Notwithstanding the provisions of any other law to the contrary, a municipality with a system of truck routes established by ordinance pursuant to P.L.1953, c.354 (C. 40:67-16.1 et seq.) that excludes all trucks having a total combined gross weight in excess of four tons from certain municipal streets may, by ordinance, increase the penalties for violating the truck route ordinance while traveling on a street or road having a grade in excess of five percent as follows:
- a. for a first violation a fine of not less than \$1,000 or more than \$1,500, and
 - b. for second or subsequent violations a fine of not less than \$4,000 or more than \$5,000.

2. This act shall take effect immediately.

STATEMENT

Under current statutory law, municipalities may establish, by ordinance, a system of truck routes which prohibit trucks having a total combined gross weight in excess of four tons from all streets in such municipality, except from those streets which form a part of the system of truck routes.

This bill authorizes municipalities to increase the penalty for a truck traveling on a portion of a street which is not part of the truck routes that has a steep slope with a grade in excess of five percent. A truck on a steep slope can lose its brakes or otherwise lose control resulting in a serious accident. An example of this problem is the steep section of Warrenville Road between Route 22 in Green Brook and Mountain Boulevard in Warren, New Jersey. The hill has been the site of numerous serious accidents in which trucks have gone down the hill out of control and hit other vehicles or overturned. Although the hill has signs posted to warn truckers of the four ton weight limit and the steep slope, the section of road averages at least one crash per week.

This bill will allow municipalities to pass ordinances to increase the fines imposed for violating their truck route ordinances when the violation occurs on a street or road with a grade in excess of five percent. The fine for a first violation would be not less than \$1,000 or more than \$1,500. The fine for second or subsequent violations would be not less than \$4,000 or more than \$5,000. These increased

The Assembly Transportation Committee reports favorably and with committee amendments Assembly Bill No. 3096.

Under current statutory law, municipalities may establish, by ordinance, a system of truck routes which prohibits trucks having a total combined gross weight in excess of four tons from all streets in such municipality, except from those streets which form a part of the system of truck routes.

This amended bill will allow a municipality to pass an ordinance to increase the fine imposed for violating its truck route ordinances when the violation occurs on a street or road with a grade in excess of five percent. A heavy truck on a steep slope can lose its brakes or otherwise lose control, resulting in a serious accident. The higher fines reflect the increased risk to public safety caused by violating the truck weight limits on roads with steep grades.

In general, a municipality is limited by statute in setting the fine imposed for a violation of an ordinance to at least \$100 with a maximum of \$1,250 and an additional fine for a repeat offense within one year. Under the provisions of this bill as amended, the municipality may set the fine for a first violation involving a heavy truck on a steep slope at not less than \$2,500 or more than \$3,000. The fine for a second or subsequent such violation would be not less than \$4,000 or more than \$5,000. There is no requirement that a second or subsequent violation be within one year of a prior violation.

The bill requires that when a municipality adopts an ordinance increasing the penalties for a prohibited truck traveling on a steep grade in accordance with the bill, the municipality must place signs in appropriate locations to warn truck drivers in advance that a steep grade is ahead, that trucks in excess of four tons are prohibited from traveling on the steep grade, and that increased fines will be imposed for a violation of the prohibition.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS

The Committee amended the bill to change the fine for a first violation from a range of \$1,000 to \$1,500 to a range of \$2,500 to \$3,000 and to require a municipality which adopts an ordinance in

accordance with the bill to put up signs warning truck drivers about the steep slope, the prohibition on heavy trucks, and the increased fines.
