED: OCTOBER 24, 2002

The Assembly Family, Women and Children's Services Committee reports favorably and with committee amendments Senate Bill No. 1498 (SCS).

As amended by committee, this substitute requires a public school operated by a local or regional school district of the State with 20 percent or more of students who are eligible for federally subsidized meals under the federal School Lunch or School Breakfast Programs, to establish a School Breakfast Program in the school.

The school district shall submit a plan for the establishment of school breakfast programs for each school in the district subject to the requirements of the substitute to the State Department of Agriculture by September 1, 2003. The Department of Agriculture shall:

- ! in consultation with the Department of Education, review each plan submitted and make recommendations, if necessary, on how the school breakfast program can operate within the limits of the federal and State reimbursement rates for the federal School Breakfast Program; and
- ! notify each school district that submitted a plan of the completion of its review and any recommended changes to the plan, within three months of the receipt of the plan, but no later than December 1, 2003.

A school district shall establish a school breakfast program in each of its schools, based on the plan submitted by the district to the Department of Agriculture, by September 1, 2004.

The substitute also requires that if a school district does not submit a plan pursuant to section 2 of the substitute, the district shall establish a school breakfast program in each of its schools based on a model plan provided to the district by the Department of Agriculture. The model plan shall include recommendations on how the school can operate the program within the limits of the federal and State reimbursement rates for the federal School Breakfast Program. The department shall provide the model plan to the school district no later

than February, 1 2004 and the district shall establish the program in each of its schools based on the plan by September 1, 2004.

The substitute directs a school district to minimize the stigma sometimes attached to breakfast program students by developing a meal payment plan or a voucher system that would make participating students indistinguishable from students receiving non-subsidized breakfasts. The substitute also requires that a school district implementing a school breakfast program shall make reasonable efforts to notify parents and students of its availability and encourage participation in the program by students who are not income-eligible.

The substitute permits the Department of Agriculture to grant a one-year waiver of the requirements of the substitute to a district that lacks the staff, facilities or equipment to offer a school breakfast program, or the means to finance the hiring or acquisition of the staff, facilities or equipment, if the school district submits a school breakfast plan by September 1, 2003 and requests a waiver for a specific school. A school district that requests a waiver shall provide specific information to the Department of Agriculture to justify its request for the waiver.

Currently, school district participation in the federal School Breakfast Program is voluntary. The mandatory participation provision of this substitute is needed because New Jersey now ranks last in the nation for school breakfast participation. Only 38% of the State's school districts serve school breakfasts, as compared to the 88% rate for school districts participating in the federal School Lunch Program.

While the FY 2002 State Budget provided \$2,488,000 to increase the subsidized portion of this program, the number of new school districts participating in the program has not risen significantly. In other states where mandatory participation has been legislatively required, the participation rates are dramatically higher. Since this program is primarily supported by federal funds, which are allocated according to the number of breakfasts actually served, more federal dollars would be forthcoming as more school districts participate in this program.

This substitute is identical to the Assembly Committee Substitute for Assembly Nos. 2293 and 2709 (Watson Coleman/Gusciora/Ahern/Cohen/Heck/Weinberg), which was also reported by this committee on this date.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS:

The committee amendments:

- ! delete the three-year implementation schedule for school breakfast programs;
- ! require that school districts submit a plan for the establishment of school breakfast programs in the district's schools to the State Department of Agriculture by September 1, 2003 and specify the duty of the Department of Agriculture regarding the plan;

- ! require a school district to establish a school breakfast program in each of its schools by September 1, 2004;
- ! provide that if a school district does not submit a plan for a breakfast program, the district shall establish a school breakfast program in each of its schools based on a model plan provided to the district by the Department of Agriculture;
- ! provide that school districts encourage participation in the program by students who are not income-eligible;
- ! permit the Department of Agriculture to grant a one-year waiver of the requirements of the substitute to a school district if the district submits a school breakfast plan by September 1, 2003 and requests a waiver for a specific school;
- ! delete the requirement allowing the Department of Agriculture to grant a one-year waiver of the requirements of the substitute to any high school subject to the requirements of the substitute if 50% or more of the eligible students decline to participate in the school breakfast program during any year of the program; and
- ! delete language that clarifies that nothing in the substitute shall be deemed to prevent a school district from implementing a school breakfast program during an earlier year than required by the provisions of the substitute.

Finally, the amendments require the Department of Agriculture, in consultation with the Department of Education, to adopt rules and regulations concerning the revision of school breakfast plans for schools that have a participation rate of less than 50% of eligible students in a school breakfast program during any year of the program, and replace a reference to "deemed" with "construed."

DATED: NOVEMBER 14, 2002

The Assembly Appropriations Committee reports favorably Senate Bill No. 1498 (SCS/1R), with committee amendments.

Senate Bill No. 1498 (SCS/1R), as amended, requires a public school operated by a local or regional school district of the State, with 20% or more students who are eligible for federally subsidized meals under the federal School Lunch or School Breakfast Programs, to establish a School Breakfast Program in the school.

The bill requires a school district to submit a plan for the establishment of school breakfast programs for each school in the school district subject to the requirements of the bill to the State Department of Agriculture by November 1, 2003 for schools with any one of the grades pre-K through sixth, and November 1, 2004 for all other subject schools. The Department of Agriculture shall:

- ! in consultation with the Department of Education, review each plan submitted and make recommendations, if necessary, on how the school breakfast program can operate within the limits of the federal and State reimbursement rates for the federal School Breakfast Program; and
- ! notify each school district that submitted a plan of the completion of its review and any recommended changes to the plan, within three months of the receipt of the plan, but no later than February following the date required for submission of the plan.

The bill requires a school district to establish a school breakfast program in each of its subject schools with any one of the grades pre-K through sixth based on the plan submitted by the district to the Department of Agriculture, by September 1, 2004, and all other subject schools by September 5, 2005.

The bill also requires that if a school district does not submit a plan by the required date, the district shall establish a school breakfast program in each of its subject schools for which no plan was submitted based on a model plan provided to the district by the Department of Agriculture. The model plan shall include recommendations on how the school can operate the program within the limits of the federal and State reimbursement rates for the federal School Breakfast Program. The department shall provide the model plan to the school district no later than March, 1 2004 for subject schools with any one of the grades pre-K through sixth, and March 1, 2005 for all other subject schools and the district shall establish the program in each of its subject schools based on the plan by September 1, 2004 for schools with grades pre-K through sixth and September 1, 2005 for all other schools.

The bill directs a school district to minimize the stigma sometimes attached to breakfast program students by developing a meal payment plan or a voucher system that will make participating students indistinguishable from students receiving non-subsidized breakfasts. The bill also requires that a school district implementing a school breakfast program publicize its availability to parents and students.

The bill permits the Department of Agriculture to grant a one-year waiver of the requirements to a district that lacks the staff, facilities or equipment to offer a school breakfast program, or the means to finance the hiring or acquisition of the staff, facilities or equipment, if the school district submits a school breakfast plan by the dates under the bill and requests a waiver for a specific school. A school district that requests a waiver shall provide specific information to the Department of Agriculture to justify its request for the waiver.

Currently, school district participation in the federal School Breakfast Program is voluntary. The mandatory participation provision is needed because New Jersey now ranks last in the nation for school breakfast participation. Only 38% of the State's school districts serve school breakfasts, as compared to the 88% rate for school districts participating in the federal School Lunch Program.

As amended and reported, the bill is identical to Assembly Bill Nos. 2293 and 2709 (ACS) as also amended and reported by this committee.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The annual State cost of this bill is estimate to be in the range of \$570,000 (if the current average 20% participation rate of eligible students carries through to the new program) to \$3 million maximum (if all eligible students participated in the breakfast program). This estimate is based on the State incurring an additional cost of 0.10 per student per meal. The federal portion could be up to \$14 million for 100 percent participation by eligible students.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS:

The amendments make the program a two-tiered process, first with schools including one or more of the grades of pre-K through

sixth and then all other schools subject to the requirements of the bill. The procedural and implementation dates were modified to reflect the two tiers' submission of plans and implementation of the program.

The amendments also emphasize a required commitment by school districts to support the breakfast program by changing a requirement that the districts "provide information" about the program to a requirement that the districts "promote" the program.

Since this program is primarily supported by federal reimbursement funds, which are allocated according to the number of breakfasts actually served, more federal dollars would be forthcoming as more school districts participate in this program.

The Senate Budget and Appropriations Committee reports favorably a committee substitute for Senate Bill No. 1498.

This substitute bill provides that whenever the low-income student population at a publicly funded school exceeds a specified proportion of its total enrollment, the school must establish a school breakfast program that meets the standards established for the State school breakfast program administered by the New Jersey Department of Agriculture.

The State's school breakfast program is operated by participating school districts under the general administration of the department's Division of Child Nutrition Programs. For the district to qualify as a participating district under the State program, it must sponsor the provision to its students of a breakfast that meets federal standards for nutrition and caloric content. A breakfast program sponsor may establish charges for the meals it provides, but students from households with income below certain levels established annually by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) must be eligible for free or reduced-price breakfasts. For the 2002-03 school year, the USDA's guidelines provide that a student from a family of four with annual household income of not more than \$23,530 qualifies for a free breakfast, while one whose household income is higher, but not more than \$33,485, qualifies for a reduced-price breakfast.

A district that the Division determines to be qualified under the federal guidelines is eligible for cash reimbursement from both the federal government and the State for the breakfasts provided under its sponsorship. The federal portion of the meal reimbursement is at rates established annually by the USDA; the State has in recent years provided additional reimbursement at a flat \$.10 per meal. The current combined State-federal meal reimbursement rates for school breakfasts are: for a free breakfast, \$1.27; for a reduced-price breakfast, \$.97; for a breakfast for which a full price is charged, \$.32. Additional federal reimbursement is available to a school if free or reduced-price meals comprise more than 40% of the total number of breakfasts served to its students and the cost of preparing those breakfasts is unusually high.

Currently, school districts are not required to sponsor a school breakfast program. Under this bill, sponsorship of such programs will become mandatory for schools in which the proportion of prior-year enrollment eligible for free or reduced-price meals was at or above a specified level. For the 2002-03 school year, this triggering level is set at 40%; for the 2003-04 school year, the triggering level will fall to 35%; in subsequent school years, the triggering level will be 20%.

COMPARISON OF SUBSTITUTE

The committee substitute incorporates additional provisions not included in the bill as introduced, as follows (1) a statement of legislative findings, (2) a requirement that school districts implementing a school breakfast program under the legislation shall make reasonable efforts to notify parents and students of its availability, (3) a requirement that any such school district shall attempt to ensure that the program is not administered in a way that results in public disclosure of whether or not a student is eligible for a subsidized breakfast, (4) a requirement that any school seeking a waiver of its obligation under the legislation to provide a school breakfast program shall provide evidence of its eligibility for that waiver, and (5) a requirement that the Department of Agriculture, in issuing regulations to implement the legislation, shall consult with the New Jersey Department of Education.

FISCAL IMPACT

The Office of Legislative Services (OLS) estimates that the enactment of this bill will not have a substantial fiscal impact on the State because most program costs are covered by federal funds and support from participating school districts. Although the bill would produce additional claims for reimbursement under the current State subsidy (\$.10 per meal, as noted above), that subsidy is nevertheless subject to the annual appropriation process, and not governed by the provisions of the bill.

Any costs not covered by federal or State funding would be the responsibility of the districts. Such costs, however, could range from zero to relatively small amounts depending on the factors principally affecting program expenses: food ingredients, labor, and supplies. The cost of these items can vary depending on the use of donated foods, the number of students served, the amount of food preparation required, and local pay scales. In many cases, increases in unreimbursed costs can be offset by greater use of workers from federally subsidized programs, senior citizen associations, or other volunteer groups.

The Assembly Family, Women and Children's Services Committee reports favorably an Assembly Committee Substitute for Assembly Bill Nos. 2293 and 2709.

This committee substitute requires a public school operated by a local or regional school district of the State with 20% or more students who are eligible for federally subsidized meals under the federal School Lunch or School Breakfast Programs, to establish a School Breakfast Program in the school. The school district shall submit a plan for the establishment of school breakfast programs for each school in the school district subject to the requirements of the substitute to the State Department of Agriculture by September 1, 2003. The Department of Agriculture shall:

- ! in consultation with the Department of Education, review each plan submitted and make recommendations, if necessary, on how the school breakfast program can operate within the limits of the federal and State reimbursement rates for the federal School Breakfast Program; and
- ! notify each school district that submitted a plan of the completion of its review and any recommended changes to the plan, within three months of the receipt of the plan, but no later than December 1, 2003.

A school district shall establish a school breakfast program in each of its schools, based on the plan submitted by the district to the Department of Agriculture, by September 1, 2004.

The substitute also requires that if a school district does not submit a plan pursuant to section 2 of the substitute, the district shall establish a school breakfast program in each of its schools based on a model plan provided to the district by the Department of Agriculture. The model plan shall include recommendations on how the school can operate the program within the limits of the federal and State reimbursement rates for the federal School Breakfast Program. The department shall provide the model plan to the school district no later than February, 1 2004 and the district shall establish the program in each of its schools based on the plan by September 1, 2004.

The substitute directs a school district to minimize the stigma sometimes attached to breakfast program students by developing a meal payment plan or a voucher system that would make participating students indistinguishable from students receiving non-subsidized breakfasts. The substitute also requires that a school district implementing a school breakfast program shall make reasonable efforts to notify parents and students of its availability and encourage participation in the program by students who are not income-eligible.

The substitute permits the Department of Agriculture to grant a one-year waiver of the requirements of the substitute to a school in a district that lacks the staff, facilities or equipment to offer a school breakfast program, or the means to finance the hiring or acquisition of the staff, facilities or equipment, if the school district submits a school breakfast plan by September 1, 2003 and requests a waiver for a specific school. A school district that requests a waiver shall provide specific information to the Department of Agriculture to justify its request for the waiver.

Currently, school district participation in the federal School Breakfast Program is voluntary. The mandatory participation provision of this substitute is needed because New Jersey now ranks last in the nation for school breakfast participation. Only 38% of the State's school districts serve school breakfasts, as compared to the 88% rate for school districts participating in the federal School Lunch Program.

While the FY 2002 State Budget provided \$2,488,000 to increase the subsidized portion of this program, the number of new school districts participating in the program has not risen significantly. In other states where mandatory participation has been legislatively required, the participation rates are dramatically higher. Since this program is primarily supported by federal funds, which are allocated according to the number of breakfasts actually served, more federal dollars would be forthcoming as more school districts participate in this program.

The Assembly Appropriations Committee reports favorably Assembly Bill Nos. 2293 and 2709 (ACS), with committee amendments.

Assembly Bill Nos. 2293 and 2709 (ACS), as amended, requires a public school operated by a local or regional school district of the State, with 20% or more students who are eligible for federally subsidized meals under the federal School Lunch or School Breakfast Programs, to establish a School Breakfast Program in the school.

The bill requires a school district to submit a plan for the establishment of school breakfast programs for each school in the school district subject to the requirements of the bill to the State Department of Agriculture by November 1, 2003 for schools with any one of the grades pre-K through sixth, and November 1, 2004 for all other subject schools. The Department of Agriculture shall:

- ! in consultation with the Department of Education, review each plan submitted and make recommendations, if necessary, on how the school breakfast program can operate within the limits of the federal and State reimbursement rates for the federal School Breakfast Program; and
- ! notify each school district that submitted a plan of the completion of its review and any recommended changes to the plan, within three months of the receipt of the plan, but no later than February following the date required for submission of the plan.

The bill requires a school district to establish a school breakfast program in each of its subject schools with any one of the grades pre-K through sixth based on the plan submitted by the district to the Department of Agriculture, by September 1, 2004, and all other subject schools by September 5, 2005.

The bill also requires that if a school district does not submit a plan by the required date, the district shall establish a school breakfast program in each of its subject schools for which no plan was submitted based on a model plan provided to the district by the Department of Agriculture. The model plan shall include recommendations on how the school can operate the program within the limits of the federal and State reimbursement rates for the federal School Breakfast Program. The department shall provide the model plan to the school district no later than March, 1 2004 for subject schools with any one of the grades pre-K through sixth, and March 1, 2005 for all other subject schools and the district shall establish the program in each of its subject schools based on the plan by September 1, 2004 for schools with grades pre-K through sixth and September 1, 2005 for all other schools.

The bill directs a school district to minimize the stigma sometimes attached to breakfast program students by developing a meal payment plan or a voucher system that will make participating students indistinguishable from students receiving non-subsidized breakfasts. The bill also requires that a school district implementing a school breakfast program publicize its availability to parents and students.

The bill permits the Department of Agriculture to grant a one-year waiver of the requirements to a district that lacks the staff, facilities or equipment to offer a school breakfast program, or the means to finance the hiring or acquisition of the staff, facilities or equipment, if the school district submits a school breakfast plan by the dates under the bill and requests a waiver for a specific school. A school district that requests a waiver shall provide specific information to the Department of Agriculture to justify its request for the waiver.

Currently, school district participation in the federal School Breakfast Program is voluntary. The mandatory participation provision is needed because New Jersey now ranks last in the nation for school breakfast participation. Only 38% of the State's school districts serve school breakfasts, as compared to the 88% rate for school districts participating in the federal School Lunch Program.

As amended and reported, the bill is identical to Senate Bill No. 1498 (SCS/1R) as also amended and reported by this committee.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The annual State cost of this bill is estimate to be in the range of \$570,000 (if the current average 20% participation rate of eligible students carries through to the new program) to \$3 million maximum (if all eligible students participated in the breakfast program). This estimate is based on the State incurring an additional cost of 0.10 per student per meal. The federal portion could be up to \$14 million for 100 percent participation by eligible students.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS:

The amendments make the program a two-tiered process, first with schools including one or more of the grades of pre-K through sixth and then all other schools subject to the requirements of the bill. The procedural and implementation dates were modified to reflect the two tiers' submission of plans and implementation of the program.

The amendments also emphasize a required commitment by school districts to support the breakfast program by changing a requirement that the districts "provide information" about the program to a requirement that the districts "promote" the program.

- ! The bill requires the mandatory participation in the School Breakfast program of those public schools that have at least 20 percent of its students eligible for federally subsidized meals.
- ! The bill directs participating schools to make every effort to ensure that eligible students are not stigmatized for being program participants.

BILL DESCRIPTION

Assembly Bill No. 2293 of 2002 requires all schools with 20 percent or more students who are eligible for federally subsidized meals under the national School Lunch or School Breakfast Programs to implement a school breakfast program. This program is primarily supported by federal reimbursement funds, which are allocated according to the number of breakfasts actually served. The State also subsidizes a small portion of this program. Currently, school district participation in the School Breakfast Program is voluntary. The bill also directs school districts to minimize the stigma sometimes attached to breakfast program students by developing a meal payment system that would make such students indistinguishable from other students.



FISCAL ANALYSIS

EXECUTIVE BRANCH

OFFICE OF LEGISLATIVE SERVICES

The Office of Legislative Services (OLS) estimates that the bill's enactment will have no direct fiscal impact on the State Budget because most program costs are covered by federal monies and participating school districts. Although appropriations supporting the current State subsidy (\$0.10 per meal) may be in greater demand as a result of increased school participation under the bill, the State subsidy is nevertheless subject to the annual budget process rather than the bill's provisions.

With respect to the bill's fiscal impact on school districts, any costs not covered by federal or State funding would be the responsibility of the districts. Such costs, however, could range from zero to relatively small amounts depending on three major factors affecting program implementation, namely food, labor and supplies. Costs for these items can vary depending on the use of donated foods, the number of students served, the amount of food preparation required, or local pay scales. In many cases, federal and State reimbursements will cover all such costs. In other cases, unreimbursed costs can be mitigated by hiring workers from federally subsidized programs, senior citizen associations, or from other volunteer groups. Schools identified as "severe need schools" may also qualify for special State ("Abbott district") reimbursements.

Last, the OLS estimates that school districts would likely incur little or no costs to establish or modify meal payment systems that would make participating students indistinguishable from students receiving non-subsidized breakfasts. Examples of such systems are already operating in New Jersey and in other parts of the country. In most cases, system adaptation could probably be implemented using existing school district resources along with technical assistance from the Bureau of Child Nutrition.

AN ACT concerning the implementation of school breakfast programs 2 and supplementing Title 18A of the New Jersey Statutes.

BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

- 1. The Legislature finds and declares that:
- a. The School Breakfast Program is a federally assisted meal program operating in public and nonprofit private schools and residential child care institutions nationwide, and supplying to each participating child at least one-fourth of the nutrients needed daily;
- b. The School Breakfast Program was established by the federal government in 1966 with the purpose of providing a nutritious, well-balanced breakfast to promote sound eating habits, and fostering good health and academic achievement for school-age children;
- c. New Jersey ranks fiftieth in the nation for participation in the School Breakfast Program by schools offering school lunch, and has seen only modest increases in participation in recent years;
- d. Research shows that school breakfast increases attendance and decreases tardiness, improves academic performance both in class and on standardized tests, improves attentiveness, and reduces emotional and behavioral problems among students from all backgrounds; and
- e. Therefore, it is clearly in the public interest for the State to require that school districts with large populations of students eligible for federally subsidized meals offer the School Breakfast Program and publicize the program in their communities.

2. a. A public school operated by a local or regional school district of the State in which 20% or more of the students enrolled in the school on October 1 of the preceding school year were eligible for free or reduced price meals under the federal School Lunch Program or the federal School Breakfast Program, shall establish a School Breakfast Program in the school.

The school district shall submit a plan for the establishment of school breakfast programs for each school in the district subject to the requirements of this section that is in compliance with and pursuant to the School Breakfast Program administered by the State Department of Agriculture. The plan ¹for each school ¹ shall be submitted to the Department of Agriculture by ¹[September 1, 2003] the date required by subsection b. of this section ¹ in a form and manner prescribed by the Secretary of Agriculture.

- b. ¹(1) A school district shall submit a plan for all grades of each school that has one or more of the grades pre-K through sixth grade and for which a plan is required by subsection a. of this section on or before November 1, 2003.
- 5 (2) A school district shall submit a plan for all grades of each 6 school that is not described in paragraph (1) of this subsection and for 7 which a plan is required by subsection a. of this section on or before 8 November 1, 2004.
- 9 <u>c.</u>¹ The Department of Agriculture, in consultation with the Department of Education, shall review each school breakfast plan submitted pursuant to this section and make recommendations, if 12 necessary, on how the school breakfast program can operate within the 13 limits of the federal and State reimbursement rates for the federal 14 School Breakfast Program.

The Department of Agriculture may grant a one-year waiver of the requirements of this act to a school in a school district subject to the requirements of this act that lacks the staff, facilities or equipment to offer a school breakfast program, or the means to finance the hiring or acquisition of such staff, facilities or equipment, if the district submits a school breakfast plan to the department ¹[by September 1, 2003] pursuant to the requirements of section 2 of P.L., c. (C.)(pending before the Legislature as this bill) ¹ and requests a waiver for ¹[a] the ¹ specific school.
- b. A school district that requests a waiver pursuant to this section shall provide such information as the Department of Agriculture shall specify pursuant to regulation to justify the request. The information shall include, but not be limited to, a description of the specific impediments to implementing the program, the specific actions that will be taken to remove those impediments and the specific steps required to successfully implement the program in the following school year.

 5. Nothing in this act shall be construed to prevent a school district not subject to this act from implementing a school breakfast program pursuant to section 2 of this act.
