The inventory would include a list of brownfield sites in the State, and for each property, the street address, lot and block number, municipality and county, the size of the site, the last known municipal zoning classification, the name and address of the owner of record, an assessment of the contaminants known or suspected by the Department of Environmental Protection to have been discharged at the site, the known extent and status of remediation performed on the site, and the planning area designation and any center designation as shown on the State Plan Policy Map prepared by the State Planning Commission.

As reported, this bill is identical to Assembly Bill No. 1633 (2R), as also reported by the committee.

FISCAL IMPACT:

This bill appropriates \$285,000 from the General Fund to the Department of Community Affairs for the Brownfields Redevelopment Task Force to expedite and continue its preparation of the inventory of brownfield sites and related efforts to promote the cleanup and redevelopment of brownfield sites. Use of the \$285,000 appropriation would be memorialized by formal task force resolutions, which would be a matter of public record. The task force, under the bill, would be required to prepare an annual progress report detailing its efforts toward the compilation of an inventory of all brownfiled sites across the State and would be required to maintain an online database, known as "New Jersey Brownfields Site Mart," that would be accessible to the public for the purpose of making information on brownfield sites readily available for use by interested parties.
