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1 "Knowledge will forever govern ignorance: And a people who mean 2 to be their own Governors, must arm themselves with the power 3 which knowledge gives." Alexis DeTocqueville similarly 4 recognized the benefits of citizen participation in government: "It is 5 by taking a share in legislation that the American learns to know the 6 law; it is by governing that he becomes educated about the 7 formalities of government. The great work of society is daily performed before his eyes, and so to say, under his hands." 8 9 Openness in the conduct of government affairs also helps to prevent 10 actual or perceived corruption because, as Woodrow Wilson said, 11 "corruption thrives in secret places and avoids public places."

By 1981, every other state, as well as the federal government, in large part because of New Jersey's example, had enacted similar laws intended to promote public confidence in government and the political process. There is, perhaps, no more fitting way to honor Senator Baer than to include his name in the title of this most significant legislative accomplishment.
