1 **AN ACT** concerning document required to claim veterans' 2 preference for civil service and amending P.L.2000, c.127.

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**BE IT ENACTED** by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

The Adjutant General shall specify the form, content, and source for an official certification or verification of military service statement or letter based on such statements or letters that are approved and provided by the federal military authorities.


