# **STATE OF NEW JERSEY**

#### DATED: JANUARY 22, 2004

The Assembly Law and Public Safety Committee reports favorably Assembly Bill No. 1087.

Assembly Bill No. 1087 makes it a crime of the third degree to kill a search and rescue dog and a crime of the fourth degree to maim or inflict harm upon a search and rescue dog. A crime of the third degree is punishable by a term of imprisonment of three to five years, a fine of up to \$15,000, or both. A crime of the fourth degree is punishable by a term of imprisonment of up to 18 months, a fine of up to \$10,000, or both.

Under current law, it is a crime of the third degree to kill dogs and other animals owned or used by law enforcement agencies and a crime of the fourth degree to maim these dogs or animals. This bill expands this law to also apply to search and rescue dogs.

The bill defines a search and rescue dog as any dog trained or being trained for the purpose of search and rescue that is owned by an independent handler or member of a search and rescue team, and used in conjunction with local law enforcement or emergency services organizations for the purpose of locating missing persons or evidence of arson.

These dogs are commonly used for locating injured and trapped persons during catastrophes, such as earthquakes. The bill was modeled on Arkansas legislation.

This bill was pre-filed for introduction in the 2004 legislative session pending technical review. As reported, the bill includes the changes required by technical review, which has been performed.
