P.L. 2008, CHAPTER 42, approved July 15, 2008 Senate, No. 1493 (First Reprint)

AN ACT concerning law enforcement powers of United States Park Police, supplementing chapter 154 of Title 2A of the New Jersey Statutes, and amending P.L.1983, c.268.

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5 **BE IT ENACTED** by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

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- 1. (New section) Full-time law enforcement officers employed by the Department of the Interior as park police who are empowered to effect an arrest with or without a warrant for violations of the United States Code and who are authorized to carry firearms in the performance of their duties shall be empowered to act as an officer for the arrest of offenders against the laws of this State:
- a. where the person reasonably believes that a crime of the first, second, or third degree is or is about to be committed or attempted in his presence; and
- b. where the person reasonably believes that a crime of the fourth degree, a disorderly persons offense, a petty disorderly persons offense, or a violation of Title 39 of the Revised Statutes is or is about to be committed or attempted in his presence on ¹[property contiguous to] Ellis Island or in Liberty State Park within 500 feet of the ferry terminal serving passengers bound for ¹ the Statue of Liberty National Monument ¹[and] or ¹ Ellis Island ¹or in Liberty State Park within 500 feet of the access bridge to Ellis Island ¹ while that officer is in performance of his ¹[officials] official ¹ duties.

The Senate Law and Public Safety and Veterans' Affairs Committee reports favorably and with committee amendments Senate Bill No. 1493.

As amended, Senate Bill No. 1493 allows United States Park Police to make arrests while on duty for fourth degree crimes, disorderly and petty disorderly persons offenses, as well as for motor vehicle violations, on Ellis Island or in Liberty State Park within 500 feet of the ferry terminal serving passengers bound for the Statute of Liberty National Monument and Ellis Island or in Liberty State Park within 500 feet of the access bridge to Ellis Island.

Currently, these federal officers are only authorized to make arrests on State property for crimes of the first, second or third degree.

The United States Park Police in the federal Department of the Interior is the oldest uniformed federal law enforcement agency. These officers secure and protect the Statue of Liberty National Monument and Ellis Island and the visitors to these national treasures. They serve as patrol officers, marine police, SWAT team members, explosives experts and terrorism detectives.

United States Park Police officers often encounter persons committing lesser degree crimes and offenses, as well as motor vehicle violations, on check points and bridges leading to the Statue of Liberty and Ellis Island, but they have no jurisdiction under current State law to make arrests for these crimes or offenses or to issue summonses for the illegal conduct.

As introduced, the bill permitted United States Park Police to make arrests while on duty for fourth degree crimes, disorderly and petty disorderly persons offenses, as well as for motor vehicle violations, on property contiguous to the Statue of Liberty National Monument and Ellis Island.

The Assembly Law and Public Safety Committee reports favorably and with committee amendments Assembly Bill No. 210.

As amended, Assembly Bill No. 210 allows United States Park Police to make arrests while on duty for fourth degree crimes, disorderly and petty disorderly persons offenses, as well as for motor vehicle violations, on Ellis Island or in Liberty State Park or on the waters contiguous to the Statue of Liberty National Monument and Ellis Island. Also as amended, these officers are authorized to make these arrests on Sandy Hook and the contiguous waters.

Currently, these federal officers are only authorized to make arrests on State property for crimes of the first, second or third degree.

The United States Park Police in the federal Department of the Interior is the oldest uniformed federal law enforcement agency. These officers secure and protect the Statue of Liberty National Monument and Ellis Island and the visitors to these national treasures. They serve as patrol officers, marine police, SWAT team members, explosives experts and terrorism detectives.

United States Park Police officers often encounter persons committing lesser degree crimes and offenses, as well as motor vehicle violations, on check points and bridges leading to the Statue of Liberty and Ellis Island, but they have no jurisdiction under current State law to make arrests for these crimes or offenses or to issue summonses for the illegal conduct.

This bill was pre-filed for introduction in the 2008-2009 session pending technical review. As reported, the bill includes the changes required by technical review, which has been performed.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS:

The committee amended the bill to:

- (1) add Sandy Hook and the contiguous waters to the bill; and
- (2) clarify that the bill's provisions apply to Ellis Island and Liberty State Park, as well as the waters contiguous to the Statue of Liberty and Ellis Island.

STATEMENT TO

[First Reprint] ASSEMBLY, No. 210

with Assembly Floor Amendment (Proposed By Assemblyman JOHNSON)

ADOPTED: JUNE 23, 2008

Assembly Bill No. 210 (1R) expands the State law enforcement powers of United States Park Police.

The bill authorizes these park police officers to make arrests while they are on duty for fourth degree crimes, disorderly and petty disorderly persons offenses, and motor vehicle violations if the offense or violation occurs on Sandy Hook and contiguous waters, on Ellis Island or in Liberty State Park or on the waters contiguous to the Statue of Liberty National Monument and Ellis Island.

Currently, these federal officers are only authorized to make arrests on State property for crimes of the first, second or third degree.

Under these Assembly amendments, United States park police officers would be authorized to make these arrests on Ellis Island or in Liberty State Park within 500 feet of the ferry terminal serving passengers bound for the Statue of Liberty National Monument or Ellis Island or in Liberty State Park within 500 feet of the access bridge to Ellis Island. The amendments also make a technical correction.

As amended, Assembly Bill No. 210 (1R) is identical to Senate Bill No. 1493 (1R).
