The Assembly Family, Women and Children's Services Committee reports favorably and with committee amendments Assembly Bill No. 306.

As amended by the committee, this bill requires the Commissioner of Human Services to review and, to the maximum extent permissible under federal law, streamline the application form for participation in the federal food stamp program and the New Jersey Supplementary Food Stamp Program, which is currently used by persons who are not applying for other public assistance, so that the appropriate form, including all instructions and information relating to the application procedure, eligibility determination, and accompanying information that is required to be furnished by the applicant, contains ordinary and concise language. In addition, the commissioner is required to examine food stamp applications used by other states which utilize their food stamp applications for one or more programs.

The purpose of this bill is to require that New Jersey emulate other states that have adopted the use of a shorter, more "user-friendly" application form for food stamp applicants.

The committee amendments seek to ensure that the application form is designed in such a manner that the effort required to complete it is not unduly burdensome to the applicant.

The amendments require the commissioner to: review and, to the maximum extent permissible under federal law, streamline the application so that the form contains ordinary and concise language; and examine food stamp applications of other states which use their applications for one or more programs. The amendments also delete the requirement that the application be no more than five pages in length and that the use of the application commence no later than 180 days after the effective date of the bill.

This bill was prefiled for introduction in the 2002-2003 session pending technical review. As reported, the bill includes the changes required by technical review which has been performed.
