The Assembly Appropriations Committee reports favorably Assembly Bill No. 36.

Assembly Bill No. 36 requires the Attorney General and the county boards of elections to take various actions to facilitate election worker and voter education and to provide information to the public on voting.

Specifically, the bill requires the Attorney General to design, prepare and distribute training manuals for county clerks and members of county boards of elections and to review the Internet site of each county board of elections to ensure that the information is consistent with the information provided on the Internet site of the Division of Elections. The bill requires county boards of election to design, prepare and distribute training manuals for members of district boards of elections (also known as "poll workers"), to design and make available to voters instructions on the proper operation of voting machines, and to provide notice of certain information to voters, such as the dates of each election and the deadlines for voter registration or application for civilian and military absentee ballots. The Division of Elections and county boards of elections are to maintain official Internet sites that contain information helpful to voters and are cross-linked to each other.

The bill allows county boards of elections to post signs outside of polling places one week before the election to identify the polling place and state the date and hours voters may cast ballots.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The actual fiscal impact of this legislation cannot be determined. Certain activities required by this bill are already occurring in some counties. However, there is no statewide standardized format for training materials.

The State has already received federal funding for the "Help America Vote Act." Portions of the federal funding can be dedicated to the implementation of this bill.

FISCAL ANALYSIS

EXECUTIVE BRANCH

None received.

OFFICE OF LEGISLATIVE SERVICES

The Office of Legislative Services cannot determine the fiscal impact of this legislation. Certain activities required by this bill are already occurring in some counties, however, there is currently no standardized statewide format for training materials or voter information.

New Jersey has received \$41.2 million in federal Help America Vote Act funding thus far, and is anticipated to receive an additional \$44 million in calendar year 2005. The Office of Legislative Services notes that under the State plan prepared and submitted pursuant to the federal Help America Vote Act, it was estimated that voter education would cost \$3 million and training of election officials would cost \$1 million. Additionally, the Office of Legislative Services notes that \$1 million of Help America Vote Act funds is currently budgeted for training and public services generally. It is unclear what portion of these amounts would be dedicated to the implementation of this bill. The activities required by the bill are permissible uses for federal funding the State has received pursuant to the Help America Vote Act.

If the provisions of this bill require additional expenditures by the counties and State or federal funds are not available or provided to cover such costs, the bill may not be subject to a challenge under the State Constitution as an unfunded State mandate given that its enactment complies with federal law.

The Attorney General shall examine periodically voter education practices in other states and emulate those practices it determines would be most effective in increasing voter registration and participation in this State. The Attorney General shall share the findings with the county boards of elections.

3. (New section) All forms and notices required pursuant to this title shall be made available upon request in a format accessible to blind and visually impaired voters. In designing alternate format forms and notices, the Attorney General and the county boards of elections shall seek input from groups that represent blind and visually impaired voters, and from other states that have experience in producing elections forms and notices for blind and visually impaired voters. The Attorney General and the county boards of elections shall advertise the telephone number or other means by which a person may request an

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1 alternate format form or notice.

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3 4. (New section) The costs incurred by the State or a county or 4 municipality to comply with the provisions of this section shall be paid out of federal funds received by the State pursuant to "Help America 5 Vote Act of 2002," Pub.L.107-252 (42 U.S.C. 15301 et seq.) or any 6 7 other federal law, to the extent such funds are available and payment 8 with such funds is practical and permitted. The Senate State Government Committee reports favorably a Senate Committee Substitute for Senate Bill Nos. 2396 and 2465.

This substitute requires the Attorney General and the county boards of elections to take various actions to facilitate election worker and voter education and to provide information to the public on voting.

Specifically, the substitute requires the Attorney General to design, prepare and distribute training manuals for county clerks and members of county boards of elections and to review the Internet site of each county board of elections to ensure that the information is consistent with the information provided on the Internet site of the Division of Elections. The substitute requires county boards of election to design, prepare and distribute training manuals for members of district boards of elections (also known as "poll workers"), to design and make available to voters instructions on the proper operation of voting machines, and to provide notice of certain information to voters, such as the dates of each election and the deadlines for voter registration or application for civilian and military absentee ballots. The Division of Elections and county boards of elections are to maintain official Internet sites that contain information helpful to voters and are cross-linked to each other.

The substitute allows county boards of elections to post signs outside of polling places one week before the election to identify the polling place and state the date and hours voters may cast ballots.

As reported, this bill is identical to Assembly, No. 36.

The bill also provides that county boards may post a sign outside of each polling place one week before an election that identifies the polling place as such, and the date and hours voters may cast ballots.

FISCAL ANALYSIS

OFFICE OF LEGISLATIVE SERVICES

The Office of Legislative Services cannot determine the fiscal impact of this legislation. Certain activities required by this bill are already occurring in some counties, however, there is currently no standardized statewide format for training materials or voter information.

New Jersey has received \$41.1 million in federal Help America Vote Act funding thus far, and is anticipated to receive an additional \$44 million in calendar year 2005. The Office of Legislative Services notes that under the State plan prepared and submitted pursuant to the federal Help America Vote Act, it was estimated that voter education would cost \$3 million and training of election officials would cost \$1 million. Additionally, the Office of Legislative Services notes that \$1 million of the Help America Vote Act funds is currently budgeted for training and public services generally. It is unclear what portion of these amounts would be dedicated to the implementation of this bill. The activities required by the bill are permissible uses for federal funding the State has received pursuant to the Help America Vote Act.

If the provisions of this bill require additional expenditures by the counties and State or federal funds are not available or provided to cover such costs, the bill may not be subject to a challenge under the State Constitution as an unfunded State mandate given that its enactment complies with federal law.
