P.L. 2002, CHAPTER 107, approved December 2, 2002 Assembly Bill No. 1769 (Second Reprint)

1 **AN ACT** concerning ²notice of certain² public utility shutoffs and supplementing Title 48 of the Revised Statutes.

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4 **BE IT ENACTED** by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

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7 a. Any public utility as defined in R.S.48:2-13, which discontinues gas, electric or water service to a ²multifamily housing 8 unit² customer ²[, other than for nonpayment of utility bills or upon 9 the customer's request, for safety related purposes, shall provide 10 written ²or verbal² notice of the discontinuance to the chief law 11 enforcement officer of the municipality in which the customer's 12 premises are located or the Superintendent of the State Police, as 13 appropriate, within ¹[24] <u>12</u>¹ hours after the utility discontinues 14 service to the customer¹, except that if service has been fully restored 15 to the customer prior to the expiration of the 12 hours, the utility shall 16 not be required to provide ²[written]² notice pursuant to this 17 18

subsection.¹

²For the purposes of this section, "multifamily housing unit customer" means a customer who resides in housing in which three or more units of dwelling space are occupied, or are intended to be occupied, by three or more persons who live independently of one another.²

b. The notice required by subsection a. of this section shall include the name of the customer and the address of the premises where service was discontinued ²provided that such information is available to the public utility².

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²[2. The Board of Public Utilities shall promulgate rules and regulations, in accordance with the "Administrative Procedure Act," P.L.1968, c.410 (C.52:14B-1 et seq.), as may be necessary to effectuate the purposes of this act.]²

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²[3.] <u>2.</u>² This act shall take effect ²[immediately except that section 1 shall take effect]² on the 90th day following enactment.

The Assembly Telecommunications and Utilities Committee reports favorably Assembly Bill No. 1769.

As reported, this bill requires public utilities to give written notice to the appropriate law enforcement agency that serves the municipality in which a customer's premises are located, within 24 hours after the utility discontinues gas, electric or water service to the premises, in instances of extraordinary situations such as system upgrades or maintenance or where weather-related repairs are necessary.

Under current regulations, municipalities have the option to request that utilities give them notice when gas or electric service is discontinued. This bill will make it mandatory for utilities to give written notice of discontinuance of gas, electric or water service to the local police department that serves the municipality where the customer's premises are located or, if the municipality does not have a police department, to the State Police.

The Senate Economic Growth, Agriculture and Tourism Committee reports favorably and with committee amendments Assembly Bill No. 1769 (1R).

This bill, as amended, requires a gas, electric or water public utility to give written or verbal notice to the appropriate law enforcement agency that serves the municipality in which the premises of a customer who resides in a multifamily housing unit is located within 12 hours after the utility discontinues gas, electric or water service to the premises for safety related purposes. The requirement for such notice is waived if the utility fully restores service to the customer within 12 hours after the discontinuance. The notice required shall include the name of the customer and the address of the premises where service was discontinued provided that such information is available to the utility.

Under current regulations, municipalities have the option to request that gas and electric public utilities give them written notice when gas or electric service to residential customers is involuntarily discontinued.

The committee amended the bill to: 1) have the notification provisions apply only to safety-related utility shutoffs of customers who reside in multifamily housing units; 2) allow the affected utility to give such notification verbally as well as in written form; and 3) include in the notification the name of the customer and the address of the premises where service was discontinued only if such information is available to the public utility.

with Assembly Floor Amendments (Proposed By Assemblyman CHIVUKULA)

ADOPTED: MARCH 14, 2002

These amendments shorten the time period from 24 hours to 12 hours within which the utility is required to send written notice of discontinuance.

The amendments also would waive the requirement for written notice to be sent if the utility fully restores service to the customer within 12 hours after the discontinuance.
