AN ACT concerning school security drills, supplementing Title 18A of the New Jersey Statutes and chapter 9 of Appendix A, and amending N.J.S.18A:41-1.

**BE IT ENACTED** by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

- 1. (New section) As used in this act:
- "School security drill" means an exercise, other than a fire drill, to practice procedures that respond to an emergency situation including, but not limited to, a non-fire evacuation, lockdown, or active shooter situation and that is similar in duration to a fire drill.

2. (New section) A local board of education and chief school administrator of a nonpublic school shall ensure that all '[full time] full-time¹ teaching staff members in the district or nonpublic school are provided with training on school safety and security that includes instruction on school security drills. The training shall use the drill guide and training materials prepared pursuant to section 3 of ¹[P.L., c. (C.) (pending before the legislature as this bill)] P.L., c. (C.) (pending before the Legislature as this bill)¹. Each teaching staff member shall be provided with the training within one year of the effective date of this act or within 60 days of the commencement of ¹[his] that staff member's¹ employment, whichever date is later.

- 3. (New section) a. The Director of the Office of Homeland Security and Preparedness shall, in consultation with the Commissioner of Education, the Director of the Division of Fire Safety in the Department of Community Affairs, the Director of the State Office of Emergency Management in the Division of State Police in the Department of Law and Public Safety, and the Attorney General, develop and disseminate to each school district and nonpublic school a building security drill guide and training materials that educate school employees on proper evacuation and lockdown procedures in a variety of emergency situations on school grounds including, but not limited to, bomb threats and active shooter situations.
- b. The drill guide and training materials shall be updated at regular intervals in order to ensure that they incorporate the most current information available on school security.

The Assembly Homeland Security and State Preparedness Committee reports favorably and with committee amendments Assembly Bill No. 3002.
