This bill amends the statutes creating the "Main Street New Jersey" program to provide for increased membership on the Advisory Board to include representatives of the Commissioner of Transportation and the Director of the Office of State Planning. In addition, the bill would permit municipalities to accept contributions directly from corporations and nonprofit organizations to aid in the development of public-private partnerships. Currently, the Commissioner of Community Affairs is permitted to accept contributions from all sources for the State fund, but there is no specific authorization for participating municipalities to take direct contributions, even though the act requires them to develop public-private partnerships. This bill will provide more flexibility to participating Main Street New Jersey municipalities in obtaining funding to operate their programs.

The Assembly Commerce and Economic Development Committee reports favorably and with committee amendments Senate Bill No. 320.

Senate Bill No. 320 would increase the membership of the Main Street New Jersey Advisory Board from 19 to 21 members to include representatives of the Commissioner of Transportation and the Director of the Office of State Planning.

As introduced, the bill would have permitted Main Street municipalities to accept contributions directly from corporations and nonprofit organizations to aid in the development of public-private partnerships. Apparently, these contributions are already received by Main Street organizations without any problem under the current program and so the committee amended the bill to remove this section.
