7 1. R.S.39:3-10 is amended to read as follows:

8 39:3-10. A person shall not drive a motor vehicle on a public
9 highway in this State unless the person is under supervision while
10 participating in a behind-the-wheel driving course pursuant to
11 section 6 of P.L.1977, c.25 (C.39:3-13.2a) or is in possession of a
12 validated permit, or a probationary or basic driver's license issued to
13 that person in accordance with this article.

14 A person under 18 years of age shall not be issued a basic license
15 to drive motor vehicles, and a person shall not be issued a validated
16 permit, including a validated examination permit, until the applicant
17 has passed a satisfactory examination and other requirements as to
18 the applicant's ability as an operator. The examination shall
19 include: a test of the applicant's vision; the applicant's ability to
20 understand traffic control devices; the applicant's knowledge of safe
21 driving practices, including the dangers of driving a vehicle in an
22 aggressive manner, which shall include, but not be limited to,
23 unexpectedly altering the speed of a vehicle, making improper or
24 erratic traffic lane changes, disregarding traffic control devices,
25 failing to yield the right of way, and following another vehicle too
26 closely; the applicant's knowledge of operating a motor vehicle in a
27 manner that safely shares the roadway with pedestrians, cyclists,
28 skaters, riders of motorized-scooters, and other non-motorized
29 vehicles, which shall include, but not be limited to, passing a cyclist
30 on the roadway, recognizing bicycle lanes, navigating intersections
31 with pedestrians and cyclists, and exiting a vehicle without
32 endangering pedestrians and cyclists; the applicant's knowledge of
33 the effects that ingestion of alcohol or drugs has on a person's
34 ability to operate a motor vehicle; the applicant's knowledge of the
35 dangers of carbon monoxide poisoning from motor vehicles and
36 techniques for the safe operation and proper maintenance of a motor
37 vehicle; the applicant's knowledge of portions of the mechanism of
38 motor vehicles as is necessary to insure the safe operation of a
39 vehicle of the kind or kinds indicated by the applicant; and the
40 applicant's knowledge of the laws and ordinary usages of the road.
41 The examination shall be made available in English and each of the
42 three languages, other than English, most commonly spoken in the

2 administrator shall periodically, and at least every five years, verify
3 the three languages, other than English, most commonly spoken in
4 the State.

5 A person shall not sit for an examination for any permit without
6 exhibiting photo identification deemed acceptable by the
7 commission, unless that person is a high school student
8 participating in a course of automobile driving education approved
9 by the State Department of Education and conducted in a public,
10 parochial, or private school of this State, pursuant to section 1 of
11 P.L.1950, c.127 (C.39:3-13.1).

12 Prior to taking an examination for ¹[a validated] any¹ permit, a
13 person shall watch a video created by the commission, in
14 conjunction with the Attorney General, explaining the rights and
15 responsibilities of a driver stopped by a law enforcement officer.
16 ¹The video shall be used for informational purposes only and shall
17 not be used in any criminal proceeding involving a driver stopped
18 by a law enforcement officer.¹

19 The commission may waive the written law knowledge
20 examination for any person 18 years of age or older possessing a
21 valid driver's license issued by any other state, the District of
22 Columbia, or the United States Territories of American Samoa,
23 Guam, Northern Mariana Islands, Puerto Rico, or the Virgin
24 Islands. The commission shall be required to provide that person
25 with a booklet that highlights those motor vehicle laws unique to
26 New Jersey. A road test shall be required for a probationary license
27 and serve as a demonstration of the applicant's ability to operate a
28 vehicle of the class designated. During the road test, an applicant
29 may use a rear visibility system, parking sensors, or other
30 technology installed on the motor vehicle that enables the applicant
31 to view areas directly behind the vehicle or alerts the applicant of
32 obstacles while parking.

33 A person shall not sit for a road test unless that person exhibits
34 photo identification deemed acceptable by the commission. A high
35 school student who has completed a course of behind-the-wheel
36 automobile driving education approved by the State Department of
37 Education and conducted in a public, parochial, or private school of
38 this State, who has been issued a special learner's permit pursuant to
39 section 1 of P.L.1950, c.127 (C.39:3-13.1) prior to January 1, 2003,
40 shall not be required to exhibit photo identification in order to sit
41 for a road test. The commission may waive the road test for any
42 person 18 years of age or older possessing a valid driver's license
43 issued by any other state, the District of Columbia, or the United
44 States Territories of American Samoa, Guam, Northern Mariana
45 Islands, Puerto Rico, or the Virgin Islands. The road test shall be
46 given on public streets, where practicable and feasible, but may be
47 preceded by an off-street screening process to assess basic skills.
48 The commission shall approve locations for the road test which

1 pose no more than a minimal risk of injury to the applicant, the
2 examiner, and other motorists. New locations for the road test shall
3 not be approved unless the test can be given on public streets.

4 A person who successfully completes a road test for a
5 motorcycle license or a motorcycle endorsement when operating a
6 motorcycle or motorized scooter with an engine displacement of
7 less than 231 cubic centimeters shall be issued a motorcycle license
8 or endorsement restricting the person's operation of the vehicles to
9 any motorcycle with an engine displacement of 500 cubic
10 centimeters or less. A person who successfully completes a road
11 test for a motorcycle license or motorcycle endorsement when
12 operating a motorcycle with an engine displacement of 231 or more
13 cubic centimeters shall be issued a motorcycle license or
14 endorsement without any restriction as to engine displacement.
15 Any person who successfully completes an approved motorcycle
16 safety education course established pursuant to the provisions of
17 section 1 of P.L.1991, c.452 (C.27:5F-36) shall be issued a
18 motorcycle license or endorsement without restriction as to engine
19 displacement.

20 A person issued a motorcycle license pursuant to this section
21 may be issued a standard motorcycle license or a REAL ID
22 motorcycle license. The chief administrator shall require an
23 applicant for a standard motorcycle license to provide as proof of
24 the applicant's identity, age, and residence primary and secondary
25 documents, with which the chief administrator shall attribute point
26 values in accordance with the point based identification verification
27 program established pursuant to section 28 of P.L.2003, c.13
28 (C.39:2A-28). The point total required to prove the identity of an
29 applicant for the standard motorcycle license shall be the same for
30 every applicant, regardless of immigration status. In the event that
31 the commission changes the point total threshold, the requirement
32 that every applicant reach the same point total threshold shall
33 remain in effect.

34 In addition to requiring the person to submit satisfactory proof of
35 identity and age, the commission shall require the person to
36 provide:

37 (1) as a condition for obtaining a standard motorcycle license,
38 proof of the person's social security number and one document
39 providing satisfactory proof that the person is a New Jersey
40 resident.

41 If the person does not have a social security number, the person
42 shall either:

43 (a) provide satisfactory proof of an Individual Taxpayer
44 Identification Number; or

45 (b) indicate, in a manner prescribed by the commission and
46 consistent with all other provisions of P.L.2019, c.271 (C.39:3-10o
47 et al.), that the person is not eligible to receive a social security
48 number; or

1 (2) as a condition for obtaining a REAL ID motorcycle license:
2 two documents providing satisfactory proof that the person is a New
3 Jersey resident; proof of the person's social security number or
4 verification of ineligibility for a social security number in
5 accordance with the "REAL ID Act of 2005," Pub.L.109-13, any
6 acts amendatory or supplementary thereto, and any federal
7 regulations adopted thereunder; and proof that the person's presence
8 in the United States is authorized under federal law.

9 A standard motorcycle license shall indicate that the license shall
10 not be accepted as identification for an official purpose, as that term
11 is defined under the "REAL ID Act of 2005," Pub.L.109-13, any
12 acts amendatory or supplementary thereto, and any federal
13 regulations adopted thereunder.

14 The commission shall issue a standard basic driver's license or a
15 REAL ID basic driver's license to operate a motor vehicle other
16 than a motorcycle to a person over 18 years of age who previously
17 has not been licensed to drive a motor vehicle in this State or
18 another jurisdiction only if that person has: (1) operated a passenger
19 automobile in compliance with the requirements of this Title for not
20 less than one year, not including any period of suspension or
21 postponement, from the date of issuance of a probationary license
22 pursuant to section 4 of P.L.1950, c.127 (C.39:3-13.4); (2) not been
23 assessed more than two motor vehicle points; (3) not been convicted
24 in the previous year for a violation of R.S.39:4-50, section 2 of
25 P.L.1981, c.512 (C.39:4-50.4a), section 1 of P.L.1992, c.189
26 (C.39:4-50.14), R.S.39:4-129, N.J.S.2C:11-5, section 1 of
27 P.L.2017, c.165 (C.2C:11-5.3), subsection c. of N.J.S.2C:12-1, or
28 any other motor vehicle-related violation the commission
29 determines to be significant and applicable pursuant to regulation;
30 and (4) passed an examination of the applicant's ability to operate a
31 motor vehicle pursuant to this section.

32 The commission shall expand the driver's license examination by
33 20 percent. The additional questions to be added shall consist solely
34 of questions developed in conjunction with the Department of
35 Health concerning the use of alcohol or drugs as related to highway
36 safety. The commission shall develop, in conjunction with the
37 Department of Health, supplements to the driver's manual which
38 shall include information necessary to answer any question on the
39 driver's license examination concerning alcohol or drugs as related
40 to highway safety.

41 Up to 20 questions may be added to the examination on subjects
42 to be determined by the commission that are of particular relevance
43 to youthful drivers, including the importance of operating a motor
44 vehicle in a manner that safely shares the roadway with pedestrians,
45 cyclists, skaters, riders of motorized-scooters, and other non-
46 motorized vehicles, which shall include, but not be limited to,
47 passing a cyclist on the roadway, recognizing bicycle lanes,
48 navigating intersections with pedestrians and cyclists, and exiting a
49 vehicle without endangering pedestrians and cyclists, and the

1 dangers of driving a vehicle in an aggressive manner, which shall
2 include, but not be limited to, unexpectedly altering the speed of a
3 vehicle, making improper or erratic traffic lane changes,
4 disregarding traffic control devices, failing to yield the right of way,
5 and following another vehicle too closely, after consultation with
6 the Director of the Division of Highway Traffic Safety in the
7 Department of Law and Public Safety.

8 The commission shall expand the driver's license examination to
9 include a question asking whether the applicant is aware of the
10 provisions of the "Revised Uniform Anatomical Gift Act,"
11 P.L.2008, c.50 (C.26:6-77 et al.) and the procedure for indicating on
12 the driver's license the intention to make a donation of body organs
13 or tissues pursuant to section 1 of P.L.1978, c.181 (C.39:3-12.2).

14 The commission shall expand the driver's license examination to
15 include a question asking whether the applicant is aware of the
16 dangers of failing to comply with this State's motor vehicle traffic
17 laws and the "STOP for Nikhil Safety Pledge" set forth in
18 subsection e. of R.S.39:3-41.

19 The commission shall expand the driver's license examination to
20 include questions concerning the dangers of carbon monoxide
21 poisoning from motor vehicles and techniques for the safe operation
22 and proper maintenance of a motor vehicle.

23 Any person applying for a driver's license to operate a motor
24 vehicle or motorized bicycle in this State shall surrender to the
25 commission any current driver's license issued to the applicant by
26 another state or jurisdiction upon the applicant's receipt of a driver's
27 license for this State. The commission shall refuse to issue a
28 driver's license if the applicant fails to comply with this provision.
29 An applicant for a permit or license who is under 18 years of age,
30 and who holds a permit or license for a passenger automobile issued
31 by another state or country that is valid or has expired within a time
32 period designated by the commission, shall be subject to the permit
33 and license requirements and penalties applicable to State permit
34 and license applicants who are of the same age; except that if the
35 other state or country has permit or license standards substantially
36 similar to those of this State, the credentials of the other state or
37 country shall be acceptable.

38 The commission shall create classified licensing of drivers
39 covering the following classifications:

40 a. Motorcycles, except that for the purposes of this section,
41 motorcycle shall not include any three-wheeled motor vehicle
42 equipped with a single cab with glazing enclosing the occupant,
43 seats similar to those of a passenger vehicle or truck, seat belts and
44 automotive steering or any vehicle defined as a motorcycle pursuant
45 to R.S.39:1-1 having a motor with a maximum piston displacement
46 that is less than 50 cubic centimeters or a motor that is rated at no
47 more than 1.5 brake horsepower with a maximum speed of no more
48 than 35 miles per hour on a flat surface.

1 b. Omnibuses as classified by R.S.39:3-10.1 and school buses
2 classified under N.J.S.18A:39-1 et seq.

3 c. (Deleted by amendment, P.L.1999, c.28)

4 d. All motor vehicles not included in classifications a. and b. A
5 license issued pursuant to this classification d. shall be referred to
6 as the "basic driver's license" and may be issued as a standard basic
7 driver's license or a REAL ID basic driver's license.

8 Every applicant for a license under classification b. shall be a
9 holder of a basic driver's license. Any issuance of a license under
10 classification b. shall be by endorsement on the person's basic
11 driver's license.

12 A driver's license for motorcycles may be issued separately, but
13 if issued to the holder of a basic driver's license, it shall be by
14 endorsement on the person's basic driver's license. The holder of a
15 basic driver's license or a separately issued motorcycle license shall
16 be authorized to operate a motorcycle having a motor with a
17 maximum piston displacement that is less than 50 cubic centimeters
18 or a motor that is rated at no more than 1.5 brake horsepower with a
19 maximum speed no more than 35 miles per hour on a flat surface.

20 The commission, upon payment of the lawful fee and after it or a
21 person authorized by it has examined the applicant and is satisfied
22 of the applicant's ability as an operator, may, in its discretion, issue
23 a license to the applicant to drive a motor vehicle. The license shall
24 authorize the person to drive any registered vehicle, of the kind or
25 kinds indicated.

26 The license shall expire, except as otherwise provided, during the
27 fourth calendar year following the date in which the license was
28 issued and on the same calendar day as the person's date of birth. If
29 the person's date of birth does not correspond to a calendar day of
30 the fourth calendar year, the license shall expire on the last day of
31 the person's birth month.

32 The commission may, at its discretion and for good cause shown,
33 issue licenses that expire on a date fixed by it. If the commission
34 issues a REAL ID basic driver's license or REAL ID motorcycle
35 license to a person who has demonstrated authorization to be
36 present in the United States for a period of time shorter than the
37 standard period of the license, the commission shall fix the
38 expiration date of the license at a date based on the period in which
39 the person is authorized to be present in the United States under
40 federal immigration laws. The commission may renew the person's
41 REAL ID basic driver's license or REAL ID motorcycle license
42 only if it is demonstrated that the person's continued presence in the
43 United States is authorized under federal law. The fee for licenses
44 with expiration dates fixed by the commission shall be fixed by the
45 commission in amounts proportionately less or greater than the fee
46 herein established.

47 The required fee for a license for the license period shall be as
48 follows, subject to adjustment pursuant to section 16 of
49 P.L.2007, c.335 (C.39:2A-36.1):

- 1 Standard motorcycle license or endorsement: \$18.
- 2 REAL ID motorcycle license: \$29.
- 3 Omnibus or school bus endorsement: \$18.
- 4 Standard basic driver's license: \$18.
- 5 REAL ID basic driver's license: \$29.

6 The commission shall waive the payment of fees for issuance of
7 omnibus endorsements whenever an applicant establishes to the
8 commission's satisfaction that the applicant will use the omnibus
9 endorsement exclusively for operating omnibuses owned by a
10 nonprofit organization duly incorporated under Title 15 or 16 of the
11 Revised Statutes or Title 15A of the New Jersey Statutes.

12 The commission shall issue licenses for the following license
13 period on and after the first day of the calendar month immediately
14 preceding the commencement of the period, the licenses to be
15 effective immediately.

16 All applications for renewals of licenses shall be made in a
17 manner prescribed by the commission and in accordance with
18 procedures established by it.

19 The commission in its discretion may refuse to grant a permit or
20 license to drive motor vehicles to a person who is, in its estimation,
21 not a proper person to be granted a permit or license, but a defect of
22 the applicant shall not debar the applicant from receiving a permit
23 or license unless it can be shown by tests approved by the
24 commission that the defect incapacitates the applicant from safely
25 operating a motor vehicle.

26 A person issued a basic driver's license pursuant to this section
27 may be issued a standard basic driver's license or a REAL ID basic
28 driver's license. The chief administrator shall require an applicant
29 for a standard basic driver's license to provide as proof of the
30 applicant's identity, age, and residence primary and secondary
31 documents, with which the chief administrator shall attribute point
32 values in accordance with the point based identification verification
33 program established pursuant to section 28 of P.L.2003, c.13
34 (C.39:2A-28). The point total required to prove the identity of an
35 applicant for the standard basic driver's license shall be the same for
36 every applicant, regardless of immigration status. In the event that
37 the commission changes the point total threshold, the requirement
38 that every applicant reach the same point total threshold shall
39 remain in effect.

40 In addition to requiring an applicant for a driver's license to
41 submit satisfactory proof of identity and age, the commission also
42 shall require the applicant to provide:

43 (1) as a condition for obtaining a permit and standard basic
44 driver's license, proof of the person's social security number and
45 one document providing satisfactory proof that the applicant is a
46 New Jersey resident. If the person does not have a social security
47 number, the person shall either:

48 (a) provide satisfactory proof of an Individual Taxpayer
49 Identification Number; or

1 (b) indicate, in a manner prescribed by the commission and
2 consistent with all other provisions of P.L.2019, c.271 (C.39:3-10o
3 et al.), that the person is not eligible to receive a social security
4 number; or

5 (2) as a condition for obtaining a REAL ID basic driver's
6 license: two documents providing satisfactory proof that the
7 applicant is a New Jersey resident; proof of the applicant's social
8 security number or verification of ineligibility for a social security
9 number in accordance with the "REAL ID Act of 2005," Pub.L.109-
10 13, any acts amendatory or supplementary thereto, and any federal
11 regulations adopted thereunder; and proof that the applicant's
12 presence in the United States is authorized under federal law.

13 A standard basic driver's license shall indicate that the license
14 shall not be accepted as identification for an official purpose, as that
15 term is defined under the "REAL ID Act of 2005," Pub.L.109-13,
16 any acts amendatory or supplementary thereto, and any federal
17 regulations adopted thereunder.

18 If the commission has reasonable cause to suspect that any
19 document presented by an applicant pursuant to this section is
20 altered, false, or otherwise invalid, the commission shall refuse to
21 grant the permit or license until the time when the document may be
22 verified by the issuing agency to the commission's satisfaction.

23 A person violating this section shall be subject to a fine not
24 exceeding \$500 or imprisonment in the county jail for not more
25 than 60 days, but if that person has never been licensed to drive in
26 this State or any other jurisdiction, the applicant shall be subject to
27 a fine of not less than \$200 and, in addition, the court shall issue an
28 order to the commission requiring the commission to refuse to issue
29 a license to operate a motor vehicle to the person for a period of not
30 less than 180 days. The penalties provided for by this paragraph
31 shall not be applicable in cases where failure to have actual
32 possession of the operator's license is due to an administrative or
33 technical error by the commission.

34 Nothing in this section shall be construed to alter or extend the
35 expiration of any license issued prior to the date this amendatory
36 and supplementary act becomes operative.

37 Any documents and personal information, including an
38 applicant's photograph, obtained by the commission from an
39 applicant for a standard basic driver's license or standard
40 motorcycle license shall be confidential, shall not be considered a
41 government record pursuant to P.L.1963, c.73 (C.47:1A-1 et seq.),
42 P.L.2001, c.404 (C.47:1A-5 et al.), or the common law concerning
43 access to government records, and shall not be disclosed by the
44 commission for any purpose related to Title 8 of the United States
45 Code without the informed consent of the applicant, a warrant
46 signed by a State or federal judge, or a lawful court order or
47 subpoena; except that nothing in this section shall be construed to
48 prohibit, or in any way restrict, any action where such prohibition
49 or restriction would be contrary to federal law. When responding to

1 a warrant, court order, or subpoena, the commission may disclose
2 only those records or information specifically requested in the
3 warrant, court order, or subpoena.

4 Possession of a standard basic driver's license or standard
5 motorcycle license issued pursuant to this section shall not be
6 considered evidence of an individual's citizenship or immigration
7 status and shall not be used as a basis for an investigation, arrest,
8 citation, prosecution, or detention.

9 Information regarding an applicant's Individual Tax
10 Identification Number, social security number, or ineligibility to
11 receive a social security number obtained by the commission for the
12 issuance of a standard motorcycle license or standard basic driver's
13 license pursuant to this section, shall not be considered a
14 government record pursuant to P.L.1963, c.73 (C.47:1A-1 et seq.),
15 P.L.2001, c.404 (C.47:1A-5 et al.), or the common law concerning
16 access to government records, and shall not be disclosed by the
17 commission except where: (1) required by section 11 of
18 P.L.1998, c.1 (C.2A:17-56.60); (2) the applicant provides written
19 informed consent to the disclosure; (3) the requesting entity
20 presents a warrant signed by a State or federal judge, a lawful court
21 order, or a subpoena; (4) required by State or federal law, and to the
22 extent that the disclosure may be necessary to permit the State to
23 participate in the National Driver Register program, as set forth in
24 49 U.S.C. s.30301 et seq.; or (5) the disclosure is in connection with
25 an audit or investigation of identity fraud, driver's license fraud, or
26 non-driver identification card fraud.

27 As used in this section:

28 "Parking sensors" means proximity sensors which use either
29 electromagnetic or ultrasonic technology and are designed to alert
30 the driver to obstacles while parking.

31 "Rear visibility system" means devices or components installed
32 on a motor vehicle at the time of manufacture that allow a forward
33 facing driver to view a visual image of the area directly behind the
34 vehicle.

49 less than 231 cubic centimeters shall be issued a motorcycle license

1 or endorsement restricting the person's operation of the vehicles to
2 any motorcycle with an engine displacement of 500 cubic
3 centimeters or less. A person who successfully completes a road
4 test for a motorcycle license or motorcycle endorsement when
5 operating a motorcycle with an engine displacement of 231 or more

30 shall include information necessary to answer any question on the

The video shall be used for informational purposes only and shall not be used in any criminal proceeding involving a driver stopped by a law enforcement officer. Under the bill, the video is to explain the rights and responsibilities of a driver stopped by a law enforcement officer.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS:

The committee amendments would provide that the video explaining the rights and responsibilities of a driver stopped by a law enforcement officer is to be used for informational purposes only and is not to be used in any criminal proceeding involving a driver stopped by a law enforcement officer. The committee amendments also clarify that a person is required to watch the video prior to taking an examination for any permit.

The bill also clarifies that a person is required to watch the video prior to taking an examination for any permit.

FISCAL ANALYSIS

EXECUTIVE BRANCH

OFFICE OF LEGISLATIVE SERVICES

The OLS concludes that the bill will result in an indeterminate increase in State expenditures in the first year after the bill's effective date.

The MVC, in conjunction with the Attorney General, is required to create a video that explains the rights and responsibilities of a driver stopped by a law enforcement officer. A person is required to watch the video prior to taking a written examination for any permit. The MVC and Department of Law and Public Safety will likely incur certain costs to create this video. However, it is not known what resources or associated costs will be required to produce this content.

The bill also requires a person to watch the video prior to taking the written examination for any permit. It is unclear at what point prior to taking the written examination that a person will be required to watch the video, and if it will be possible for the video to be viewed prior to the examination visit. The MVC may incur additional costs as additional staff time or personnel and equipment may be needed to provide a means of viewing the video at an MVC facility as a part of the permit process. The specific additional resources or associated costs that will be needed and whether the MVC already has sufficient resources to provide a means of showing the video at MVC's regional customer service locations is unclear.

Although not specifically required by the legislation, the MVC may need to update the driver's manual to include information concerning the rights and responsibilities of a driver stopped by a law enforcement officer and may incur an indeterminate cost to do so in the first year after the bill's effective date. It is not known how many manuals will need to be reprinted, if any, or to what extent the online driver's manual will be updated with this information.

26 knowledge of operating a motor vehicle in a manner that safely shares
27 the roadway with pedestrians, cyclists, skaters, riders of motorized-
28 scooters, and other non-motorized vehicles, which shall include, but
29 not be limited to, passing a cyclist on the roadway, recognizing
30 bicycle lanes, navigating intersections with pedestrians and cyclists,
31 and exiting a vehicle without endangering pedestrians and cyclists;
32 the applicant's knowledge of the effects that ingestion of alcohol or
33 drugs has on a person's ability to operate a motor vehicle; the
34 applicant's knowledge of the dangers of carbon monoxide poisoning
35 from motor vehicles and techniques for the safe operation and proper
36 maintenance of a motor vehicle; the applicant's knowledge of
37 portions of the mechanism of motor vehicles as is necessary to insure
38 the safe operation of a vehicle of the kind or kinds indicated by the
39 applicant; and the applicant's knowledge of the laws and ordinary
40 usages of the road. The examination shall be made available in
41 English and each of the three languages, other than English, most
42 commonly spoken in the State, as determined by the chief
43 administrator. The chief administrator shall periodically, and at least
44 every five years, verify the three languages, other than English, most
45 commonly spoken in the State.

EXPLANATION – Matter enclosed in bold-faced brackets [thus] in the above bill is not enacted and is intended to be omitted in the law.

Matter underlined thus is new matter.

1 A person shall not sit for an examination for any permit without
2 exhibiting photo identification deemed acceptable by the
3 commission, unless that person is a high school student participating
4 in a course of automobile driving education approved by the State
5 Department of Education and conducted in a public, parochial, or
6 private school of this State, pursuant to section 1 of P.L.1950, c.127
7 (C.39:3-13.1). Prior to taking an examination for a validated permit,
8 a person shall watch a video created by the commission, in
9 conjunction with the Attorney General, explaining the rights and
10 responsibilities of a driver stopped by a law enforcement officer. The
11 commission may waive the written law knowledge examination for
12 any person 18 years of age or older possessing a valid driver's license
13 issued by any other state, the District of Columbia, or the United
14 States Territories of American Samoa, Guam, Northern Mariana
15 Islands, Puerto Rico, or the Virgin Islands. The commission shall be
16 required to provide that person with a booklet that highlights those
17 motor vehicle laws unique to New Jersey. A road test shall be
18 required for a probationary license and serve as a demonstration of
19 the applicant's ability to operate a vehicle of the class designated.
20 During the road test, an applicant may use a rear visibility system,
21 parking sensors, or other technology installed on the motor vehicle
22 that enables the applicant to view areas directly behind the vehicle or
23 alerts the applicant of obstacles while parking.

24 A person shall not sit for a road test unless that person exhibits
25 photo identification deemed acceptable by the commission. A high
26 school student who has completed a course of behind-the-wheel
27 automobile driving education approved by the State Department of
28 Education and conducted in a public, parochial, or private school of
29 this State, who has been issued a special learner's permit pursuant to
30 section 1 of P.L.1950, c.127 (C.39:3-13.1) prior to January 1, 2003,
31 shall not be required to exhibit photo identification in order to sit for
32 a road test. The commission may waive the road test for any person
33 18 years of age or older possessing a valid driver's license issued by
34 any other state, the District of Columbia, or the United States
35 Territories of American Samoa, Guam, Northern Mariana Islands,
36 Puerto Rico, or the Virgin Islands. The road test shall be given on
37 public streets, where practicable and feasible, but may be preceded
38 by an off-street screening process to assess basic skills. The
39 commission shall approve locations for the road test which pose no
40 more than a minimal risk of injury to the applicant, the examiner, and
41 other motorists. New locations for the road test shall not be approved
42 unless the test can be given on public streets.

43 A person who successfully completes a road test for a motorcycle
44 license or a motorcycle endorsement when operating a motorcycle or
45 motorized scooter with an engine displacement of less than 231 cubic
46 centimeters shall be issued a motorcycle license or endorsement
47 restricting the person's operation of the vehicles to any motorcycle
48 with an engine displacement of 500 cubic centimeters or less. A

1 person who successfully completes a road test for a motorcycle
2 license or motorcycle endorsement when operating a motorcycle with
3 an engine displacement of 231 or more cubic centimeters shall be
4 issued a motorcycle license or endorsement without any restriction
5 as to engine displacement. Any person who successfully completes
6 an approved motorcycle safety education course established pursuant
7 to the provisions of section 1 of P.L.1991, c.452 (C.27:5F-36) shall
8 be issued a motorcycle license or endorsement without restriction as
9 to engine displacement.

10 A person issued a motorcycle license pursuant to this section may
11 be issued a standard motorcycle license or a REAL ID motorcycle
12 license. The chief administrator shall require an applicant for a
13 standard motorcycle license to provide as proof of the applicant's
14 identity, age, and residence primary and secondary documents, with
15 which the chief administrator shall attribute point values in
16 accordance with the point based identification verification program
17 established pursuant to section 28 of P.L.2003, c.13 (C.39:2A-28).
18 The point total required to prove the identity of an applicant for the
19 standard motorcycle license shall be the same for every applicant,
20 regardless of immigration status. In the event that the commission
21 changes the point total threshold, the requirement that every
22 applicant reach the same point total threshold shall remain in effect.

6 automobile in compliance with the requirements of this Title for not

16 significant and applicable pursuant to regulation; and (4) passed an
17 examination of the applicant's ability to operate a motor vehicle
18 pursuant to this section.

19 The commission shall expand the driver's license examination by
20 20 percent. The additional questions to be added shall consist solely
21 of questions developed in conjunction with the Department of Health
22 concerning the use of alcohol or drugs as related to highway safety.
23 The commission shall develop, in conjunction with the Department
24 of Health, supplements to the driver's manual which shall include
25 information necessary to answer any question on the driver's license
26 examination concerning alcohol or drugs as related to highway
27 safety.

28 Up to 20 questions may be added to the examination on subjects
29 to be determined by the commission that are of particular relevance
30 to youthful drivers, including the importance of operating a motor
31 vehicle in a manner that safely shares the roadway with pedestrians,
32 cyclists, skaters, riders of motorized-scooters, and other non-
33 motorized vehicles, which shall include, but not be limited to, passing
34 a cyclist on the roadway, recognizing bicycle lanes, navigating
35 intersections with pedestrians and cyclists, and exiting a vehicle
36 without endangering pedestrians and cyclists, and the dangers of
37 driving a vehicle in an aggressive manner, which shall include, but
38 not be limited to, unexpectedly altering the speed of a vehicle,

46 provisions of the "Revised Uniform Anatomical Gift Act," P.L.2008,
47 c.50 (C.26:6-77 et al.) and the procedure for indicating on the driver's

1 license the intention to make a donation of body organs or tissues
2 pursuant to section 1 of P.L.1978, c.181 (C.39:3-12.2).

3 The commission shall expand the driver's license examination to
4 include a question asking whether the applicant is aware of the
5 dangers of failing to comply with this State's motor vehicle traffic
6 laws and the "STOP for Nikhil Safety Pledge" set forth in subsection
7 e. of R.S.39:3-41.

8 The commission shall expand the driver's license examination to
9 include questions concerning the dangers of carbon monoxide
10 poisoning from motor vehicles and techniques for the safe operation
11 and proper maintenance of a motor vehicle.

12 Any person applying for a driver's license to operate a motor
13 vehicle or motorized bicycle in this State shall surrender to the
14 commission any current driver's license issued to the applicant by
15 another state or jurisdiction upon the applicant's receipt of a driver's
16 license for this State. The commission shall refuse to issue a driver's
17 license if the applicant fails to comply with this provision. An
18 applicant for a permit or license who is under 18 years of age, and
19 who holds a permit or license for a passenger automobile issued by
20 another state or country that is valid or has expired within a time
21 period designated by the commission, shall be subject to the permit
22 and license requirements and penalties applicable to State permit and
23 license applicants who are of the same age; except that if the other

42 license issued pursuant to this classification d. shall be referred to as
43 the "basic driver's license" and may be issued as a standard basic
44 driver's license or a REAL ID basic driver's license.

45 Every applicant for a license under classification b. shall be a
46 holder of a basic driver's license. Any issuance of a license under
47 classification b. shall be by endorsement on the person's basic driver's
48 license.

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1 A driver's license for motorcycles may be issued separately, but if
2 issued to the holder of a basic driver's license, it shall be by
3 endorsement on the person's basic driver's license. The holder of a
4 basic driver's license or a separately issued motorcycle license shall
5 be authorized to operate a motorcycle having a motor with a
6 maximum piston displacement that is less than 50 cubic centimeters

44 The commission shall waive the payment of fees for issuance of
45 omnibus endorsements whenever an applicant establishes to the
46 commission's satisfaction that the applicant will use the omnibus
47 endorsement exclusively for operating omnibuses owned by a

1 nonprofit organization duly incorporated under Title 15 or 16 of the
2 Revised Statutes or Title 15A of the New Jersey Statutes.

3 The commission shall issue licenses for the following license
4 period on and after the first day of the calendar month immediately
5 preceding the commencement of the period, the licenses to be
6 effective immediately.

7 All applications for renewals of licenses shall be made in a manner
8 prescribed by the commission and in accordance with procedures
9 established by it.

10 The commission in its discretion may refuse to grant a permit or
11 license to drive motor vehicles to a person who is, in its estimation,
12 not a proper person to be granted a permit or license, but a defect of
13 the applicant shall not debar the applicant from receiving a permit or

15 that the defect incapacitates the applicant from safely operating a

15 A person violating this section shall be subject to a fine not

24 a motor vehicle at the time of manufacture that allow a forward facing
25 driver to view a visual image of the area directly behind the vehicle.

Under the bill, the video is to explain the rights and responsibilities of a driver stopped by a law enforcement officer. The video is for informational purposes only and is not to be used in any criminal proceeding involving a driver stopped by a law enforcement officer.

The committee amended the bill to provide that the video explaining the rights and responsibilities of a driver stopped by a law enforcement officer is to be used for informational purposes only and is not to be used in any criminal proceeding involving a driver stopped by a law enforcement officer. The bill also clarifies that a person is required to watch the video prior to taking an examination for any permit.

Under the bill, the video is to explain the rights and responsibilities of a driver stopped by a law enforcement officer. The committee amended the title of the bill to clarify that the bill concerns motor vehicle driver education and does not concern motor vehicle driver testing.

As amended and reported, Senate Bill No. 2231 (2R) is identical to Assembly Bill No. 3871 (1R), which was also reported by the committee on this date.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS:

The committee amended the bill to clarify that the bill concerns motor vehicle driver education and not motor vehicle driver testing, making the titles of Senate Bill No. 2231 (2R) and Assembly Bill No. 3871 (1R) identical.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The Office of Legislative Services (OLS) estimates that the Department of Law and Public Safety and the New Jersey Motor Vehicle Commission (MVC) will incur indeterminate increased costs in the first year after the bill's effective date to create a video concerning the rights and responsibilities of a driver stopped by a law enforcement officer that is required to be shown prior to a person's taking a written examination for any permit.

TRENTON – Today, Governor Phil Murphy signed the following bills into law:

A-2131/S-2227 (Tully, DePhillips, Freiman/Gopal, C.A. Brown) – Creates New Jersey Global War on Terrorism Medal.

A-3871/S-2231 (Karabinchak, Holley, Dunn/Diegnan, Madden) – Requires person taking written examination for permit to watch video of rights and responsibilities of driver stopped by law enforcement.

A-4182/S-2873 (Giblin, Wimberly, Calabrese/Singleton, Cryan) – Requires landlord to allow tenant to make rent payment using credit card during COVID-19 pandemic.

Governor Murphy vetoed the following bill:

A-4525/S-3128 (Freiman, Mazzeo, Verrelli, Houghtaling/Pou, Sarlo, Cruz-Perez) – ABSOLUTE – Expands opportunities for restaurants, bars, distilleries and breweries to provide outdoor dining and permits certain farms to adjust operations in response to COVID-19 public health emergency.

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
