1 **AN ACT** concerning certain acts of discrimination and amending P.L.1945, c.169.

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4 **BE IT ENACTED** by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

- b. "Employment agency" includes any person undertaking to procure employees or opportunities for others to work.

"Labor organization" includes any organization which exists and 18 is constituted for the purpose, in whole or in part, of collective 19 bargaining, or of dealing with employers concerning grievances, terms 20 or conditions of employment, or of other mutual aid or protection in 21 connection with employment.
 - d. "Unlawful employment practice" and "unlawful discrimination" include only those unlawful practices and acts specified in section 11 of this act.
- e. "Employer" includes all persons as defined in subsection a. of this section unless otherwise specifically exempt under another section of this act, and includes the State, any political or civil subdivision thereof, and all public officers, agencies, boards or bodies.
- f. "Employee" does not include any individual employed in the domestic service of any person.
- g. "Liability for service in the Armed Forces of the United States"
 means subject to being ordered as an individual or member of an
 organized unit into active service in the Armed Forces of the United
 States by reason of membership in the National Guard, naval militia or

44 n. The term "real property" includes real estate, lands, tenements 45 and hereditaments, corporeal and incorporeal, and leaseholds, 46 provided, however, that, except as to publicly assisted housing

1 accommodations, the provisions of this act shall not apply to the 2 rental: (1) of a single apartment or flat in a two-family dwelling, the 3 other occupancy unit of which is occupied by the owner as a residence 4 or the household of the owner's family at the time of such rental; or (2) of a room or rooms to another person or persons by the owner or 5 6 occupant of a one-family dwelling occupied by the owner or occupant 7 as a residence or the household of the owner's or occupant's family at 8 the time of such rental. "Real estate broker" includes a person, firm or corporation who, for a fee, commission or other valuable consideration, or by reason of promise or reasonable expectation thereof, lists for sale, sells, exchanges, buys or rents, or offers or attempts to negotiate a sale, exchange, purchase, or rental of real estate or an interest therein, or collects or offers or attempts to collect rent for the use of real estate, or solicits for prospective purchasers or assists or directs in the procuring of prospects or the negotiation or closing of any transaction which does or is contemplated to result in the sale, exchange, leasing, renting or auctioning of any real estate, or negotiates, or offers or attempts or agrees to negotiate a loan secured or to be secured by mortgage or other encumbrance upon or transfer of any real estate for others; or any person who, for pecuniary gain or expectation of pecuniary gain conducts a public or private competitive sale of lands or any interest in lands. In the sale of lots, the term "real estate broker" shall also include any person, partnership, association or corporation employed by or on behalf of the owner or owners of lots or other parcels of real estate, at a stated salary, or upon a commission, or upon a salary and commission or otherwise, to sell such real estate, or any parts thereof, in lots or other parcels, and who shall sell or exchange, or offer or attempt or agree to negotiate the sale or exchange, of any such lot or parcel of real estate.

"Real estate salesperson" includes any person who, for compensation, valuable consideration or commission, or other thing of value, or by reason of a promise or reasonable expectation thereof, is employed by and operates under the supervision of a licensed real estate broker to sell or offer to sell, buy or offer to buy or negotiate the purchase, sale or exchange of real estate, or offers or attempts to

1 negotiate a loan secured or to be secured by a mortgage or other 2 encumbrance upon or transfer of real estate, or to lease or rent, or 3 offer to lease or rent any real estate for others, or to collect rents for 4 the use of real estate, or to solicit for prospective purchasers or lessees of real estate, or who is employed by a licensed real estate broker to 5 6 sell or offer to sell lots or other parcels of real estate, at a stated 7 salary, or upon a commission, or upon a salary and commission, or 8 otherwise to sell real estate, or any parts thereof, in lots or other 9 parcels.

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- q. "Handicapped" means suffering from physical disability, infirmity, malformation or disfigurement which is caused by bodily injury, birth defect or illness including epilepsy and other seizure disorders, and which shall include, but not be limited to, any degree of paralysis, amputation, lack of physical coordination, blindness or visual impediment, deafness or hearing impediment, muteness or speech impediment or physical reliance on a service or guide dog, wheelchair, or other remedial appliance or device, or from any mental, psychological or developmental disability resulting from anatomical, psychological, physiological or neurological conditions which prevents the normal exercise of any bodily or mental functions or is demonstrable, medically or psychologically, by accepted clinical or laboratory diagnostic techniques. Handicapped shall also mean suffering from AIDS or HIV infection.
- r. "Blind person" means any individual whose central visual acuity does not exceed 20/200 in the better eye with correcting lens or whose visual acuity is better than 20/200 if accompanied by a limit to the field of vision in the better eye to such a degree that its widest diameter subtends an angle of no greater than 20 degrees.
- s. "Guide dog" means a dog used to assist deaf persons or which is fitted with a special harness so as to be suitable as an aid to the mobility of a blind person, and is used by a blind person who has satisfactorily completed a specific course of training in the use of such a dog, and has been trained by an organization generally recognized by agencies involved in the rehabilitation of the blind or deaf as reputable and competent to provide dogs with training of this type.
- "Guide or service dog trainer" means any person who is employed by an organization generally recognized by agencies involved in the rehabilitation of the blind, handicapped or deaf as reputable and competent to provide dogs with training, and who is actually involved in the training process.
- u. "Housing accommodation" means any publicly assisted housing accommodation or any real property, or portion thereof, which is used or occupied, or is intended, arranged, or designed to be used or 44 occupied, as the home, residence or sleeping place of one or more persons, but shall not include any single family residence the occupants 46 of which rent, lease, or furnish for compensation not more than one

1 room therein.

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- v. "Public facility" means any place of public accommodation and any street, highway, sidewalk, walkway, public building, and any other place or structure to which the general public is regularly, normally or customarily permitted or invited.
- w. "Deaf person" means any person whose hearing is so severely impaired that the person is unable to hear and understand normal conversational speech through the unaided ear alone, and who must depend primarily on a supportive device or visual communication such as writing, lip reading, sign language, and gestures.
 - x. "Atypical hereditary cellular or blood trait" means sickle cell trait, hemoglobin C trait, thalassemia trait, Tay-Sachs trait, or cystic fibrosis trait.
- 14 y. "Sickle cell trait" means the condition wherein the major natural 15 hemoglobin components present in the blood of the individual are hemoglobin A (normal) and hemoglobin S (sickle hemoglobin) as 16 17 defined by standard chemical and physical analytic techniques, including electrophoresis; and the proportion of hemoglobin A is 18 19 greater than the proportion of hemoglobin S or one natural parent of 20 the individual is shown to have only normal hemoglobin components 21 (hemoglobin A, hemoglobin A2, hemoglobin F) in the normal 22 proportions by standard chemical and physical analytic tests.
 - z. "Hemoglobin C trait" means the condition wherein the major natural hemoglobin components present in the blood of the individual are hemoglobin A (normal) and hemoglobin C as defined by standard chemical and physical analytic techniques, including electrophoresis; and the proportion of hemoglobin A is greater than the proportion of hemoglobin C or one natural parent of the individual is shown to have only normal hemoglobin components (hemoglobin A, hemoglobin A2, hemoglobin F) in normal proportions by standard chemical and physical analytic tests.
- aa. "Thalassemia trait" means the presence of the thalassemia gene
 which in combination with another similar gene results in the chronic
 hereditary disease Cooley's anemia.
- bb. "Tay-Sachs trait" means the presence of the Tay-Sachs gene
 which in combination with another similar gene results in the chronic
 hereditary disease Tay-Sachs.
- 38 cc. "Cystic fibrosis trait" means the presence of the cystic fibrosis 39 gene which in combination with another similar gene results in the 40 chronic hereditary disease cystic fibrosis.
- dd. "Service dog" means any dog individually trained to a handicapped person's requirements including, but not limited to minimal protection work, rescue work, pulling a wheelchair or retrieving dropped items. This term shall include a "seizure dog" trained to alert or otherwise assist persons subject to epilepsy or other seizure disorders.

- ee. "Qualified Medicaid applicant" means an individual who is a 1 2 qualified applicant pursuant to P.L.1968, c.413 (C.30:4D-1 et seq.).
- 3 ff. "AIDS" means acquired immune deficiency syndrome as defined 4 by the Centers for Disease Control of the United States Public Health 5 Service.
- "HIV infection" means infection with the human 6 gg. 7 immunodeficiency virus or any other related virus identified as a 8 probable causative agent of AIDS.
- 9 hh. "Affectional or sexual orientation" means male or female 10 heterosexuality, homosexuality or bisexuality by inclination, practice, identity or expression, having a history thereof or being perceived, 11 12 presumed or identified by others as having such an orientation.
- 13 ii. "Heterosexuality" means affectional, emotional or physical 14 attraction or behavior which is primarily directed towards persons of 15 the other gender.
- jj. "Homosexuality" means affectional, emotional or physical 16 attraction or behavior which is primarily directed towards persons of 17 18 the same gender.
- 19 kk. "Bisexuality" means affectional, emotional or physical 20 attraction or behavior which is directed towards persons of either 21
- 22 II. "Familial status" means being the natural parent of a child, the adoptive parent of a child, the foster parent of a child, having a "parent and child relationship" with a child as defined by State law, or having sole or joint legal or physical custody, care, guardianship, or visitation 26 with a child, or any person who is pregnant or is in the process of securing legal custody of any individual who has not attained the age 28 of 18 years.
- 29 mm. "Housing for older persons" means housing:

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- 30 (1) provided under any State or federal program that the Attorney 31 General determines is specifically designed and operated to assist 32 elderly persons (as defined in the State or federal program); or
- 33 (2) intended for, and solely occupied by persons 62 years of age or 34 older; or
- (3) intended and operated for occupancy by at least one person 55 35 years of age or older per unit. In determining whether housing 36 37 qualifies as housing for older persons under this subsection, the 38 Attorney General shall adopt regulations which require at least the 39 following factors:
- 40 (a) the existence of significant facilities and services specifically 41 designed to meet the physical or social needs of older persons, or if the provision of such facilities and services is not practicable, that such 42 housing is necessary to provide important housing opportunities for 43 44 older persons; and

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2. This act shall take effect immediately.

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STATEMENT

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This bill grants dogs trained to assist persons who suffer from epilepsy and other seizure disorders the same protections under State law as are currently afforded to other helping dogs.

Seizure dogs have proven to be invaluable to their owners both in alerting them to imminent seizures and assisting them during and after a seizure. However, these dogs, accompanied by their owners, may be banned from restaurants and other public facilities because the owners do not appear to be blind or otherwise handicapped.

This bill specifically includes "seizure dogs" in the definition of "service dogs," which serve the physically handicapped, in the New Jersey "Law Against Discrimination," P.L.1945, c.169. This law grants persons accompanied by a "guide dog" or "service dog" full and equal privileges at all places of public accommodation and all other places to which the public is normally permitted or invited.

A person who violates the "Law Against Discrimination," in addition to any other relief or affirmative action provided by law, is subject to a penalty of not more than \$2,000 for a first offense and not

The Senate Economic Growth, Agriculture and Tourism Committee reports favorably Senate Bill No. 2010.

This bill grants dogs, trained to assist persons who suffer from epilepsy and other seizure disorders, the same protections under State law as are currently afforded to other helping dogs.

Seizure dogs have proven to be invaluable to their owners both in alerting them to imminent seizures and in assisting them during and after a seizure. However, these dogs, accompanied by their owners, may be banned from restaurants and other public facilities because the owners do not appear to be blind or otherwise handicapped.

The bill specifically includes "seizure dogs" in the definition of "service dogs," which serve the physically handicapped, in the New Jersey "Law Against Discrimination," P.L.1945, c.169 (C.10.5-1 et seq.). That law grants persons accompanied by a "guide dog" or "service dog" full and equal privileges at all places of public accommodation and all other places to which the public is normally permitted or invited.

Persons who violate the "Law Against Discrimination," in addition to any other relief or affirmative action provided by law, are subject to a penalty of up to \$10,000 if they have no prior violations in the last five years, a penalty of up to \$25,000 if they have committed one other violation in the last five years, and a penalty of up to \$50,000 if they have committed two or more violations in the last seven years.
