Under the NJ STARS Program, to be eligible to receive a scholarship in the first year of enrollment at a county 5 college, a student must graduate in the top 20% of his high school 6 class. To be eligible for a scholarship award in the second year of 7 8 enrollment, a student must rank in the top 20% of the full-time degree 9 seeking students enrolled at the county college upon completion of the 10 student's initial year of county college attendance. A student, under this program, would only be eligible for a scholarship award for two 11 12 years. Other eligibility criteria provided for in the bill are: being a 13 State resident; having applied for all other available forms of State and 14 federal financial aid, exclusive of loans; and being enrolled for a 15 minimum of 15 credit hours per semester, not including any credit hours in a remedial or developmental curriculum. The Assembly Education Committee favorably reports Senate Bill No. 1192 (2R).

This bill establishes the New Jersey Student Tuition Assistance Reward Scholarship (NJ STARS) Program for students attending New Jersey county colleges on a full-time basis in a curriculum leading to a degree. Scholarships awarded under the program will cover the cost of tuition and fees for a full-time course load. The program will be administered by the Higher Education Student Assistance Authority.

Under the NJ STARS Program, to be eligible to receive a scholarship in the first year of enrollment at a county college, a student must have graduated in the top 20% of the student's high school class. A scholarship will be payable to the student during the student's enrollment in the county college after the first year of enrollment if, based on the student's performance in the first year of enrollment, the student ranked among the top 20% of all first-time students enrolled in a full-time course of study during the student's initial year of county college enrollment. Other eligibility criteria provided for in the bill are (i) being a State resident, (ii) having applied for all other available forms of State and federal need-based grants and merit scholarships, exclusive of loans, (iii) being enrolled in a minimum of 12 credit hours per semester, not including any credit hours in a remedial or developmental curriculum, (iv) having graduated from high school in 2004 or later, and not earlier than the calendar year two years prior to the first calendar year of scholarship payment, and (v) maintaining continuous enrollment in a full-time course of study, except for approved leave for medical reasons or family emergency. A student would only be eligible for a scholarship award for five semesters. The Assembly Budget Committee reports favorably Senate Bill No. 1192 (2R).

Senate Bill No. 1192 (2R) establishes the New Jersey Student Tuition Assistance Reward Scholarship (NJ STARS) Program for students attending New Jersey county colleges on a full-time basis in a curriculum leading to a degree. Scholarships awarded under the program will cover the cost of tuition and fees for a full-time course load. The program will be administered by the Higher Education Student Assistance Authority.

Under the NJ STARS Program, to be eligible to receive a scholarship in the first year of enrollment at a county college, a student must have graduated in the top 20% of the student's high school class. To be eligible for a scholarship award after the first year of enrollment, a student must have ranked among the top 20% of all full-time students, commencing enrollment at the county college at the same time as the student did, who remained enrolled as full-time students at the completion of the student's initial year of enrollment (i.e., the student's full-time college freshman class cohort). As reported by the committee, this bill is identical to Assembly Bill Nos. 500 and 2463 (ACS) as also reported by the committee.

FISCAL IMPACT

A summary of the Executive's budget proposal for FY2004-05 indicates that the Administration will recommend that the NJ STARS program receive \$10,000,000 in funding for the forthcoming fiscal year. This bill was not certified as requiring a fiscal note.

The Senate Budget and Appropriations Committee reports favorably and with committee amendments Senate Bill No. 1192.

This bill establishes the New Jersey Student Tuition Assistance Reward Scholarship (NJ STARS) Program for students attending New Jersey county colleges on a full-time basis in a curriculum leading to a degree. Scholarships awarded under the program will cover the cost of tuition and fees for a full-time course load. The program will be administered by the Higher Education Student Assistance Authority.

Under the NJ STARS Program, to be eligible to receive a scholarship in the first year of enrollment at a county college, a student must have graduated in the top 20% of the student's high school class. To be eligible for a scholarship award after the first year of enrollment, a student must have ranked among the top 20% of all full-time students, commencing enrollment at the county college at the same time as the student did, who remained enrolled as full-time students at the completion of the student's initial year of enrollment (i.e., the student's full-time college freshman class cohort). Other eligibility criteria provided for in the bill are (i) being a State resident, (ii) having applied for all other available forms of State and federal need-based grants and merit scholarships, exclusive of loans, (iii) being enrolled in a minimum of 12 credit hours per semester, not including any credit hours in a remedial or developmental curriculum, (iv) having graduated from high school in 2004 or later, and not earlier than the calendar year two years prior to the first calendar year of scholarship payment, and (v) maintaining continuous enrollment in a full-time course of study, except for approved leave for medical reasons or family emergency. COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS

Committee amendments to this bill:

(1) Reduce from 15 to 12 the number of credit hours, exclusive of

credits earned in remedial and developmental courses, that are necessary to meet the full-time course load requirement for eligibility for an NJ STARS award, while clarifying that those credits must be accrued in a course of study leading to a degree;

- (2) Lengthen the period of time for which a student may receive an NJ STARS award from two years to five semesters, while limiting to 15 the number of credit hours for which an award will be payable in any given semester;
- (3) Clarify that the college costs covered by the award program include fees, as well as tuition;
- (4) Require generally that a student will be eligible for an award only for study at the county college serving the student's county of residence, but (a) permit a student who can demonstrate that the curriculum that the student wishes to study is unavailable at the county college serving the county of residence to be eligible for an award for study at another county college that does offer that curriculum, and (b) prohibit that other county college from charging any more for enrollment of that student than it does for county residents;
- (5) Allow the authority to adopt and apply a non-class rank system to establish, for purposes of determining eligibility for the NJ STARS award in the first year of college enrollment, the high school class standing of a student graduating from a high school that does not compute class rank;
- (6) Incorporate the requirement that participants in the program have graduated from high school after 2003 and not earlier than two calendar years before scholarship payments commence;
- (7) Clarify a provision allowing the authority to use such collection procedures as it may require to obtain reimbursement of awards that were improperly paid or forfeited;
- (8) Require the authority to report, after two years' experience with the NJ STARS Program, on participation rates, costs and other factors necessary and useful for an evaluation of the program; and
 - (9) Eliminate an appropriation in the amount of \$15,000,000.

FISCAL IMPACT

A summary of the Executive's budget proposal for FY2004-05 indicates that the Administration will recommend that the NJ STARS program receive \$10,000,000 in funding for the forthcoming fiscal year.

- (5) Transfer primary responsibility for collecting repayments and amounts of overpayments of NJ STARS scholarships from HESAA to the appropriate county college and provide that collection procedures shall be in accordance with those prescribed under the "Higher Education Student Assistance Authority Law";
- (6) Postpone the date by which HESAA is required to submit its report on the implementation of the NJ STARS program from July 15 to September 30, 2006; and
- (7) Clarify the bill's intent that the report's information regarding scholarship recipients' non-NJ STARS sources of funding cover only other State sources and federal and institutional sources (i.e., not private sources).

The Senate Budget and Appropriations Committee reports favorably and with committee amendments Senate Bill No. 1192.

This bill establishes the New Jersey Student Tuition Assistance Reward Scholarship (NJ STARS) Program for students attending New Jersey county colleges on a full-time basis in a curriculum leading to a degree. Scholarships awarded under the program will cover the cost of tuition and fees for a full-time course load. The program will be administered by the Higher Education Student Assistance Authority.

Under the NJ STARS Program, to be eligible to receive a scholarship in the first year of enrollment at a county college, a student must have graduated in the top 20% of the student's high school class. To be eligible for a scholarship award after the first year of enrollment, a student must have ranked among the top 20% of all full-time students, commencing enrollment at the county college at the same time as the student did, who remained enrolled as full-time students at the completion of the student's initial year of enrollment (i.e., the student's full-time college freshman class cohort). Other eligibility criteria provided for in the bill are (i) being a State resident, (ii) having applied for all other available forms of State and federal need-based grants and merit scholarships, exclusive of loans, (iii) being enrolled in a minimum of 12 credit hours per semester, not including any credit hours in a remedial or developmental curriculum, (iv) having graduated from high school in 2004 or later, and not earlier than the calendar year two years prior to the first calendar year of scholarship payment, and (v) maintaining continuous enrollment in a full-time course of study, except for approved leave for medical reasons or family emergency. A student would only be eligible for a scholarship award for five semesters. A scholarship may be renewed upon filing by the student of a renewal application with the authority, accompanied by evidence that the student has achieved the necessary class rank or standing.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS

Committee amendments to this bill:

(1) Reduce from 15 to 12 the number of credit hours, exclusive of

credits earned in remedial and developmental courses, that are necessary to meet the full-time course load requirement for eligibility for an NJ STARS award, while clarifying that those credits must be accrued in a course of study leading to a degree;

- (2) Lengthen the period of time for which a student may receive an NJ STARS award from two years to five semesters, while limiting to 15 the number of credit hours for which an award will be payable in any given semester;
- (3) Clarify that the college costs covered by the award program include fees, as well as tuition;
- (4) Require generally that a student will be eligible for an award only for study at the county college serving the student's county of residence, but (a) permit a student who can demonstrate that the curriculum that the student wishes to study is unavailable at the county college serving the county of residence to be eligible for an award for study at another county college that does offer that curriculum, and (b) prohibit that other county college from charging any more for enrollment of that student than it does for county residents;
- (5) Allow the authority to adopt and apply a non-class rank system to establish, for purposes of determining eligibility for the NJ STARS award in the first year of college enrollment, the high school class standing of a student graduating from a high school that does not compute class rank;
- (6) Incorporate the requirement that participants in the program have graduated from high school after 2003 and not earlier than two calendar years before scholarship payments commence;
- (7) Clarify a provision allowing the authority to use such collection procedures as it may require to obtain reimbursement of awards that were improperly paid or forfeited;
- (8) Require the authority to report, after two years' experience with the NJ STARS Program, on participation rates, costs and other factors necessary and useful for an evaluation of the program; and
 - (9) Eliminate an appropriation in the amount of \$15,000,000.

FISCAL IMPACT

A summary of the Executive's budget proposal for FY2004-05 indicates that the Administration will recommend that the NJ STARS program receive \$10,000,000 in funding for the forthcoming fiscal year.

Governor Signs NJ STARS into Law, Opening Doors for 9,000 Students

The program will include 2004's high school graduates

(CAMDEN)—Governor James E. McGreevey today opened doors of opportunity for thousands of students by signing NJ STARS, the New Jersey Tuition Assistance Reward Scholarship program, into law (Bill number S1192, A500).

The bill signing was held at the Learning Theater in Camden Community College's Camden Technology Center. Camden Community College President Phyllis Della Vecchia joined Governor McGreevey, along with students who will benefit from the program, and State and local officials.

Under the program, the State will pay full tuition and fees at New Jersey community colleges for all Garden State seniors who graduate at the top 20 percent of their high school class. The program will start retroactively for 2004's high school graduates. Governor McGreevey unveiled the NJ STARS plan on February 24, during his Fiscal Year 2005 Budget Address.

"Unfortunately, there are many bright, hardworking students who cannot afford to go to college. Today we're righting that wrong. For the first time, New Jersey is guaranteeing that every student at the top of their class will have access to a college education," Governor McGreevey said. "NJ STARS poses a challenge to our high school students: You work hard and make the grades, and we will cover the cost of your education."

The Governor pointed out that community colleges play an invaluable role. Students with an associate degree earn up to \$400,000 more over their lifetime. New Jersey's annual workforce earnings are \$6.3 million greater – the equivalent of 135,000 jobs – due to community colleges. For every tax dollar invested in New Jersey's community colleges, over \$18 returns to the State. Community colleges serve nearly 300,000 students, and 95 percent of community college students stay in New Jersey.

New Jersey's high school students are outperforming most of their counterparts around the nation. The Garden State's high schools have been recognized nationally as among the top five in preparing students for college, and the State's 88 percent high school completion rate is among the best in the nation.

Despite these facts, many well-prepared students are unable to obtain a college education. Tuition has climbed at more than twice the rate of inflation for the last decade, pushing college out of reach for many of today's top high school graduates.

By helping hardworking students earn a two-year degree, NJ STARS will give those students a leg up in entering the workforce or transferring to a four-year college. The program will be funded by \$10 million in the State's Fiscal 2005 budget, and will create opportunities for 9,000 students.

"We at the Department of Education are so very pleased that the Governor has officially launched the NJ STARS program," said Commissioner of Education William L. Librera. "We understand, and the Governor understands, that a Community College's role in educating our students is invaluable. This Administration also understands that preparing a workforce that can compete at the highest levels is invaluable.

"We believe that NJ STARS is one more example that shows Governor James E. McGreevey has his fingers on the pulse of the education community, and that his leadership is essential in creating and maintaining the types of diverse programs that lead to sustained success for all of our students," Commissioner Librera continued.

"This program offers an opportunity to New Jersey's real stars in education to continue the route to academic and professional success, regardless of their parents' economic situation," said Senator Wayne R. Bryant, D-Camden and Gloucester. "It provides a chance to excel where before, there was none. Under this law, New Jersey's stars will shine brighter than ever before."

"There are thousands of kids in New Jersey who work hard in school and come from middle-income families so they don't qualify for financial aid for college," said Senate President Richard J. Codey. "I think any student who works hard enough to graduate in the top fifth of his or her class deserves the chance to go to college, regardless of family income. And that's exactly what NJ STARS is all about."

"New Jersey has a national reputation for turning out some of the best students in the country," Assemblyman Albio Sires (D-Hudson) said. "NJ STARS represents an extension of our commitment to all students. There is no reason for us not to help those who worked hard to finish in the top of their class but can't afford a four-year college."

"Few sights are as disappointing as seeing good students who aspire to attend college but can't because their families cannot afford the cost," Assemblywoman Bonnie Watson Coleman (D-Mercer) said. "In many communities, county colleges serve as the sole bridge of opportunity for low-income students who seek a continued education and better career prospects."

NJ STARS is just one program by which Governor McGreevey has worked to hold the line on rising tuition.

The Governor also increased funding to State colleges and universities by \$70 million; increased the Tuition Assistance Grant (TAG) program by \$33.7 million to create 6,000 new awards; established the Part-Time TAG program which helps more than 8,000 students; increased funding for the Outstanding Scholars Recruitment Program by \$1.8 million, creating an additional 685 awards; and increased funding for the NJCLASS student loans by \$39 million

Governor McGreevey is also expanding job-training opportunities at New Jersey's community colleges, which are the



backbone for the State's workforce development efforts. Last year, the colleges provided New Jersey Department of Labor-funded training for more than 50,000 workers at more than 500 companies.

The Governor plans to give community colleges the resources to do even more, by increasing the amount the State and counties can borrow to launch capital construction projects at the colleges. The additional \$200 million limit would let the colleges build enough classroom and lab space to train an additional 30,000 workers.

Under the New Jersey Community Colleges compact, the colleges are working with the Department of Labor, the Commerce and Economic Growth Commission and the Department of Education on programs that will make job training more accessible.
