BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

The '[Office of the]' Attorney General '[in the 8 a. 1. Department of Law and Public Safety, in consultation with the 9 Commissioner of Education, $]^1$ shall develop and maintain $\frac{1}{1}$ in 10 coordination with the Commissioner of Education,¹ a gang 11 12 education seminar program to educate public and nonpublic school administrators on how to recognize signs of gang involvement or 13 14 activity. A seminar shall be offered annually in each county and 15 shall be held in the office of the county superintendent of schools or such other facility as the '[Office of the]' Attorney General 'or 16 <u>Commissioner of Education</u>¹ shall designate. 17

b. A superintendent, assistant superintendent, principal or other 18 administrator employed by a public school district shall attend a 19 20 gang education seminar offered pursuant to this section within the 21 first year of initial employment as an administrator with a public 22 school district. A public school administrator must attend a seminar within the first year of initial employment as an administrator with a public school district; and an administrator employed by a school district prior to the bill's effective date must attend the first seminar offered in the county subsequent to the bill's enactment.

According to the National Alliance of Gang Investigators' Associations, the problem of gang involvement today is more pervasive than at any time in history, crossing all socioeconomic, ethnic and racial boundaries. This bill was pre-filed for introduction in the 2006-2007 session pending technical review. As reported, the bill includes the changes required by technical review, which has been performed.

A seminar would be held annually in each county. The seminars would be open to all public and nonpublic school administrators; however, all public school administrators would be required to attend a seminar. The committee amended the bill to exempt from the seminar requirements a superintendent, assistant superintendent, principal or other administrator who has successfully completed a substantially equivalent gang education seminar. As amended and reported by the committee, this bill is identical to Senate Bill No. 1748, which also was amended and reported by the committee on this date.

- The Office of Legislative Services (OLS) **does not concur** with the Executive estimate. The OLS estimates that the provisions of this bill would be a minimal expenditure to the State noting that the Department of Law and Public Safety has many tools already in place to effectuate this bill.

BILL DESCRIPTION

Assembly Bill No. 1973 (2R) of 2006 requires the Attorney General, in coordination with the Commissioner of Education, to develop and maintain seminars to teach educators to spot signs of gang activity and student involvement in gangs.

The bill requires that at least one seminar be held annually in each county. While these seminars would be open to all public and private school administrators, they are mandatory for all public school administrators. The bill authorizes the Commissioner of Education, in addition to the Attorney General, to designate a facility for a seminar.

FISCAL ANALYSIS

EXECUTIVE BRANCH

The Division of Criminal Justice in the Department of Law and Public Safety provided a fiscal estimate that projected that the enactment of this bill would cost \$222,596 in the first year.

In order to establish this program, the division would need an increase in staff under this legislation. This figure includes the salary for one full-time Administrative Analyst and one full-time Management Assistant, at \$116,457; fringe benefits at \$40,469; materials and supplies, at \$15,000; and other initial set-up equipment, at \$50,670. The division estimated the cost of this bill at \$169,772 and \$178,011 in the second and third years, respectively.

OFFICE OF LEGISLATIVE SERVICES

The OLS does not concur with the Executive estimate. The OLS estimates that the provisions of this bill would be a minimal expenditure to the State noting that the Department of Law and Public Safety has many tools already in place to effectuate this bill.

The OLS determines that the Department of Law and Public Safety currently has the information and resources needed to conduct this gang awareness training program for school administrators.

The Street Gang Bureau, established in 1993, in the Division of Criminal Justice currently has information published on the Department of Law and Public Safety Web site regarding how to recognize gang related signs as well as other anti-gang related information. The Web site further notes that bureau serves as the primary state law enforcement liaison with New Jersey's 21 counties, and maintains regional offices in northern and southern New Jersey.

Additionally, the Web site notes that the Division of State Police currently provides training to anti-gang task forces on gang awareness, street gang recognition and investigative techniques.
