STATE OF NEW JERSEY

DATED: MARCH 1, 2004

The Senate Law and Public Safety and Veterans' Affairs Committee reports favorably and with committee amendments Senate Bill No. 330.

As amended and released by the committee, this bill would authorize county sheriffs to designate and appoint up to 85 persons to serve on an unpaid auxiliary force of deputy sheriffs. Under current law, sheriffs in counties with a population of more than 850,000 may appoint these auxiliary deputy sheriffs. To be eligible for appointment, an individual must have completed an appropriate course of training approved by the police training commission.

The committee amended the bill so that all county sheriffs would be authorized to make these appointments. As introduced, the bill authorized sheriffs in counties with a population of over 250,000 to make such appointments. In addition, the committee amended the bill to provide that sheriffs who have been empowered to appoint deputy sheriffs pursuant to the bill's provisions would not be permitted to appoint those deputy sheriffs unless the governing body of the county appropriates moneys for the entire cost of effecting and maintaining liability insurance for acts or omissions committed by those deputy sheriffs in the course of their official duties.

This bill was pre-filed for introduction in the 2004 legislative session pending technical review. As reported, the bill includes the changes required by technical review, which has been performed.

with Senate Floor Amendments (Proposed By Senator SARLO)

ADOPTED: MARCH 29, 2004

Senate Bill No. 330 (1R) authorizes county sheriffs to designate and appoint up to 85 persons to serve on an unpaid auxiliary force of deputy sheriffs. Under current law, sheriffs in counties with a population of more than 850,000 may appoint these auxiliary deputy sheriffs.

This Senate amendment provides that county sheriffs may appoint the lesser of either 85 deputy sheriffs or one deputy sheriff for every 10,000 inhabitants, according to the latest federal decennial census. The amendments further clarify that all deputy sheriffs, at the time of or prior their appointment, must have completed an appropriate course of training approved by the Police Training Commission.

The amendments further provide that no sheriff is to appoint or continue the designation of any deputy sheriff unless the governing body of the county appropriates moneys for the entire cost of effecting and maintaining insurance with any insurance company authorized to do business in this State for acts or omissions committed by such deputy sheriffs in the course of their official duties. As reported by the Senate Law and Public Safety Committee and Veterans' Affairs Committee, the insurance requirement was applicable to county sheriffs empowered to appoint deputy sheriffs after the bill's effective date.

STATE OF NEW JERSEY

DATED: MAY 3, 2004

The Assembly Housing and Local Government Committee reports favorably Assembly Bill No. 1448 with committee amendments. This bill, as amended, would authorize the sheriff of any county to designate and appoint the lesser of 85 persons or one deputy sheriff for every 10,000 inhabitants of the county to serve on an unpaid auxiliary force of deputy sheriffs. Under current law, sheriffs in counties with a population of more than 850,000 may appoint these auxiliary deputy sheriffs. To be eligible for appointment, an individual must have completed an appropriate course of training approved by the police training commission. The additional appointments will provide an additional layer of protection for New Jersey communities located in the more populous counties during times of emergency, or allow them to appoint persons who have a certain expertise, such as bomb detonation, to assist the sheriff.

Committee amendments

The committee amendments provide that county sheriffs may appoint the lesser of either 85 deputy sheriffs or one deputy sheriff for every 10,000 inhabitants, according to the latest federal decennial census. The amendments further clarify that all deputy sheriffs, at the time of or prior their appointment, must have completed an appropriate course of training approved by the Police Training Commission.

The amendments further provide that no sheriff is to appoint or continue the designation of any deputy sheriff without the approval of the governing body of the county.

This bill was pre-filed for introduction in the 2004-2005 session pending technical review. As reported, the bill includes the changes required by technical review, which has been performed.

with Assembly Floor Amendments (Proposed By Assemblyman SCALERA)

ADOPTED: JUNE 10, 2004

These amendments require that a county sheriff shall not appoint or continue the designation of any deputy sheriff unless the governing body of the county shall appropriate moneys for the entire cost of effecting and maintaining insurance with any insurance company authorized to do business in this State for acts or omissions committed by those deputy sheriffs in the course of their official duties. These amendments remove the requirement that the county governing body must approve the appointment or continued designation of a deputy sheriff.
