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#### P.L. 2003, CHAPTER 226, approved January 9, 2004 Assembly, No. 2604 (First Reprint)

AN ACT concerning the right of way of certain <sup>1</sup>[public]<sup>1</sup> buses and 1 supplementing Title 39 of the Revised Statutes. 2 3 **BE IT ENACTED** by the Senate and General Assembly of the State 4 5 of New Jersey: 6 1. a. The driver of a non-emergency vehicle upon a highway shall 7 yield the right of way to any bus, <sup>1</sup>[as defined in section 2 of 8 P.L.1979, c.33 (C.32:2-23.28),]<sup>1</sup> provided that: 9 <sup>1</sup>[(a) A yield sign, as described in this subsection, is displayed on 10 the back of the bus and is properly operated and maintained; 11 (b)] (1) <sup>1</sup> The driver is operating a vehicle that is in a position to 12 overtake the bus from its rear; and 13  ${}^{1}[(c)] (2)^{1}$  The bus, after exiting an active traffic lane for the 14 purpose of stopping to receive or discharge passengers is attempting 15 16 to reenter the lane from which it exited and to enter the traffic lane occupied by the driver by signaling its intention to do so. No other 17 18 lane changes shall be applicable. <sup>1</sup><u>As used in this act, "bus" means a bus as defined in section 3 of</u> 19 P.L. 1995, c.225 (C. 48:4-2.1e), in regular scheduled service, and a 20 motorbus operated in regular route service pursuant to P.L. 1979, 21 <u>c.150 (C. 27:25 -1 et seq.)</u>.<sup>1</sup> 22 23 <sup>1</sup>[(3) A yield right-of-way sign, which shall be placed on the left rear of the bus, shall warn a driver of a motor vehicle approaching the 24 25 rear of a bus that the driver shall yield when the bus is reentering traffic. The yield sign shall be illuminated by a flashing light when the 26 27 bus driver signals an intention to enter an active traffic lane after the bus has stopped to receive or discharge passengers.]<sup>1</sup> 28 <sup>1</sup>[(4)] <u>b.</u><sup>1</sup> The <sup>1</sup>[director] <u>New Jersey Transit Corporation</u><sup>1</sup> shall 29 conduct a public education program to inform motorists of the 30 requirements imposed by this section relating to bus rights-of-way. 31 <sup>1</sup>[(5)] <u>c.</u><sup>1</sup> The <sup>1</sup>[Director of the Division of Motor Vehicles shall 32 33 adopt rules and regulations governing the message or messages on the yield sign, specifications for the size, shape, color, lettering and 34 35 illumination of the sign and specifications for the placement of the sign 36 on a bus] Commissioner of Transportation shall study the need for 37 further action to effectuate the purposes of this 2002 amendatory act 38 and shall, no later than 18 months after the effective date of this 2002 amendatory act, report to the Governor and the Legislature.<sup>1</sup> 39

SYNOPSIS

Establishes right of way of certain public buses.

**CURRENT VERSION OF TEXT** As introduced.



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1 AN ACT concerning the right of way of certain public buses and 2 supplementing Title 39 of the Revised Statutes. 3 4 **BE IT ENACTED** by the Senate and General Assembly of the State 5 of New Jersey: 6 7 1. a. This act shall take effect on the first day of the seventh month 14 after enactment. 15 16 17 **STATEMENT** 18 19 This bill would require motorists, other than emergency vehicle 20 operators, to yield to public buses exhibiting a lighted, flashing yield 21 sign. The yield rule would apply only when a bus is returning to traffic 22 from a bus stop or from a stopped, standing or parked position where 23 it was receiving or discharging passengers. 24 The requirement would apply only to vehicles approaching the bus 25 from the rear. Unlike the school bus law, it would apply only to 26 vehicles in the curb lane. Vehicles in other lanes in the same direction 27 and traffic in the opposite direction would not be affected. The bus 28 would be expected to use the yield light in order to give vehicles 29 adequate opportunity to yield. That light, to be placed on the left rear of the bus, would not be used for lane changes or other merges. A 30 31 driver who violates the provisions of the bill would be subject to a 32 penalty of \$50 to \$200, up to15 days imprisonment, or both, and two 33 motor vehicle points. 34 The bill requires the Director of the Division of Motor Vehicles to submit a report to the Governor and the Legislature 18 months after 35 the bill's effective date. The report would focus on the impact of the 36 37 bill's requirements on highway and local road safety and the efficiency 38 of transit operations and recommend whether or not the program 39 should be continued. The director, in consultation with transit 40 agencies and local law enforcement agencies, would also address 41 traffic congestion issues and public opinion issues. Since buses that 42 are parked off the road are now expected to yield to traffic before 43 entering the road again, the bill requires the director to mount a public 44 education program, to inform motorists of the new requirements. 45 This new rule of the road, which has begun operation in several jurisdictions on the West Coast and Canada, is designed to keep traffic 46

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- 1 moving and make the roads safer. Sometimes motorists are behind a
- 2 bus and they are not certain if they can pass it or not. Or, sometimes
- 3 a bus cannot get back into the active lane of traffic after pulling over
- 4 to let passengers off. Both of these situations can slow traffic behind
- 5 a bus. The new rule of the road will help buses merge safely back into
- 6 the active lane of traffic after pulling over into a bus stop.

# STATE OF NEW JERSEY

#### DATED: SEPTEMBER 12, 2002

The Assembly Transportation Committee reports favorably and with committee amendments Assembly Bill No. 2604.

This amended bill would require motorists, other than emergency vehicle operators, to yield to a bus which is signaling to return to traffic from a bus stop or from a stopped, standing or parked position where it was receiving or discharging passengers.

The amended bill provides that the New Jersey Transit Corporation shall conduct a public education program to inform motorists of the requirements imposed by this section relating to bus rights-of-way.

The amended bill also provides that the Commissioner of Transportation shall study the need for further action to effectuate the purposes of this bill and shall report to the Governor and the Legislature within 18 months of the effective date of the bill.

#### COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS

The Committee's amendments clarify the definition of bus for purposes of this bill.

The Committee's amendments remove the requirement that the bus must have an illuminated and flashing yield right-of-way sign on the left rear of the bus for the requirement to yield to be in effect.

The responsibility for a public education program was changed from the Director of the Division of Motor Vehicles to the New Jersey Transit Corporation.

The requirement to report to the Governor and Legislature was changed from the Director of the Division of Motor Vehicles to the Commissioner of Transportation and the specific requirements for the report were modified.

The Senate Transportation Committee reports favorably Assembly Bill No. 2604 (1R).

This bill would require motorists, other than emergency vehicle operators, to yield to a bus which is signaling to return to traffic from a bus stop or from a stopped, standing or parked position where it was receiving or discharging passengers.

The bill provides that the New Jersey Transit Corporation shall conduct a public education program to inform motorists of the requirements imposed by this section relating to bus rights-of-way.

The bill also provides that the Commissioner of Transportation shall study the need for further action to effectuate the purposes of this bill and shall report to the Governor and the Legislature within 18 months of the effective date of the bill.
