The Assembly Appropriations Committee reports favorably Senate Bill No. 1432 (1R) with committee amendments.

Senate Bill No. 1432 (1R), as amended, revises the statute authorizing municipalities to pay pensions to the widow and minor children of local volunteer personnel who die in the course of volunteer service.

Under the bill:

- (1) The class of personnel potentially covered for the pension, which presently includes volunteer firefighters, first aid workers, and rescue squad workers, is expanded to include emergency medical technicians;
- (2) The class of survivors eligible to receive the pension is expanded to include widowers as well as widows, children if the widow remarries and parents if there is no widow or children.
- (3) The pension, currently payable by and at the option of the municipality, will be mandatory and payable by the State for volunteers dying on or after January 1, 2000. The municipality is to determine survivors' eligibility for the benefit, and is specifically authorized under the legislation to find such eligibility when the volunteer's death occurs as the person is responding to, preparing for, or returning from an emergency while under orders from a competent authority; and
- (4) The amount of the pension is increased from \$5,000 per year to \$15,000 per year, and \$10,000 or \$5,000 depending on the survivor's relationship to the decreased.

As amended and reported, this bill is identical to Assembly Bill No. 2191 (1R), as also amended and reported by the committee.

FISCAL IMPACT

The Office of Legislative Services estimates that the cost to the State of the pension benefits for volunteers provided in this bill will be approximately \$30,000 in the first year and increase by \$15,000 per year for the foreseeable future. In the approximate three years since January 1, 2000, two volunteer firefighters died as a result of injuries

sustained in the course of volunteer service, and the survivors of each of these firefighters will be eligible for the State-paid pension upon enactment of the legislation. Information from the Division of Public Safety and Occupational Safety and Health in the Department of Labor indicates that, since 1990, a total of eight volunteers (including the two firefighters) have died in service, suggesting that in the future, one new additional pension may become payable as frequently as annually.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS:

The committee amendments change receipt of the pension concerning surviving spouses, if remarried; children of a remarried surviving spouse; and parent, if no surviving spouse or children. The amounts are modified to be \$15,000, \$10,000 or \$5,000 depending on the survivor's relationship to the deceased. Technical definitions were also added.

The Senate Community and Urban Affairs Committee reports favorably and with committee amendments Senate Bill No. 1432.

As amended by the committee, this bill would allow each municipal governing body, by resolution, to determine whether the family of a volunteer firefighter, first aid worker, rescue squad worker or emergency medical technician who died in the line of duty is eligible for a \$15,000 per anum survivor's pension. Under the bill as amended, the State would provide for payment of the survivor's pension.

Current law does not specifically include emergency medical technicians, who are a common class of emergency services workers, among those who may be eligible for a survivor's pension. Under current law, a survivor's pension may not exceed \$5,000 annually and the local governing body is responsible for providing payments.

The committee amended the bill to provide that a municipal governing body may determine that the widow or minor children of a volunteer is eligible for a survivor's pension whenever a volunteer dies while responding to, preparing for or returning from an emergency while under orders from a competent authority.

The Senate Budget and Appropriations Committee reports favorably Senate Bill No. 1432 (1R).

This bill revises the statute authorizing municipalities to pay pensions to the widow and minor children of local volunteer personnel who die in the course of volunteer service.

Under the bill:

- (1) The class of personnel potentially covered for the pension, which presently includes volunteer firefighters, first aid workers, and rescue squad workers, is expanded to include emergency medical technicians:
- (2) The class of survivors eligible to receive the pension is expended to include widowers as well as widows;
- (3) The pension, currently payable by and at the option of the municipality, will be mandatory and payable by the State for volunteers dying on or after January 1, 2000. The municipality is to determine survivors' eligibility for the benefit, and is specifically authorized under the legislation to find such eligibility when the volunteer's death occurs as the person is responding to, preparing for, or returning from an emergency while under orders from a competent authority; and
- (4) The amount of the pension is increased from \$5,000 per year to \$15,000 per year.

FISCAL IMPACT

The Office of Legislative Services estimates that the cost to the State of the pension benefits for volunteers provided in this bill will be \$30,000 in the first year and increase by \$15,000 per year for the foreseeable future. In the three years since January 1, 2000, two volunteer firefighters died as a result of injuries sustained in the course of volunteer service, and the survivors of each of these firefighters will be eligible for the State-paid pension upon enactment of the legislation. Information from the Division of Public Safety and Occupational Safety and Health in the Department of Labor indicates that, over the 13 years since 1990, a total of eight volunteers (including the two firefighters) have died in service, suggesting that in the future, one new pension may become payable as frequently as annually.

- ! Senate Bill No. 1432 (1R) of 2002 requires the payment by the State of an annual survivor's pension in the amount of \$15,000 to the surviving spouse or minor children of volunteer firefighters, first aid or rescue squad workers or emergency medical technicians who die as a result of injuries sustained in the performance of their volunteer duties. Under current law, the payment of such a pension is voluntary, is paid for by the municipality served by the deceased volunteer, and cannot exceed \$5,000 annually.
- ! The Office of Legislative Services (OLS) anticipates the first year cost to the State of the pension benefit for volunteers provided in this bill to be \$30,000, based on the deaths of two volunteer firefighters during calendar year 2002 as a result of injuries sustained in the performance of their duties as volunteer firefighters.
- Information received by the OLS from the Department of Labor, Division of Public Safety and Occupational Safety and Health indicates that since 1990, seven volunteer firefighters and one emergency medical technician have died as a result of injuries sustained in the performance of their volunteer duties. The deaths of eight volunteers over a period of thirteen years averages out to 0.62 deaths per year. Given this rate, the OLS estimates that one additional survivor's pension per year would result under this bill. Therefore, the OLS estimates that the cost to the State for the second year will be \$45,000 and the cost to the State for the third year will be \$60,000.



BILL DESCRIPTION

Senate Bill No. 1432 (1R) of 2002 would provide an annual survivor's pension of \$15,000 to the spouse or minor children of a volunteer firefighter, first aid worker, rescue squad worker or emergency medical technician who died in the line of duty. The governing body of the municipality served by the deceased volunteer, by resolution, would determine the surviving family members' eligibility to receive a survivor's pension, and the State would provide for payment of the survivor's pension.

FISCAL ANALYSIS

EXECUTIVE BRANCH

OFFICE OF LEGISLATIVE SERVICES

The Office of Legislative Services (OLS) estimates the cost to the State of the pension benefit for volunteers provided in this bill to be \$30,000 in the first year, \$45,000 in the second year, and \$60,000 in the third year, assuming that the bill becomes effective in calendar year 2002.

Information provided to the OLS by the Department of Labor, Division of Public Safety and Occupational Safety and Health indicates that since 1990, seven volunteer firefighters and one emergency medical technician have died as a result of injuries sustained in the performance of their volunteer duties. In 2002, two volunteer firefighters died as a result of injuries sustained in the performance of their duties as volunteer firefighters. The cost to the State of providing an annual survivor's benefit of \$15,000 to the families of the two firefighters who died in 2002 would be \$30,000.

The deaths of eight volunteers over a period of thirteen years averages out to 0.62 deaths per year. Given this rate, the OLS estimates that one additional survivor's pension per year would result under this bill. Therefore, the OLS estimates that the cost to the State for the second year will be \$45,000 and the cost to the State for the third year will be \$60,000. However, the OLS is unable to determine whether this statistical average will remain constant in future years.

The Assembly State Government Committee reports favorably and with committee amendments Assembly, No. 2191.

Current law allows a municipality to pay a pension of up to \$5,000 per year to the surviving spouse or minor children of a volunteer firefighter, first aid worker or rescue squad worker who died as the result of injuries sustained in the course of duty as member of a volunteer fire company or first aid or rescue squad.

As amended, this bill provides, instead, a State-paid pension in the amount of \$15,000 to the surviving spouses or minor children of municipal volunteer firefighters, first aid workers, rescue squad workers, and emergency medical technicians who died as a result of injuries sustained while on duty as volunteers, on or after January 1, 2000. The bill also allows a municipal governing body to determine that the surviving spouse, or minor children, of a volunteer who died while responding to, preparing for or returning from an emergency, while under orders from a competent authority, is eligible for the \$15,000 State-paid pension. The bill requires that the municipality determine a surviving spouse or minor children as eligible for the pension and submit a resolution to the State Treasurer. A pension provided under this bill would be in addition to any life insurance benefit that a municipality provides to its volunteers pursuant to chapter 10 of Title 40A of the New Jersey Statutes.

As amended, this bill is the same as Senate Bill No. 1432 (1R) of 2002.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS

Committee amendments to the bill allow a municipal governing body to determine that the surviving spouse, or minor children, of a volunteer who died while responding to, preparing for or returning from an emergency, while under orders from a competent authority, is eligible for the \$15,000 State-paid pension.

The Assembly Appropriations Committee reports favorably Assembly Bill No. 2191 (1R) with committee amendments.

Assembly Bill No. 2191 (1R), as amended, revises the statute authorizing municipalities to pay pensions to the widow and minor children of local volunteer personnel who die in the course of volunteer service.

Under the bill:

- (1) The class of personnel potentially covered for the pension, which presently includes volunteer firefighters, first aid workers, and rescue squad workers, is expanded to include emergency medical technicians;
- (2) The class of survivors eligible to receive the pension is expanded to include widowers as well as widows, children if the widow remarries, and parents if there is no widow or children.
- (3) The pension, currently payable by and at the option of the municipality, will be mandatory and payable by the State for volunteers dying on or after January 1, 2000. The municipality is to determine survivors' eligibility for the benefit, and is specifically authorized under the legislation to find such eligibility when the volunteer's death occurs as the person is responding to, preparing for, or returning from an emergency while under orders from a competent authority; and
- (4) The amount of the pension is increased from \$5,000 per year to \$15,000 per year, and \$10,000 or \$5,000 depending on the survivor's relationship to the deceased.

As amended and reported, this bill is identical to Senate Bill No. 1432 (1R), as also amended and reported by the committee.

FISCAL IMPACT

The Office of Legislative Services estimates that the cost to the State of the pension benefits for volunteers provided in this bill will be approximately \$30,000 in the first year and increase by \$15,000 per year for the foreseeable future. In the approximate three years since January 1, 2000, two volunteer firefighters died as a result of injuries

sustained in the course of volunteer service, and the survivors of each of these firefighters will be eligible for the State-paid pension upon enactment of the legislation. Information from the Division of Public Safety and Occupational Safety and Health in the Department of Labor indicates that, since 1990, a total of eight volunteers (including the two firefighters) have died in service, suggesting that in the future, one new additional pension may become payable as frequently as annually.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS:

The committee amendments change receipt of the pension concerning surviving spouses, if remarried; children of a remarried surviving spouse; and parent, if no surviving spouse or children. The amounts are modified to be \$15,000, \$10,000 or \$5,000 depending on the survivor's relationship to the deceased. Technical definitions were also added.

Assembly Bill No. 2191 (1R) of 2002 requires the payment by the State of an annual survivor's pension in the amount of \$15,000 to the surviving spouse or minor children of volunteer firefighters, first aid or rescue squad workers or emergency medical technicians who die as a result of injuries sustained in the performance of their volunteer duties. Under current law, the payment of such a pension is voluntary, is paid for by the municipality served by the deceased volunteer, and cannot exceed \$5,000 annually.
- ! The Office of Legislative Services (OLS) anticipates the first year cost to the State of the pension benefit for volunteers provided in this bill to be \$30,000, based on the deaths of two volunteer firefighters during calendar year 2002 as a result of injuries sustained in the performance of their duties as volunteer firefighters.
- ! Information received by the OLS from the Department of Labor, Division of Public Safety and Occupational Safety and Health indicates that since 1990, seven volunteer firefighters and one emergency medical technician have died as a result of injuries sustained in the performance of their volunteer duties. The deaths of eight volunteers over a period of thirteen years averages out to 0.62 deaths per year. Given this rate, the OLS estimates that one additional survivor's pension per year would result under this bill. Therefore, the OLS estimates that the cost to the State for the second year will be \$45,000 and the cost to the State for the third year will be \$60,000.



BILL DESCRIPTION

Assembly Bill No. 2191 (1R) of 2002 would provide an annual survivor's pension of \$15,000 to the spouse and minor children of a volunteer firefighter, first aid worker, rescue squad worker or emergency medical technician who died in the line of duty. The governing body of the municipality served by the deceased volunteer, by resolution, would determine the surviving family members' eligibility to receive a survivor's pension, and the State would provide for payment of the survivor's pension.

FISCAL ANALYSIS

OFFICE OF LEGISLATIVE SERVICES

The Office of Legislative Services (OLS) estimates the cost to the State of the pension benefit for volunteers provided in this bill to be \$30,000 in the first year, \$45,000 in the second year, and \$60,000 in the third year, assuming that the bill becomes effective in calendar year 2002.

Information provided to the OLS by the Department of Labor, Division of Public Safety and Occupational Safety and Health indicates that since 1990, seven volunteer firefighters and one emergency medical technician have died as a result of injuries sustained in the performance of their volunteer duties. In 2002, two volunteer firefighters died as a result of injuries sustained in the performance of their duties as volunteer firefighters. The cost to the State of providing an annual survivor's benefit of \$15,000 to the families of the two firefighters who died in 2002 would be \$30,000.

The deaths of eight volunteers over a period of thirteen years averages out to 0.62 deaths per year. Given this rate, the OLS estimates that one additional survivor's pension per year would result under this bill. Therefore, the OLS estimates that the cost to the State for the second year will be \$45,000 and the cost to the State for the third year will be \$60,000. However, the OLS is unable to determine whether this statistical average will remain constant in future years.
