This bill was prefiled for introduction in the 2002-2003 session pending technical review. As reported, the bill includes the changes required by technical review which has been performed.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS:

- c amend N.J.S.A.18A:61D-7 to require that each four-year institution of higher education in New Jersey include information about the meningococcal vaccination requirement with the information about meningitis and the availability and benefits of a meningococcal vaccination that it is required to provide under current law to all prospective students prior to their matriculation;
- C limit the institutions of higher education to which the provisions of the bill would apply to universities or colleges that provide a fouryear program of instruction;

- -- a written statement submitted to the institution of higher education by the student, or the student's parent or guardian if the student is a minor, explaining how the administration of the vaccine conflicts with the bona fide religious tenets or practices of the student, or the parent or guardian, as appropriate; except that a general

philosophical or moral objection to the vaccination is not sufficient for an exemption on religious grounds.

As reported, this bill is identical to Senate Bill No. 1655 SCA (Vitale), which the committee also reported on this date.
