The Assembly Housing and Local Government Committee reports favorably Assembly Bill No. 409 with committee amendments.

This bill, as amended, directs the Commissioner of Community Affairs to establish an emergency deployment program to assist local housing and code official inspectors in the evaluation of buildings and structures affected by a natural or man-made disaster or emergency, such as when a state of emergency has been declared by the President of the United States or the Governor, or when a state of emergency has been declared by a municipal emergency management coordinator. The commissioner may provide for participation in the program by licensed professional engineers, registered architects and by other licensed professionals.

The bill as amended, also provides that the deployment program allow the governing bodies of two or more municipalities by resolution to enter into agreements with each other for mutual construction code enforcement aid concerning the evaluation of buildings and structures affected by a natural or man-made disaster or emergency. Such agreements may provide for the reimbursement of the municipality or municipalities rendering such aid, including reimbursement for any damage to property and for payment to any official or employee of a local construction code enforcing agency for injuries sustained while serving pursuant to such agreements, or to a surviving spouse or other dependent in the event of the death of that official or employee.

Persons deployed under the emergency deployment program shall, while on duty rendering assistance to any local construction code enforcing agency, have the same powers, authority and immunities as the members of the local construction code enforcing agency of the municipality in which such assistance is being rendered. In addition, if any code official or inspector suffers injury or death in the performance of his duties, the legal beneficiaries of such official or inspector shall be entitled to such salary, pension rights, workers' compensation or other benefits as would have accrued if such injury or death had occurred in the performance of duties in the jurisdiction in which the official or employee is regularly employed. Participation in the emergency deployment program will be deemed automatic unless a municipality opts out of the program by adopting a resolution of nonparticipation, and files the resolution with the Department of Community Affairs within 60 days of the effective date of rules promulgated to effectuate the bill. A non-participating municipality may join the emergency deployment program at any time by adopting a resolution of participation and filing it with the commissioner.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS

The committee amended the bill to provide that the Commissioner of Community Affairs establish a program of emergency deployment utilizing existing code officials, rather than maintaining a list of volunteers for that purpose. In addition, participation in the emergency deployment program will be deemed automatic, unless a municipality adopts a resolution of nonparticipation, which is to be filed with the Commissioner of Consumer Affairs.

This bill was pre-filed for introduction in the 2006-2007 session pending technical review. As reported, the bill includes the changes required by technical review, which has been performed.

The Senate Community and Urban Affairs Committee reports favorably Assembly Bill No. 409 [2R].

These floor amendments clarify that the construction code officials and inspectors participating in the program for emergency deployment must be employed by the State or a county or municipality. The amendments also require local units to make agreements as to the responsible entity for the payments of compensation and benefits for construction code officials and inspectors deployed outside of their normal jurisdiction. Finally, the amendments require deployed construction code officials and inspectors to report to the municipal emergency management coordinator for the area of their deployment, and made a technical correction to the bill.

Inspectors and code officials would help evaluate buildings and structures affected by a disaster or other emergency and provide other assistance as may be required. The commissioner may provide for participation in the program by licensed professional engineers, registered architects and by other licensed professionals.

The bill, as amended by the committee, also allows the governing bodies of two or more municipalities to enter into mutual construction code enforcement aid agreements concerning the evaluation of buildings and structures affected by a natural or man-made disaster or emergency.

Persons deployed under the commissioner's program and persons providing assistance pursuant to an intermunicipal agreement would have the same powers, authority and immunities as the members of the local construction code enforcing agency of the municipality being assisted.

The amendments address the status of persons deployed under the emergency deployment program, providing that while on duty rendering assistance to a local construction code enforcing agency, officials and inspectors would have the same powers, authority and immunities as the members of the local construction code enforcing agency of the municipality in which such assistance is being rendered. The amendments also provide that if a local construction code official or inspector suffers injury or death while deployed under an emergency deployment program or pursuant to an intermunicipal agreement, the individual's legal beneficiaries would be entitled to the same salary, pension rights, workers' compensation or other benefits as would have accrued if the injury or death had occurred in the performance of duties in the jurisdiction in which the official or employee is regularly employed.

The amendments provide that participation in the emergency deployment program is automatic for municipalities but allows a municipality to opt out of the program by adopting a resolution of nonparticipation, and filing the resolution with the Department of Community Affairs within 60 days of the effective date of rules promulgated to effectuate the bill. The amendments provide that a non-participating municipality may join the emergency deployment program at any time by adopting a resolution of participation and filing it with the commissioner.

These amendments makes this bill identical to A409 (2R) which bill was also reported from committee this date.
