The Assembly Regulated Professions and Independent Authorities Committee reports favorably and with committee amendments Assembly Bill No. 3983.

As amended, this bill amends and supplements the "Home Inspection Professional Licensing Act," P.L.1997, c.323 (C.45:8-61 et seq.).

Current law requires an applicant seeking licensure as a home inspector to have been engaged as a licensed associate home inspector for not less than one year, and have performed not less than 250 home inspections for compensation. This bill eliminates the classification of associate home inspector and the licensing of associate home inspectors. The bill provides that in order to satisfy the requirements for licensure as a home inspector, an applicant may: successfully complete an approved course of study of 180 hours, as prescribed by the board, after consultation with the State Department of Education, which shall include not less than 40 hours of unpaid field-based inspections in the presence of and under the direct supervision of a licensed home inspector; or (2) perform not less than 250 fee-paid home inspections in the presence of and under the direct supervision of a licensed home inspector who oversees and takes full responsibility for the inspection and any report produced.

Under current law, to be eligible for licensure as a home inspector an applicant is required to pass the examination offered by the American Society of Home Inspectors (ASHI). As provided in the bill, to be eligible to be licensed an individual would have to pass an examination administered or approved by the Home Inspection Advisory Committee.

Current law also requires every licensed home inspector who is engaged in home inspection to secure, maintain and file with the State Board of Professional Engineers and Land Surveyors proof of a certificate of an error and omissions policy, which shall be in a minimum amount of \$500,000 per occurrence. This bill provides that an action for an error or omission in the performance of a home inspection contract by a licensed home inspector shall be commenced within four years of the date of the home inspection.

In addition, the bill stipulates that as a condition for biennial license renewal as a home inspector, an individual shall complete 40 credit hours of continuing education. The advisory committee shall establish standards for continuing home inspection education, including the subject matter and content of courses of study and the selection of instructors, and approve programs offering continuing education credits.

Furthermore, the bill stipulates that during the first 180 days after the bill's enactment, the Home Inspection Advisory Committee shall, upon application, issue a home inspector license to any person who at any time prior to or during that 180-day period held a license as an associate home inspector, provided that the applicant: (1) had been engaged in the practice of home inspections for compensation for not less than three years prior to December 30, 2005 and had performed not less than 300 home inspections for compensation prior to December 30, 2005; or (2) had performed not less than 400 home inspections for compensation prior to December 30, 2005. The bill also stipulates that during the first 180 days after the enactment date of this bill, the Home Inspection Advisory Committee shall, upon application, issue a home inspector license to any individual: (1) whose application for an associate home inspector license had been approved by the committee prior to December 30, 2005; or (2) who had satisfied the requirements set forth in section 9 of P.L.1997, c.323 (C.45:8-69) and had completed not less than 40 hours of unpaid field-based inspections in the presence of and under the direct supervision of a licensed home inspector prior to December 30, 2005.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS:

The committee amended the bill to provide that in order to satisfy the requirements for licensure as a home inspector, an applicant may successfully complete an approved course of study of 180 hours, rather than a course of study of not less than 140 hours. The amendments also remove the provision that a licensed home inspector supervising the 40 hours of unpaid field-based inspections for an applicant as a home inspector oversee and take full responsibility for any such inspection and any report produced.

The amendments also add provisions stipulating that during the first 180 days after the enactment date of this bill, the Home Inspection Advisory Committee shall, upon application, issue a home inspector license to any individual: (1) whose application for an associate home inspector license had been approved by the committee prior to December 30, 2005; or (2) who had satisfied the requirements set forth in section 9 of P.L.1997, c.323 (C.45:8-69) and had completed not less than 40 hours of unpaid field-based inspections in the presence of and under the direct supervision of a licensed home inspector prior to December 30, 2005.

The Senate Commerce Committee reports favorably and with committee amendments Senate Bill No. 2503.

This bill amends and supplements the "Home Inspection Professional Licensing Act," P.L.1997, c.323 (C.45:8-61 et seq.) to revise certain licensing requirements and to require continuing education for renewal of a license. Current law requires an applicant seeking licensure as a home inspector to have been engaged as a licensed associate home inspector for not less than one year, and have performed not less than 250 home inspections for compensation. This bill eliminates the classification of associate home inspector and the licensing of associate home inspectors.

As amended, the bill provides that in order to satisfy the requirements for licensure as a home inspector, an applicant may: successfully complete an approved course of study of 180 hours, as prescribed by the board, after consultation with the State Department of Education, which shall include not less than 40 hours of unpaid field-based inspections in the presence of and under the direct supervision of a licensed home inspector, which inspections shall be provided by the school providing the approved course of study; or (2) perform not less than 250 fee-paid home inspections in the presence of and under the direct supervision of a licensed home inspections in the presence provided by the school providing the approved course of study; or (2) perform not less than 250 fee-paid home inspections in the presence of and under the direct supervision of a licensed home inspector who oversees and takes full responsibility for the inspection and any report produced.

Under current law, to be eligible for licensure as a home inspector an applicant is required to pass the examination offered by the American Society of Home Inspectors (ASHI). As provided in the bill, to be eligible to be licensed an individual would have to pass an examination administered or approved by the Home Inspection Advisory Committee.

Current law also requires every licensed home inspector who is engaged in home inspection to secure, maintain and file with the State Board of Professional Engineers and Land Surveyors proof of a certificate of an error and omissions policy, which shall be in a minimum amount of \$500,000 per occurrence. As amended, this bill provides that an action for an error or omission in the performance of a home inspection contract by a licensed home inspector shall be commenced within four years of the date of the home inspection.

In addition, the bill stipulates, as a condition for biennial license renewal, that an individual complete 40 credit hours of continuing education. The advisory committee shall establish standards for continuing home inspection education, including the subject matter and content of courses of study and the selection of instructors, and approve programs offering continuing education credits.

Furthermore, the bill stipulates that during the first 180 days after the bill's enactment, the Home Inspection Advisory Committee shall, upon application, issue a home inspector license to any person who at any time prior to or during that 180-day period held a license as an associate home inspector, provided that the applicant: (1) had been engaged in the practice of home inspections for compensation for not less than three years prior to December 30, 2005 and had performed not less than 300 home inspections for compensation prior to December 30, 2005; or (2) had performed not less than 400 home inspections for compensation prior to December 30, 2005.

As amended the bill also stipulates that during the first 180 days after the enactment, the Home Inspection Advisory Committee shall, upon application, issue a home inspector license to any individual: (1) whose application for an associate home inspector license had been approved by the committee prior to December 30, 2005; or (2) who had satisfied the requirements set forth in section 9 of P.L.1997, c.323 (C.45:8-69) and had completed not less than 40 hours of unpaid field-based inspections in the presence of and under the direct supervision of a licensed home inspector prior to December 30, 2005.

The committee's amendments to the bill provide that in order to satisfy the requirements for licensure as a home inspector, an applicant may successfully complete an approved course of study of 180 hours, rather than a course of study of not less than 140 hours. The amendments also remove the provision that a licensed home inspector supervising the 40 hours of unpaid field-based inspections for an applicant as a home inspector oversee and take full responsibility for any such inspection and any report produced but require that the school providing the approved course of study must provide those 40 inspections.

The amendments also add the provision stipulating that during the first 180 days after the enactment date of this bill, the Home Inspection Advisory Committee shall, upon application, issue a home inspector license to any individual: (1) whose application for an associate home inspector license had been approved by the committee prior to December 30, 2005; or (2) who had satisfied the requirements set forth in section 9 of P.L.1997, c.323 (C.45:8-69) and had completed not less than 40 hours of unpaid field-based inspections in the presence of and under the direct supervision of a licensed home inspector prior to December 30, 2005.
