AN ACT to establish the "New Jersey-Israel Commission" as a permanent commission in the Department of State, and supplementing Title 52 of the Revised Statutes.

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BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

- a. On April 25, 1988, in commemoration of the 40th anniversary of the founding of the State of Israel, the State of New Jersey entered into a Sister State Agreement with Israel as a symbol of the potential for cooperation that exists between our two states;

 - b. The agreement calls for the development of trade and cultural and educational exchanges, in addition to encouraging the development of capital investment and joint business ventures; and

COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS

The amendments provide that as of January 1, 2012, the commission membership will be a total of 85 members, eight legislators and 77 public members. The legislative members will be appointed by the Governor upon the recommendation of the General Assembly Speaker and the Senate President, to serve during the two-year legislative term in which the appointment is made. The 77 public members will be appointed by the Governor for a three-year term, except that the first public members will be appointed to staggered terms.

The committee amendments further provide that a majority of the members of the executive committee of the commission will constitute a quorum and authorize the commission to raise funds and accept gifts, grants and bequests to defray the administrative expenses and costs of the commission.

The members of the commission appointed pursuant to Executive Order No. 49 of 2007 and serving on the effective date of this act shall continue as members of the commission until December 31, 2011 on which date the appointments of all the members shall expire.
 - c. On January 1, 2012 and thereafter, the membership of the commission shall consist of 85 members to be appointed by the Governor, as follows:

- (1) Eight members of the commission shall be members of the Legislature. Four of the legislative members shall be members of the General Assembly, no more than two of whom shall be of the same political party, and four shall be members of the Senate, no more than two of whom shall be of the same political party. The eight legislative members shall be appointed by the Governor upon the recommendation of the Speaker of the General Assembly and the President of the Senate, respectively. The legislative members shall serve during the two-year legislative term in which the appointment is made.
- (2) Seventy-seven members of the commission shall be members of the public, to be appointed by the Governor to serve for a term of three years, except that of those 77 members first appointed, 25 shall be appointed to serve an initial term of two years, 25 shall be appointed to serve an initial term of three years, and 27 shall be appointed to serve an initial term of four years.
- (3) A vacancy in the membership of the commission shall be filled in the same manner as the original appointment is made.
- d. Members of the commission shall serve without compensation, but may be reimbursed for expenses actually incurred in the performance of their duties, within the limit of funds appropriated to the commission or otherwise made available to it for its purposes.
- e. The commission may meet and hold hearings at the places it designates throughout the State.
- 3. The Governor shall designate a chairperson or cochairpersons from among the members of the commission, who shall serve in that capacity at the pleasure of the Governor. The chairperson or co-chairpersons, as applicable, shall appoint from among the commission members the subcommittee chairpersons

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who shall each chair one subcommittee. The chairperson or cochairpersons, as applicable, shall organize the commission's executive committee, to be composed of the chairperson or cochairpersons, as applicable, the subcommittee chairpersons, and additional at-large members to be appointed by the chairperson or co-chairpersons, as applicable, from among the members of the commission.

A majority of the members of the executive committee shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of the business of the commission. Action may be taken and motions adopted at any meeting of the commission only if a majority of the executive committee of the commission is present and voting.

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- 4. a. The purpose of the New Jersey-Israel Commission shall be to implement the stated goals of the Sister State Agreement between New Jersey and Israel. In furtherance of its purpose, the commission shall establish subcommittees to examine the following issues:
- (1) Economic Development and International Trade;
 - (2) Research, Science and Technology;
 - (3) Education;
 - (4) Culture and Tourism; and
- (5) other issues as determined by the commission pursuant to its purposes.
- b. The commission shall report its findings, recommendations and plans directly to the Governor.

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5. The New Jersey-Israel Commission shall be authorized to raise funds, through direct solicitation or other fundraising events, alone or with other groups, and accept gifts, grants and bequests from individuals, corporations, foundations, governmental agencies, public and private organizations and institutions, to defray the commission's administrative expenses and carry out its purposes as set forth in this act, P.L. , c. (C.) (pending before the The funds, gifts, grants, or bequests Legislature as this bill). received pursuant to this section shall be deposited in a State Treasury account and allocated and annually appropriated to the Department of State to defray the commission's administrative expenses and carry out its purposes.

- 6. All other provisions of Executive Order No. 208 of 1989, Executive Order No. 35 of 1991, Executive Order No. 90 of 1993, Executive Order No. 37 of 1995, Executive Order No. 70 of 1997, Executive Order No. 12 of 2002, and Executive Order No. 49 of 2007 that are not inconsistent with this act, P.L. , c. (C.) (pending before the Legislature as this bill), shall remain in full
- 47 force and effect.

7. This act shall take effect immediately.

STATEMENT

In 1988, in commemoration of the 40th anniversary of the founding of the State of Israel, the State of New Jersey entered into a Sister State Agreement with Israel as a symbol of the potential for cooperation that exists between New Jersey and Israel. The agreement calls for the development of trade and cultural and educational exchanges, in addition to encouraging the development of capital investment and joint business ventures. In 1989, the New Jersey-Israel Commission was established as a temporary commission by gubernatorial executive order and has continued to be temporary by executive orders. Executive Order No. 49 by Governor Jon S. Corzine extends and continues the commission until January of 2012.

The bill maintains the current membership of the commission of between 15 and 100 members, all of whom are appointed by the Governor, with eight members being legislators, until December 31, 2011. As of January 1, 2012, the bill establishes a commission membership of 85, eight legislators and 77 public members. The legislative members will be appointed by the Governor upon the recommendation of the General Assembly Speaker and the Senate President, to serve during the two-year legislative term in which the appointment is made. The 77 public members also will be appointed by the Governor, for a three-year term, except that of the public members first appointed, 25 will be appointed to serve an initial term of two years, 25 an initial term of three years, and 27 an initial term of four years.

Under the bill, a majority of the members of the executive committee of the commission will constitute a quorum and actions may be taken and motions adopted at any meeting of the commission, if a majority of the executive committee is present and voting. The bill authorizes the commission to raise funds and accept gifts, grants and bequests from individuals, corporations, foundations, government agencies, organizations and institutions to defray the administrative expenses and costs of the commission. Such funds will be deposited in a State Treasury account to be annually appropriated and allocated to the Department of State to cover the commission's costs.

Governor Corzine Signs Legislation Officially Designating New Jersey Israel Commission Within Department of State

PARAMUS - Further strengthening the bilateral ties between New Jersey and Israel, Governor Jon S. Corzine today signed legislation establishing the New Jersey Israel Commission as a permanent commission within the Department of State.

"Israel is one of the Garden State's most important international partners," said Governor Corzine. "By signing this legislation, we will enhance an historic collaborative partnership that has flourished for twenty years in areas ranging from technology growth and investment to cultural and educational enrichment. As a symbol of potential cooperation, New Jersey signed a Sister-State Agreement with the State of Israel in 1988 to work collaboratively on areas focusing on trade, cultural and educational exchanges as well as the development of

capital investment and joint business ventures.

"This is a wonderful day for New Jersey, the State of Israel and the unique sister state relationship that's flourished for two decades," said Secretary of State Nina Mitchell Wells. "This permanent designation is proof of how important our economic and cultural ties to Israel are, and how this partnership will remain a cornerstone of New Jersey's larger international presence for years to come. To say we're thrilled is an understatement."

"Over the past 60 years, the State of New Jersey has worked to create a good relationship with Israel, through trade and cultural exchanges," said Senator Loretta Weinberg, (D-Bergen). "This is our way of congratulating our 'sister state' on 60 years, as we look forward to reinforce our current partnerships and forge new ones."

"Through the codification of the Commission, we are protecting the current agreement covering exchange programs we have with Israel, while also congratulating its people on reaching such a significant milestone," said Senator Robert Gordon, (D-Bergen).

The New Jersey-Israel Commission was established as a temporary commission in 1989 and has continued its temporary status through executive orders. Governor Corzine extended and continued the commission until January of 2012.

Primary sponsors of the legislation in the Senate were Senators Loretta Weinberg (D-Bergen) and Robert M. Gordon (D-Bergen). In the Assembly, primary sponsors were Assemblymen Gordon M. Johnson (D-Bergen), Gary S. Schaer (D-Bergen, Essex, Passaic), Declan J. O'Scanlon Jr., (R-Mercer, Monmouth) and Assemblywomen Valerie Vainieri Huttle (D-Bergen), Caridad Rodriguez (D-Hudson) and Caroline Casagrande (R-Mercer, Monmouth).

Israel is one of New Jersey's top international markets, growing 195 percent from 2006 to 2007. Israel now ranks as New Jersey's ninth largest trading partner in 2007, up from 22nd in 2006.

Governor Corzine also signed SJR-62/AJR-102, congratulating Israel on its 60th anniversary. Officially, May 14 of 2008 marked the 60th anniversary of the founding of the modern State of Israel.

"Our ties with Israel run deep," added Governor Corzine. "We believe in the spirit and achievements of the modern State of Israel, and we are thrilled to be part of the celebration going on across the globe."

"For many New Jerseyans, family ties connect them directly to Israel," said Assemblywoman Valerie Vainieri Huttle (D-Bergen). "Honoring Israel in this anniversary year also honors the families here in New Jersey who yearn for nothing more a secure future for their loved ones."
