

The Senate Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee reports favorably a Senate Committee Substitute for Senate Bill No. 2286.

This committee substitute requires the Commissioner of Education, in consultation with the Commissioner of Health and Senior Services, to develop a fact sheet on the human papillomavirus (HPV), and directs school districts to distribute the fact sheet to parents and guardians of students in grades seven through 12 at the start of the 2007-2008 school year. In subsequent school years, distribution would be to parents and guardians of seventh graders only. Private schools are encouraged, but not required, to distribute the fact sheet.

The substitute also requires the Commissioner of Health and Senior Services, in consultation with the Commissioner of Education and the Director of the Division on Women in the Department of Community Affairs, to establish a public awareness campaign about HPV.

In addition, the Commissioner of Health and Senior Services is to prepare a patient information brochure regarding HPV, including its causes and the most effective means of prevention and treatment. The pamphlet, which is to be updated as necessary, is to be distributed at no charge to all pediatricians in the State, and be made available to other health care providers upon request.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) approved a vaccine for use in girls and women that prevents infection of certain HPV strains most closely associated with cervical cancer, and it is anticipated that the FDA will approve other similar vaccines in the future. The Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices in the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommends that adolescent girls routinely be immunized against HPV before initiation of sexual activity to ensure a more effective immune response.

This bill is similar to Assembly No. 3920 (Vainieri Huttle/Voss/Stender/Quigley), which is pending in the Assembly Health and Senior Services Committee.



The Assembly Health and Senior Services Committee reports favorably an Assembly Committee Substitute for Assembly Bill No. 3920.

The purpose of this committee substitute is to promote education and public awareness in regard to the human papillomavirus (HPV).

The substitute provides specifically as follows:

- The Commissioner of Education, in consultation with the Commissioner of Health and Senior Services, is to develop an educational fact sheet about HPV, for distribution to parents or guardians of students in grades seven through 12, which includes information about the causes, symptoms and means of transmission of HPV, and where additional information can be obtained.
- For the 2007-2008 school year, each school district is to distribute to parents and guardians of students in grades seven through 12 the educational fact sheet on HPV, in a manner prescribed by the Commissioner of Education.
- Beginning with the 2008-2009 school year, each school district is to distribute the educational fact sheet annually to parents or guardians of students in grade seven in a manner prescribed by the Commissioner of Education.
- The Commissioner of Education is to also make the educational fact sheet available to private schools educating students in grades seven through 12; and these schools are encouraged, but not required, to distribute the fact sheet to parents or guardians of students at the school.
- The Commissioner of Health and Senior Services, in consultation with the Commissioner of Education and the Director of the Division on Women in the Department of Community Affairs, is to establish a public awareness campaign to inform the general public about the clinical significance and public health implications of HPV, including its causes and the most effective means of prevention and treatment.
- The public awareness campaign is to be established in accordance with accepted public health practice and recommendations of the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and within the

limits of available funds and any other resources available for the purposes thereof.

• The commissioner is to: prepare a patient information brochure regarding HPV, including its causes and the most effective means of prevention and treatment, and distribute the pamphlet, at no charge, to all pediatricians in the State; update the pamphlet as necessary; and make additional copies available to other health care providers upon request.

This substitute is identical to the Senate Committee Substitute for Senate Bill No. 2286 (Weinberg/Karcher), which is currently pending before the Senate.
