Senate Bill No. 1863 (1R) provides that there shall be appropriated each year to the Department of Environmental Protection a sum sufficient to provide the State match required to qualify for any federal grants or other assistance apportioned and made available to the State of New Jersey under the State Wildlife Grants Program or any similar program established pursuant to federal law, rule, or regulation. The sum appropriated each year would be required to be expended by the Division of Fish and Wildlife for the purposes and in accordance with the requirements of the federal program and to allow the State's Endangered and Nongame Species Program in the Division to perform its duties and responsibilities.

The bill appropriates \$381,715 from the State General Fund for the foregoing purposes for the current year. The bill also provides that to the extent that the State has already expended any funds from other sources to provide the State match for the year 2004 under the federal program, the sum appropriated under the bill is to be used to fully reimburse those other sources accordingly.

Pursuant to federal law, the United States Fish and Wildlife Service has established a "State Wildlife Grants Program" to assist the various states by providing federal funds for the development and implementation of programs for the benefit of wildlife and their habitat, including species that are not hunted or fished. funds that (i) was used in FY2005 to support the conservation of endangered or nongame wildlife, but (ii) was not eligible to be counted towards the federal program's State match requirement. To the extent that these moneys from the dedicated funds are insufficient to meet the bill's appropriation requirement, the remaining amount necessary is to be appropriated from the General Fund.

#### **FISCAL IMPACT**

This bill appropriates from the General Fund to the Department of Environmental Protection in the current fiscal year the sum of \$381,715 to provide the State match for the year 2004 under the federal State Wildlife Grants Program. The bill's provision requiring the State to appropriate funding in future years to meet the State match requirement cannot be assured, as such appropriations are subject to the annual State budget process. - ! The bill appropriates \$381,715 from the General Fund to the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) to provide the State match required for federal grants made available to the State Wildlife Grants Program in federal FY 2004. It authorizes sufficient appropriations in subsequent years for the same purpose.
- ! Currently, revenues from wildlife conservation license plate sales and the endangered and nongame species State income tax check-off are used to provide the State match for federal wildlife grant funding, which totals \$1.2 million in federal FY 2004.
- ! The State Wildlife Grants Program is funded by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. It augments the Division of Fish and Wildlife's Endangered and Nongame Species Program, which benefits wildlife and their habitat, including species that are not hunted or fished.
- ! The Office of Legislative Services (OLS) estimates that the bill's fiscal impact is limited to the amount appropriated therein. Future appropriations are not assured because they are subject to the annual State Budget process, which ultimately determines funding availability.

#### **BILL DESCRIPTION**

Senate Bill No. 1863 of 2004 authorizes an annual General Fund appropriation to the DEP for the purpose of providing the State match required to qualify for any federal grants or other assistance made available to the State Wildlife Grants Program or any similar program. The bill



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appropriates \$381,715 from the General Fund to the DEP for these purposes in the current fiscal year. This will enable the State Endangered and Nongame Species Program to perform its duties and responsibilities without allocating all or part of its operating budget for State match purposes.

#### FISCAL ANALYSIS

#### **EXECUTIVE BRANCH**

None received.

#### OFFICE OF LEGISLATIVE SERVICES

The OLS estimates that the bill's fiscal impact will be limited to the appropriation of \$381,715 as provided therein. This amount is expected to match, or draw down, \$1,215,376 in federal wildlife grant funding, New Jersey's federal FY 2004 allocation. The OLS notes, however, that the bill's provision for future appropriations from the General Fund cannot be assured because such appropriations are subject to the annual State Budget process, where funding availability is not always certain. In addition, the Legislature and the Governor are under no statutory obligation to provide future year appropriations of this nature unless they are derived from a dedicated funding source such as fees, bonds or taxes. Given this fact, the inclusion of State matching funds for the bill's purpose in succeeding State Budgets would have to undergo the same scrutiny as other competing budget items.

The OLS further notes that the current practice of providing the State match for federal wildlife grants from wildlife conservation license plate sales and the endangered and nongame species State income tax check-off (which both support the State Endangered and Nongame Species Program) may be in jeopardy because revenues from these sources have declined in recent years. Consequently, the reduced revenue levels may not be able to fully support both the subject State match requirement and the Endangered and Nongame Species Program in the current fiscal year or in the future.

This bill provides that there shall be appropriated each year to the Department of Environmental Protection a sum sufficient to provide the State match required to qualify for any federal grants or other assistance apportioned and made available to the State of New Jersey under the State Wildlife Grants Program or any similar program established pursuant to federal law, rule, or regulation. The bill also provides that to the extent that the State has already expended any funds from other sources to provide the State match for the year 2004 under the federal program, the sum appropriated under the bill is to be used to fully reimburse those other sources accordingly.

Pursuant to federal law, the United States Fish and Wildlife Service has established a "State Wildlife Grants Program" to assist the various states by providing federal funds for the development and implementation of programs for the benefit of wildlife and their habitat, including species that are not hunted or fished. The grant program permits both planning and implementation activities but requires the State to provide one dollar in matching funds for every three dollars in federal funds apportioned to the State.

#### **COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS**

Committee amendments to this bill provide that the annual appropriation of "match funding" necessary to qualify for federal grants under the State Wildlife Grants Program shall, to the extent

possible, be made from those amounts, credited to various statutorily established funds dedicated to the conservation of endangered or nongame wildlife and their habitat, that exceeds the amount from those funds that (i) was used in FY2005 to support the conservation of endangered or nongame wildlife, but (ii) was not eligible to be counted towards the federal program's State match requirement. To the extent that these moneys from the dedicated funds are insufficient to meet the bill's appropriation requirement, the remaining amount necessary is to be appropriated from the General Fund.

As amended and reported by the committee, this bill is identical to Senate Bill No. 1863 (1R) of 2004.

The Assembly Budget Committee reports favorably Assembly Bill No. 3345 (1R).

Assembly Bill No. 3345 (1R) provides that there shall be appropriated each year to the Department of Environmental Protection a sum sufficient to provide the State match required to qualify for any federal grants or other assistance apportioned and made available to the State of New Jersey under the State Wildlife Grants Program or any similar program established pursuant to federal law, rule, or regulation. The sum appropriated each year would be required to be expended by the Division of Fish and Wildlife for the purposes and in accordance with the requirements of the federal program and to allow the State's Endangered and Nongame Species Program in the Division to perform its duties and responsibilities.

The bill appropriates \$381,715 from the State General Fund for the foregoing purposes for the current year. The bill also provides that to the extent that the State has already expended any funds from other sources to provide the State match for the year 2004 under the federal program, the sum appropriated under the bill is to be used to fully reimburse those other sources accordingly.

Pursuant to federal law, the United States Fish and Wildlife Service has established a "State Wildlife Grants Program" to assist the various states by providing federal funds for the development and implementation of programs for the benefit of wildlife and their habitat, including species that are not hunted or fished. As reported, this bill is identical to Senate Bill No. 1863 (1R), as also reported by the committee.

#### **FISCAL IMPACT**

This bill appropriates from the General Fund to the Department of Environmental Protection in the current fiscal year the sum of \$381,715 to provide the State match for the year 2004 under the federal State Wildlife Grants Program. The bill's provision requiring

the State to appropriate funding in future years to meet the State match requirement cannot be assured, as such appropriations are subject to the annual State budget process. It is noted that heretofore, the State has used revenue from wildlife conservation license plate sales, the endangered and nongame species income tax check-off, and assorted other minor sources to provide the State match, but that in recent years these revenue sources have declined markedly; accordingly, it is not certain that meeting the commitment to provide full funding of the State match requirement will not entail an appropriation from the General Fund.

The bill appropriates \$381,715 from the General Fund to the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) to provide the State match required for federal grants made available to the State Wildlife Grants Program in federal FY 2004. It authorizes sufficient appropriations in subsequent years for the same purpose.
- ! Currently, revenues from wildlife conservation license plate sales and the endangered and nongame species State income tax check-off are used to provide the State match for federal wildlife grant funding, which totals \$1.2 million in federal FY 2004.
- ! The State Wildlife Grants Program is funded by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. It augments the Division of Fish and Wildlife's Endangered and Nongame Species Program, which benefits wildlife and their habitat, including species that are not hunted or fished.
- ! The Office of Legislative Services (OLS) estimates that the bill's fiscal impact is limited to the amount appropriated therein. Future appropriations are not assured because they are subject to the annual State Budget process, which ultimately determines funding availability.

#### **BILL DESCRIPTION**

Assembly Bill No. 3345 of 2004 authorizes an annual General Fund appropriation to the DEP for the purpose of providing the State match required to qualify for any federal grants or other assistance made available to the State Wildlife Grants Program or any similar program. The bill appropriates \$381,715 from the General Fund to the DEP for these purposes in the current fiscal



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year. This will enable the State Endangered and Nongame Species Program to perform its duties and responsibilities without allocating all or part of its operating budget for State match purposes.

#### FISCAL ANALYSIS

#### EXECUTIVE BRANCH

None received.

#### OFFICE OF LEGISLATIVE SERVICES

The OLS estimates that the bill's fiscal impact will be limited to the appropriation of \$381,715 as provided therein. This amount is expected to match, or draw down, \$1,215,376 in federal wildlife grant funding, New Jersey's federal FY 2004 allocation. The OLS notes, however, that the bill's provision for future appropriations from the General Fund cannot be assured because such appropriations are subject to the annual State Budget process, where funding availability is not always certain. In addition, the Legislature and the Governor are under no statutory obligation to provide future year appropriations of this nature unless they are derived from a dedicated funding source such as fees, bonds or taxes. Given this fact, the inclusion of State matching funds for the bill's purpose in succeeding State Budgets would have to undergo the same scrutiny as other competing budget items.

The OLS further notes that the current practice of providing the State match for federal wildlife grants from wildlife conservation license plate sales and the endangered and nongame species State income tax check-off (which both support the State Endangered and Nongame Species Program) may be in jeopardy because revenues from these sources have declined in recent years. Consequently, the reduced revenue levels may not be able to fully support both the subject State match requirement and the Endangered and Nongame Species Program in the current fiscal year or in the future.
