1 AN ACT establishing an autism ¹and intellectual and other

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BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

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- 1. The Legislature finds and declares that:
- a. Autism is a developmental disorder of brain function which is typically manifested in impaired social interaction, problems with verbal and nonverbal communication and imagination, and unusual or severely limited activities and interests. These symptoms generally appear during the first three years of childhood and continue throughout life;
- ¹[b.] According to the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, or CDC, one of every 94 children in this State has autism, which is the highest rate among the states examined by the CDC in the most comprehensive study of the prevalence of autism to date;
- ¹b. In addition to those diagnosed with autism every year, there are an estimated 4.5 million individuals with intellectual and other developmental disabilities living in the United States, including approximately 200,000 individuals in New Jersey.

EXPLANATION – Matter enclosed in bold-faced brackets [thus] in the above bill is not enacted and is intended to be omitted in the law.

Matter underlined <u>thus</u> is new matter. Matter enclosed in superscript numerals has been adopted as follows: ¹Senate SHH committee amendments adopted May 5, 2008.

Developmental disabilities are a diverse group of severe chronic conditions that are due to mental or physical impairments which are manifested in problems with major life activities such as language, mobility, learning, self-help, and independent living.

Developmental disabilities begin anytime during development up to 22 years of age and usually last throughout a person's lifetime.

Intellectual disability is characterized both by a significantly below-average score on a test of mental ability or intelligence and by limitations in the ability to function in areas of daily life, such as communication, self-care, and getting along in social situations and school activities. Intellectual disability is sometimes referred to as a cognitive disability or mental retardation. Intellectual disabilities include, but are not limited to, Down syndrome, fetal alcohol syndrome, fragile X syndrome, Cri-du-chat syndrome, Prader-Willi syndrome, as well as infections such as congenital cytomegalovirus or birth defects that affect the brain such as hydrocephalus or cortical atrophy. Other causes of intellectual disability include serious head injury, stroke or certain infections such as meningitis; and

c. Firefighters, emergency medical technicians, and police officers may unexpectedly encounter or be asked to locate a person diagnosed with autism 'or an intellectual or other developmental disability'. Given the high number of individuals affected by '[autism] these disabilities', it is altogether fitting and proper to ensure that emergency responders are uniformly trained in recognizing the behavioral symptoms and characteristics of '[an autistic child or adult] a child or adult with one or more of these disabilities', and are educated in the high risks associated with '[autism] these disabilities' as well as basic response techniques.

- 2. a. The Commissioner of Health and Senior Services and the Commissioner of Human Services, in consultation with the New Jersey Fire and Emergency Medical Services Institute and the New Jersey State First Aid Council, shall develop a training curriculum with the purpose of informing emergency responders of the risks associated with autism 'or an intellectual or other developmental disability', as well as providing instruction in appropriate '[autism]' recognition and response techniques 'concerning these disabilities'. The curriculum shall be incorporated into existing time requirements for training and continuing education of emergency responders.
- b. Prior to certification by the Department of Health and Senior Services, each emergency medical technician trained in basic life support services as defined in section 1 of P.L.1985, c.351 (C.26:2K-21) shall be required to satisfactorily complete the training developed under subsection a. of this section. Every emergency medical technician certified prior to the effective date of

this act shall, within 36 months of the effective date of this act, satisfactorily complete the training in '[autism]' recognition and response techniques 'concerning these disabilities,' through existing continuing education requirements.

c. The Commissioner of Health and Senior Services shall adopt rules and regulations, pursuant to the "Administrative Procedure Act," P.L.1968, c.410 (C.52:14B-1 et seq.), to effectuate the purposes of this act.

This bill is similar to Assembly Bill No. 4058 (2R) of 2007 (Scalera/Roberts/Voss), which passed the General Assembly 72-2-5 on March 15, 2007, and was reported by the Senate Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee with committee amendments. The bill was pending before the Senate at the conclusion of the 212th Legislature.

The Senate Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee reports favorably and with committee amendments Assembly Bill No. 1908.

- The Police Training Commission in the Department of Law and Public Safety is to adopt a training course regarding the risks associated with autism or an intellectual or other developmental disability and appropriate recognition and response techniques concerning these disabilities based on the curriculum developed by DHSS and DHS. The course is to be administered by the employing agency as part of the in-service training provided to each local police officer in each law enforcement unit operating in the State.
 - -- Prior to being appointed to permanent status as a local police officer in a law enforcement unit, an individual is to complete the training course.
 - -- Every local police officer appointed prior to the effective date of the bill must, within 36 months of that effective date, satisfactorily complete a training course in recognition and response techniques concerning these disabilities.
- The bill takes effect on the first day of the seventh month following its enactment.

Committee amendments expand the scope of the bill to include intellectual and other developmental disabilities, as well as autism.

As amended by committee, this bill is identical to Senate Bill No. 1217 SCA (Weinberg/Gordon), which the committee also reported favorably on this date.

The Senate Budget and Appropriations Committee reports favorably Assembly Bill No. 1908 (1R).

Assembly Bill No. 1908 (1R) requires the Departments of Health and Senior Services (DHSS) and Human Services (DHS) to establish an awareness program concerning autism and intellectual or other developmental disabilities, for emergency responders, including emergency medical technicians, police officers, and firefighters.

Training curriculum will be developed to inform emergency these personnel of the risks associated with autism or intellectual disability or developmental disability and to instruct these personnel in appropriated recognition and response techniques concerning these disabilities. The Commissioners of Health and Senior Services, the Commissioner of Human Services, the Division of Fire Safety in the Department of Community Affairs and the Police Training Commission in the Department of Law and Public Safety are to adopt the training courses for their respective covered personnel.

The bill takes effect on the first day of the seventh month following enactment. Every covered person in their position prior to that effective date will have 36 months after the effective date to complete the training.

As reported, this bill is identical to Senate No. 1217 (1R), as also reported by the committee.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The Office of Legislative Services (OLS) noted in a Legislative Fiscal Estimate for the bill that it assumes that there already exists training information and materials related to autism and intellectual and other developmental disabilities, and that costs to develop a training curriculum will be minimal.

BILL DESCRIPTION

Assembly Bill No. 1908 of 2008 requires the Departments of Health and Senior Services (DHSS) and Human Services to establish an autism awareness program for emergency responders in the State, including emergency medical technicians, police officers and firefighters, and develop a training course and curriculum to inform emergency responders of the risks associated with autism, as well as provide instruction in appropriate recognition and response techniques. Each emergency medical technician is required to satisfactorily complete the training course. Based on the curriculum developed by DHSS and DHS, the Departments of Community Affairs and Law and Public Safety shall adopt a training course for persons involved in firefighting and for law enforcement personnel.



AN ACT establishing an autism awareness program and supplementing Titles 26 and 52 of the Revised Statutes.

BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

- 1. The Legislature finds and declares that:
- a. Autism is a developmental disorder of brain function which is typically manifested in impaired social interaction, problems with verbal and nonverbal communication and imagination, and unusual or severely limited activities and interests. These symptoms generally appear during the first three years of childhood and continue throughout life;
- b. According to the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, or CDC, one of every 94 children in this State has autism, which is the highest rate among the states examined by the CDC in the most comprehensive study of the prevalence of autism to date; and
- c. Firefighters, emergency medical technicians, and police officers may unexpectedly encounter or be asked to locate a person diagnosed with autism. Given the high number of individuals affected by autism, it is altogether fitting and proper to ensure that emergency responders are uniformly trained in recognizing the behavioral symptoms and characteristics of an autistic child or adult, and are educated in the high risks associated with autism as well as basic response techniques.

- 2. a. The Commissioner of Health and Senior Services and the Commissioner of Human Services, in consultation with the New Jersey Fire and Emergency Medical Services Institute and the New Jersey State First Aid Council, shall develop a training curriculum with the purpose of informing emergency responders of the risks associated with autism, as well as providing instruction in appropriate autism recognition and response techniques. The curriculum shall be incorporated into existing time requirements for training and continuing education of emergency responders.
- b. Prior to certification by the Department of Health and Senior Services, each emergency medical technician trained in basic life support services as defined in section 1 of P.L.1985, c.351 (C.26:2K-21) shall be required to satisfactorily complete the training developed under subsection a. of this section. Every emergency medical technician certified prior to the effective date of this act shall, within 36 months of the effective date of this act, satisfactorily complete the training in autism recognition and response techniques through existing continuing education requirements.

The Senate Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee reports favorably and with committee amendments Senate Bill No. 1217.

As amended by committee, this bill requires the Departments of Health and Senior Services (DHSS) and Human Services (DHS) to establish an awareness program concerning autism and intellectual or other developmental disabilities, for emergency responders, including emergency medical technicians, police officers, and firefighters.

Specifically, the bill provides as follows:

- The Commissioner of Health and Senior Services and the Commissioner of Human Services, in consultation with the New Jersey Fire and Emergency Medical Services Institute and the New Jersey State First Aid Council, are to develop a training curriculum with the purpose of informing emergency responders of the risks associated with autism or an intellectual or other developmental disability, as well as providing instruction in appropriate recognition and response techniques concerning these disabilities. The curriculum is to be incorporated into existing time requirements for training and continuing education of emergency responders.
 - -- Prior to certification by DHSS, each emergency medical technician (EMT) trained in basic life support services as defined in section 1 of P.L.1985, c.351 (C.26:2K-21) is required to satisfactorily complete the training developed by DHSS and DHS.
 - -- Every EMT certified prior to the effective date of the bill must, within 36 months of that effective date, satisfactorily complete the training in recognition and response techniques concerning these disabilities through existing continuing education requirements.
- The Division of Fire Safety in the Department of Community Affairs, in consultation with the New Jersey Fire and Emergency Medical Services Institute, is to adopt a training course regarding the risks associated with autism or an intellectual or other developmental disability and appropriate recognition and response techniques concerning these disabilities based on the curriculum developed by DHSS and DHS.

- -- The course curriculum and instruction will be administered to every firefighter recruit, volunteer or paid.
- -- Each person, volunteer or paid, who is engaged in fire suppression, firefighting, or fire rescue before the effective date of the bill must, within 36 months of that effective date, satisfactorily complete a training course in recognition and response techniques concerning these disabilities.
- The Police Training Commission in the Department of Law and Public Safety is to adopt a training course regarding the risks associated with autism or an intellectual or other developmental disability and appropriate recognition and response techniques concerning these disabilities based on the curriculum developed by DHSS and DHS. The course is to be administered by the employing agency as part of the in-service training provided to each local police officer in each law enforcement unit operating in the State.
 - -- Prior to being appointed to permanent status as a local police officer in a law enforcement unit, an individual is to complete the training course.
 - -- Every local police officer appointed prior to the effective date of the bill must, within 36 months of that effective date, satisfactorily complete a training course in recognition and response techniques concerning these disabilities.
- The bill takes effect on the first day of the seventh month following its enactment.

Committee amendments expand the scope of the bill to include intellectual and other developmental disabilities, as well as autism.

As amended by committee, this bill is identical to Assembly Bill No. 1908 SCA (Scalera/Roberts), which the committee also reported favorably on this date.

The Senate Budget and Appropriations Committee reports favorably Senate Bill No. 1217 (1R).

Senate Bill No. 1272 (1R) requires the Departments of Health and Senior Services (DHSS) and Human Services (DHS) to establish an awareness program concerning autism and intellectual or other developmental disabilities, for emergency responders, including emergency medical technicians, police officers, and firefighters.

Training curriculum will be developed to inform emergency these personnel of the risks associated with autism or intellectual disability or developmental disability and to instruct these personnel in appropriated recognition and response techniques concerning these disabilities. The Commissioners of Health and Senior Services, the Commissioner of Human Services, the Division of Fire Safety in the Department of Community Affairs and the Police Training Commission in the Department of Law and Public Safety are to adopt the training courses for their respective covered personnel.

The bill takes effect on the first day of the seventh month following enactment. Every covered person in their position prior to that effective date will have 36 months after the effective date to complete the training.

As reported, this bill is identical to Assembly No. 1908 (1R), as also reported by the committee.

FISCAL IMPACT:

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Governor Signs Legislation Safeguarding Special Needs Individuals

TRENTON - Governor Corzine today signed legislation that enhances protections for some of our most vulnerable citizens.

The first bill, A839/S989, requires wheelchair bound passengers to be secured with a Federal Motor Vehicle Safety Standards approved securement device when traveling in a passenger car or other designated vehicle.

"This measure will not only ensure the safety of wheelchair bound passengers, it will also protect all those who travel New Jersey's roads," said Governor Corzine. "Taking this precaution will help to avoid unnecessary and

preventable injuries."

Failure to properly secure a wheelchair bound passenger will now result in a \$100 fine.

"In an accident, an unsecured wheelchair could be thrown forward through a windshield, seriously injuring its occupant, other passengers in the car, and others nearby," said Senator Madden, (D-Camden and Gloucester), who serves as Vice Chair of the Senate Transportation Panel. "By requiring these wheelchair-bound passengers to be secured while riding, we can help to prevent these types of accidents and increase safety on our roadways."

Primary sponsors of the bill include Assemblymen Upendra J. Chivukula (D-Middlesex, Somerset) and Eric Munoz (R-Essex, Morris, Somerset and Union). Senate primary sponsors were Senators Fred H. Madden Jr. (D-Camden, Gloucester) and Thomas H. Kean, Jr. (R-Essex, Morris, Somerset, Union).

Governor Corzine also signed A1908/S1217, which requires the Departments of Health and Senior Services and Human Services to develop an autism, intellectual and developmental disability training course and curriculum for first responders, including emergency medical technicians, police officers, and firefighters.

"Training first responders to meet the needs of a person with autism has become an acknowledged need across the country," said Governor Corzine. "Autism is an invisible disability - one that is not always immediately recognized. That's why it's important that we supply our emergency responders with accurate information on how to treat and work with these special needs individuals."

New EMTs, volunteer and paid firefighters and local police officer recruits would be required to complete the training as a condition of certification. EMTs, firefighters and police officers who are currently licensed in New Jersey would be required to complete the training as a continuing education course within three years of the bill's enactment date.

"With his signature today, Governor Corzine is keeping New Jersey squarely at the forefront of the national effort to clear roadblocks and raise awareness so autistic individuals can become independent and successful members of society," said Speaker Roberts (D-Camden).

"Training courses like the ones called for in this legislation are absolutely necessary to help protect people with special needs, and the first responders who may come to their rescue in an emergency situation," said Senator

Robert M. Gordon (D-Bergen). "While I am confident that our law enforcement officers and first responders work hard to treat all people with respect, this is an issue of fairness. I would hate to hear of a person living with autism being physically harmed because of their inability to comprehend instructions they've been given."

"Although New Jersey is a national leader in providing care and support for those with autism, it is essential that our first-responder network is sufficiently trained to recognize autism and how to handle individuals who have this disorder," said Assemblyman Scalera (D-Essex) "Giving New Jersey's police officers and firefighters the tools and training to understand and help individuals with autism will make them better professionals."

Primary sponsors of the legislation in the Assembly were Assembly Speaker Joseph J. Roberts, Jr. (D-Camden) and Assemblymen Frederick Scalera (D-Essex) and Paul D. Moriarity (D-Camden, Gloucester). Sponsors in the Senate included Senators Loretta Weinberg (D-Bergen) and Robert M. Gordon (D-Bergen).

New Jersey has the highest rate of prevalence of autism among states studied by the CDC, or 1 in every 94 children in the state has autism. Last September, Governor Corzine signed a package of seven bills relating to autism spectrum disorders.
