Additionally, the bill permits pharmacy interns and pharmacy externs to administer vaccines to patients who are 18 years of age or older, subject to the same requirements that currently apply to pharmacists who administer such vaccines. Specifically, the pharmacy intern or pharmacy extern is to be appropriately educated and qualified, as determined by the Board of Pharmacy pursuant to joint rules promulgated by the Board of Pharmacy and the State Board of Medical Examiners. Additionally, the vaccine is to be

The Assembly Regulated Professions Committee reports favorably and with committee amendments Senate Committee Substitute for Senate Bill Nos. 724 and 725.

As amended, the substitute bill allows pharmacy interns and pharmacy externs to administer certain vaccines in certain circumstances under the direct supervision of a licensed pharmacist and report certain vaccine administrations.

Under the bill, pharmacy interns and pharmacy externs are authorized to administer vaccines to patients, subject to the same requirements that currently apply to pharmacists who administer vaccines. A pharmacy intern or pharmacy extern is to be appropriately educated and qualified, as determined by the New Jersey State Board of Pharmacy pursuant to rules jointly promulgated by the board and the State Board of Medical Examiners. The vaccine is to be administered pursuant to one of the following: (1) a prescription issued by an authorized prescriber; (2) an immunization program implemented pursuant to a standing order; or (3) an immunization program, including programs sponsored by government agencies, which are not patient specific.

The bill requires that the pharmacy intern or pharmacy extern be acting under the direct supervision of a licensed pharmacist who is pre-approved by the New Jersey State Board of Pharmacy to administer vaccines and related emergency medications, and who is in compliance with the rules jointly promulgated by the New Jersey State Board of Pharmacy and the State Board of Medical Examiners.

The bill permits pharmacy interns and pharmacy externs to administer an influenza vaccine to a patient who is seven years of age or older. For a patient who is under 18 years of age, the pharmacy intern or pharmacy extern may not administer the vaccine except with the permission of the patient's parent or legal guardian. For a patient who is under 10 years of age, a pharmacy intern or pharmacy extern may not administer an influenza vaccine unless the vaccine has been prescribed for the patient by an authorized prescriber. Nothing in the

bill is to be construed to require any patient who is 10 years of age or older to obtain a prescription for an influenza vaccine.

Additionally, a supervising pharmacist would be required to report to the New Jersey Immunization Information System the administration of an immunization by a pharmacist, pharmacy intern, or pharmacy extern, as required by regulation, for inclusion in the patient's registry.

The committee amendments require a supervising pharmacist to report to the New Jersey Immunization Information System the administration of an immunization by a pharmacist, pharmacy intern, or pharmacy extern, as required by regulation, for inclusion in the patient's registry, and make technical changes.

Specifically, the pharmacy intern or pharmacy extern is to be appropriately educated and qualified, as determined by the Board of Pharmacy pursuant to joint rules promulgated by the Board of Pharmacy and the State Board of Medical Examiners. Additionally, the vaccine is to be

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administered pursuant to one of the following: (1) a prescription sued by an authorized prescriber; (2) an immunization program implemented pursuant to a standing order; or (3) an immunization program, including programs sponsored by government agencies, which are not patient specific.

6 Further, the bill permits pharmacy interns and pharmacy externs 7 to administer an influenza vaccine to a patient who is seven years of 8 age or older. For a patient who is under 18 years of age, the 9 pharmacy intern or pharmacy extern may not administer the vaccine 10 except with the permission of the patient's parent or legal guardian. AN ACT concerning pharmacy interns and externs and amending P.L.2003, c.280.

BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

- 1. Section 24 of P.L.2003, c.280 (C.45:14-63) is amended to read as follows:
- 24. a. No pharmacist shall administer a prescription medication directly to a patient without appropriate education or certification, as determined by the board in accordance with the requirements set forth in the rules jointly promulgated by the board and the State Board of Medical Examiners. Such medication shall only be for the treatment of a disease for which a nationally certified program is in effect, or as determined by the board, and only if utilized for the treatment of that disease for which the medication is prescribed or indicated or for which the collaborative drug therapy management permits.
- b. (1) Notwithstanding any law, rule, or regulation to the contrary, a pharmacist may administer drugs to a patient 18 years of age or older, provided the pharmacist is appropriately educated and qualified, as determined by the board in accordance with the requirements set forth in the rules jointly promulgated by the board and the State Board of Medical Examiners, and provided the drugs are administered under any one of the following conditions:
- (a) pursuant to a prescription by an authorized prescriber for a vaccine and related emergency medications;
- (b) in immunization programs implemented pursuant to an authorized prescriber's standing order for the vaccine and related emergency medications; or
- (c) in immunization programs and programs sponsored by governmental agencies that are not patient specific.
- (2) A pharmacist may administer an influenza vaccine to a patient who is seven years of age or older. For a patient who is under 18 years of age, a pharmacist shall not administer a vaccine except with the permission of the patient's parent or legal guardian. For a patient who is under 12 years of age, a pharmacist shall not administer a vaccine unless pursuant to a prescription by an authorized prescriber. Nothing in this subsection shall be construed to require a patient 12 years of age or older to obtain a prescription for an influenza vaccine.
- c. A pharmacy intern or extern who has completed the required education and training, as defined in N.J.A.C.13:39-2.6, may administer injectable medications, biologicals, and immunizations to patients by injectable or needle free delivery methods provided

The Assembly Regulated Professions Committee reports favorably an Assembly Committee Substitute for Assembly Bill Nos. 342 and 343.

The committee substitute allows pharmacy interns and pharmacy externs to administer certain vaccines in certain circumstances under the direct supervision of a licensed pharmacist and report certain vaccine administrations.

Under the substitute bill, pharmacy interns and pharmacy externs are authorized to administer vaccines to patients, subject to the same requirements that currently apply to pharmacists who administer vaccines. A pharmacy intern or pharmacy extern is to be appropriately educated and qualified, as determined by the New Jersey State Board of Pharmacy pursuant to rules jointly promulgated by the board and the State Board of Medical Examiners. The vaccine is to be administered pursuant to one of the following: (1) a prescription issued by an authorized prescriber; (2) an immunization program implemented pursuant to a standing order; or (3) an immunization program, including programs sponsored by government agencies, which are not patient specific.

The bill requires that the pharmacy intern or pharmacy extern be acting under the direct supervision of a licensed pharmacist who is pre-approved by the New Jersey State Board of Pharmacy to administer vaccines and related emergency medications, and who is in compliance with the rules jointly promulgated by the New Jersey State Board of Pharmacy and the State Board of Medical Examiners.

The bill permits pharmacy interns and pharmacy externs to administer an influenza vaccine to a patient who is seven years of age or older. For a patient who is under 18 years of age, the pharmacy intern or pharmacy extern may not administer the vaccine except with the permission of the patient's parent or legal guardian. For a patient who is under 10 years of age, a pharmacy intern or pharmacy extern may not administer an influenza vaccine unless the vaccine has been prescribed for the patient by an authorized prescriber. Nothing in the bill is to be construed to require any patient who is 10 years of age or older to obtain a prescription for an influenza vaccine.

Additionally, a supervising pharmacist would be required to report to the New Jersey Immunization Information System the administration of an immunization by a pharmacist, pharmacy intern, or pharmacy extern, as required by regulation, for inclusion in the patient's registry.

TRENTON – Today, Governor Phil Murphy signed the following bills into law:

A360 (Chiaravalloti, Danielsen, Mukherji/Pou, Cruz-Perez) – Prohibits consumer reporting agencies from charging certain fees related to security freezes on consumer reports.

A1039 (Houghtaling, Dancer, Andrzejczak, Space, Taliaferro/Gopal, Oroho) – Directs the Division of Travel and Tourism to publish on its website information of farm-to-table restaurants.

A2182 (DeAngelo, Wimberly, Quijano/Scutari, Singleton) – Establishes an apprenticeship requirement to qualify for an electrical contractor's license.

A3112 (Benson, Mukherji, Karabinchak/Beach, Oroho) – Authorizes local units of government subject to "Local Public Contracts Law" and "Public School Contracts Law" to use electronic procurement technologies.

A3731 (Tully, Swain, Wimberly/Lagana) – Establishes "County Code Pilot Program" for certain counties.

A4102 (Johnson, DeAngelo/Weinberg) – Allows cigar bars and lounges to renew lapsed exemption from ban on indoor smoking under certain circumstances.

S724 (Greenstein, Diegnan/Pinkin, Giblin, Jasey) – Allows pharmacy interns and pharmacy externs to administer certain vaccines under direct supervision of pharmacist and requires reporting of certain vaccine administrations.

S869 (Sweeney, Cunningham, Oroho/Jimenez, Lagana, Vainieri Huttle, Benson) – Permits establishment by county and four-year institutions of higher education of three plus one degree programs for receipt of baccalaureate degree after spending three years at county college and one year at senior institution.

S870 (Sweeney, Cunningham/Jasey, Schaer, Calabrese) – Establishes Dual Enrollment Study Commission.

S1869 (Scutari/Caputo, Holley) – Prohibits sale of certain alarm business signs and decals.

S1958 (Gopal, Scutari/Mukherji, Lopez, DeAngelo) – Establishes permit to allow seasonal retail consumption license holders to sell alcoholic beverages during certain off-season dates.

S2397 (Gopal/Schaer, Karabinchak, Pinkin) – Requires institutions of higher education to provide alternative arrangements to students unable to complete certain assignments by regular due date or register for courses because of day of religious observance.

S2839 (Gopal, Oroho, Greenstein/Houghtaling, Zwicker, DeAngelo) – Makes General Fund supplemental appropriation of \$250,000 to New Jersey Manufacturing Extension Program, Inc.

S2845 (Vitale/Spearman, Mejia, Lopez) – Amends Fiscal Year 2019 appropriations act to revise increase in Work

First New Jersey benefits.

SJR18 (Pou, Greenstein/Murphy) – Establishes "Commission to Review Constructive Sentences of Life Imprisonment on Juvenile Offenders."

Additionally, Governor Murphy announced that he has conditionally vetoed the following bills:

A4342 (Tully, Swain, Benson, Jones/Lagana) – Requires public school student to carry identification card at school-sponsored, off-campus activities and requires principal to keep list of students on school buses used for school-sponsored activities in case of emergencies.
