This telephone number shall be listed on the notices posted in medical offices, maternal and child health and nutrition programs, on the guide prepared by the Department of Environmental Protection and on all fishing licenses issued after the effective date of the bill.

While mercury is widespread in the environment, the most likely exposure for humans is by eating mercury contaminated fish. The amount of mercury in fish depends upon the species of fish, where the fish has lived and its size. Even though most fish are safe to eat, people who eat large amounts of fish may accumulate significant amounts of mercury over time. This accumulation of mercury is a particular problem for women in the months just prior to and during pregnancy because a developing fetus is especially susceptible to the harmful effects of mercury. Mercury affects fetal development by preventing the brain and nervous system from developing normally. Affected children show lowered intelligence, impaired hearing and poor coordination, and their verbal and motor skills may be delayed.

The committee amended the bill to include advisories about marine and estuarine fish, as well as fresh water fish, as the Department of Environmental Protection deems appropriate. Amendments also delete the requirement that the Department of Environmental Protection distribute sufficient copies of the guide to fishing license issuers and provide, instead, that the department make the guide available to the issuers. Also, the requirement that the guide be distributed to all fishing license applicants is deleted and replaced with a requirement that all applicants be provided with a copy of the guide or advised how to obtain a copy of the guide, at no charge.

(2) delete the section in the bill requiring the DEP, in consultation with the DHSS, to establish and maintain a telephone number for residents to call to obtain information about mercury health advisories for the consumption of fresh water fish.
