 They shall have power to prevent crime, to pursue and apprehend offenders and to obtain legal evidence necessary to insure the conviction of such offenders in the courts. They shall have power to execute any lawful warrant or order of arrest issued against any person, and to make arrests without warrant for violations of the law committed in their presence, and for felonies committed the same as are or may be authorized by law for other peace officers.

They may co-operate with any other State department, or any State or local authority in detecting crime, apprehending criminals and preserving law and order; but the State Police shall not be used as a posse in any municipality except upon order of the Governor when requested by the governing body of such municipality; provided, however, that the Superintendent of State Police, or the person in charge thereof, shall, upon request made to him by the superintendent of elections of any county of this State, assign for use on any election day officers and troopers, not to exceed fifteen in number in any one county, to aid such superintendents of elections in the enforcement of the election laws of this State.

They may act as inspectors of motor vehicles and as wardens in the protection of the forests, and the fish and game of the State. They shall have the authority to investigate any offenses or violations occurring on the waters of this State, as defined in section 1 of P.L.1986, c.150 (C.53:1-11.10), and to stop and board a vessel in the waters of the State to determine whether the vessel complies with State and federal boating safety laws and shall have the power to order a vessel that does not comply with these laws to return immediately to shore. They shall have the authority, in accordance with applicable State and federal laws, rules and regulations, to take appropriate action as authorized by the United States Coast Guard to assist the United States Coast Guard in the enforcement of any safety and security zone established by the United States Coast Guard Captain of the Port for the Port of New York and New Jersey or the Port of <u>Philadelphia</u>. The Assembly Homeland Security and State Preparedness Committee reports favorably and with committee amendments Assembly Bill No. 2927.

This bill would authorize members of the State Police to assist the United States Coast Guard in the enforcement of federal laws, rules and regulations in "Safety and Security Zones" established by the Coast Guard for the Port of New York and New Jersey and the Port of Philadelphia. The Coast Guard established these zones, which regulate navigation and vessel operations around sensitive maritime areas and facilities, shortly after the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001. The restrictions imposed in these zones help facilitate emergency response and rescue activities, as well as safeguard people, vessels and waterfront facilities from acts of sabotage and terrorism.

This legislation would enable the State Police to partner with the United States Coast Guard to more effectively monitor and regulate waterborne activity that poses a potential hazard to national security, and to fulfill the mission of the State Police to keep New Jersey's ports and waterways secure.

#### **COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS:**

The amendments broaden the scope of the original bill so that all members of the State Police, and not just those marine police officers within the State Police's Bureau of Marine Law Enforcement, would be authorized to assist the United States Coast Guard with respect to the designated "Safety and Security Zones." This change is reflected by the addition of a new section 2, which adds such expanded marine law enforcement authority to the statutory law listing the general powers and duties of the members of the State Police. See N.J.S.A. 53:2-1. The language of the committee amendments describing the aforementioned expanded authority is identical to the language set forth in the original bill for such expanded maritime authority (which, again, only affects marine police officers within the Bureau of Marine Law Enforcement).

This change would provide administrative and operational flexibility to the State Police, so that any member of the State Police could be assigned maritime duties, or otherwise participate in maritime activities, as deemed necessary to assist the Coast Guard in carrying out the provisions of the bill.

The Senate Law and Public Safety and Veterans' Affairs Committee reports favorably and with committee amendments Senate Bill No. 1551.

This bill would authorize members of the State Police to assist the United States Coast Guard in the enforcement of federal laws, rules and regulations in "Safety and Security Zones" established by the Coast Guard for the Port of New York and New Jersey and the Port of Philadelphia. The Coast Guard established these zones, which regulate navigation and vessel operations around sensitive maritime areas and facilities, shortly after the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001. The restrictions imposed in these zones help facilitate emergency response and rescue activities, as well as safeguard people, vessels and waterfront facilities from acts of sabotage and terrorism.

This bill enables the State Police to partner with the United States Coast Guard to more effectively monitor and regulate waterborne activity that poses a potential hazard to national security, and to fulfill the mission of the State Police to keep New Jersey's ports and waterways secure.

The committee amended the bill to authorize all members of the State Police to assist the United States Coast Guard with respect to the designated "Safety and Security Zones." As introduced, the bill authorized only marine police officers within the State Police's Bureau of Marine Law Enforcement to provide this assistance. It is the committee's understanding that this change will provide administrative and operational flexibility to the State Police, so that any member of the State Police could be assigned maritime duties or otherwise participate in maritime activities as deemed necessary to assist the Coast Guard.

As amended and reported by the committee, this bill is identical to Assembly Bill No.2927 (1R).
